Patriots Lose Heartbreaker

The Valley Patriots fell 9-8 to the Crowell Wildcats at Patriot Stadium Friday night, giving Valley a 0-3 record in District play. Crowell scored seven points during the second quarter followed by Valley's Brandon Stark's one-yard touchdown run, with four minutes, forty-four seconds remaining in the third quarter. The two point conversion by Stark was good, giving Valley an 8-7 lead over Crowell, until one

second away from the fourth quarter, when Valley failed to make connections on the snap from punt formation. This sent the ball into Crowell's end zone, giving them a safety. Stark carried the ball 19 times for 108 yards. Valley gained 149 yards total offense to Crowell's 220 yards. Valley travels to Chillicothe this Friday with kickoff at 7:30 p.m. Support the Patriots!

Blue Angels To Appear At Reese AFB

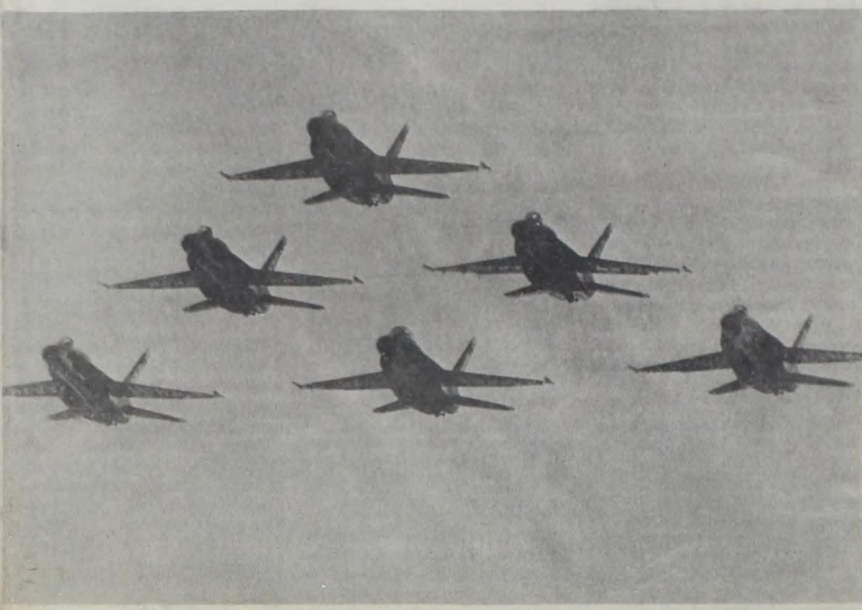
Reese Air Force Base, Texas -- Colonel Mark H. Lillard III, commander of Reese AFB's 64th Flying Training Wing has designated Sunday, October 16, 1988 as "Commanders Day" Open House.

The base will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. The featured flying attraction will be the U. S. Navy's Blue Angels Flight Demonstration team. They will be making their first visit to Reese in 20 years and will be flying their A/F-18 Hornet jet fighters.

More than 30, and possibly as many as 50 aircraft from all the military services will be on static (ground) display on the flightline when the gates open. The display will include fighters, bombers, reconnaissance, transports, helicopters and training aircraft.

A number of the latest military aircraft are expected to fly-by and give a demonstration of their flying maneuvers. Reese's T-37 and T-38 training jets will fly-by in formation prior to the Blue Angels show.

A number of exhibits and displays will be available for viewing. The Reese fire department will show the capability of their crash-rescue trucks and demonstrate a simulated extraction from a disabled aircraft. The Reese Honor Guard Drill Team and Color

Guard will perform throughout the day. There will be plenty of food, drink and parking available.

The Reese AFB appearance will mark the only Blue Angels flight demonstration in the West Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico area between now and the end of their 1988 show season in November.

Bob Bullock Reports

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that shoppers who use discount coupons don't have to pay state sales tax on their savings.

"Tax is collected only on the actual amount you pay for a taxable item, not on the pre-discount price," Bullock said.

According to Bullock, the amount of tax paid on items bought with coupons used to depend on the type of coupon being redeemed.

As a result, businesses and customers were sometimes confused about the correct amount of tax due.

"I can't find one good reason to tax items at the full price if they're being paid for with a discount coupon. This is a simple issue that somehow got complicated, and I hope I've cleared it up for once and for all," Bullock said.

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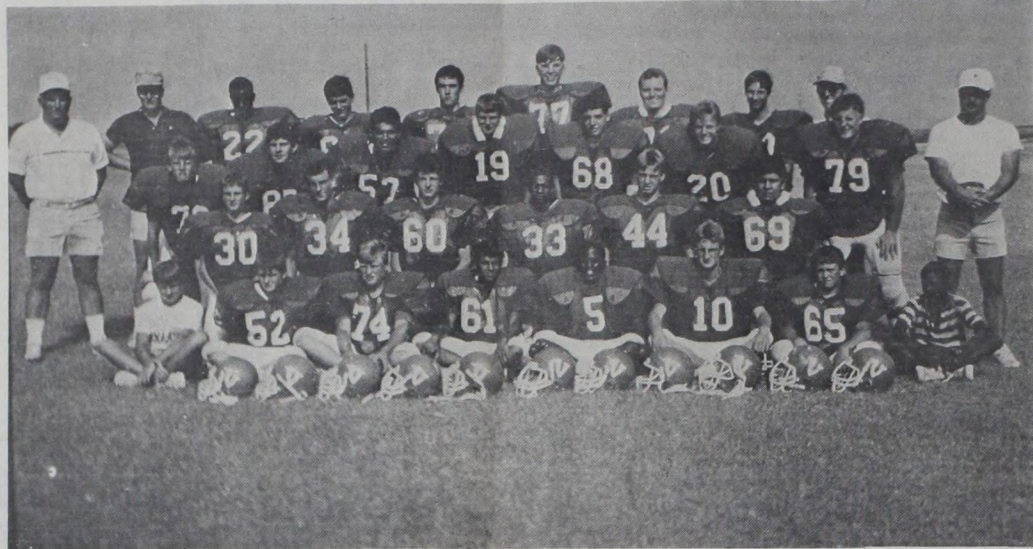
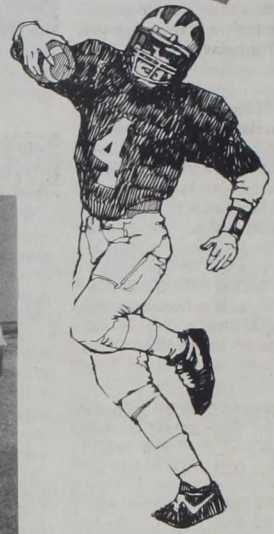

Boll Weevil Funding Assured For 1989

Senator Lloyd Bentsen said Thursday that funding for a boll weevil control program, which has kept the boll weevil off the High Plains, has been assured for the next fiscal year.

Bentsen said that members of the House-Senate conference committee on the agriculture appropriations bill have agreed to \$9.6 million in funding for the program, which is funded by the federal government and local sources.

"Since 1964, the boll weevil program has saved an estimated \$1 billion for High Plains area farmers, all for a cost of about \$25 million, with local farmers paying about half. That's a cost-benefit ratio of 40 to 1," Bentsen said.

"In addition, the program has reduced pesticide usage by about 40 million pounds," Bentsen said.

"The High Plains program has been so successful that it's now been expanded to other areas of the Cotton Belt."

The Senator said that in previous years there has been separate funding for individual program areas. The decision this year to change to a single appropriation, which cotton producers support, will allow for flexibility in administering the program.

"The boll weevil program is an excellent example of

governments and local farmers cooperating to solve a problem—in this case, keeping the boll weevil off the High Plains and other areas," Bentsen said.

"This support for the program will help continue the effort to get rid of the boll weevil, reduce the use of pesticides," Bentsen said.
