**Steps to more Confidence Part I**  
Lack of confidence is common and has many side affects. This is the first of two articles that will give general steps you can take to having more confidence.  
First, recognize your strengths and weaknesses—set your goals according to your strengths. For example, if you don't like people very much, a salesman job may not be the best for you.  
Second, look at where you have come from (your roots) and try to deal with past hurts and work toward forgiving others involved in those hurts. Also, forgive yourself for mistakes, sins, failures, and past embarrassments.  
Third, don't indulge in guilt/shame. They limit your personal value. Doing bad things does not make you a bad person.  
Fourth, build a realistic view of "reality." "Reality" is nothing more than a shared agreement among people to call something the same way. There are always other views. Another's views may be different from yours but that does not mean you are being rejected or put down.  
Fifth, don't say bad things about yourself, like "stupid, ugly, failure," etc.  
Sixth, Don't allow others to criticize you as a person. They can evaluate your actions or performance, but not you as a person.  
Seventh, remember, that failures and disappointments can be blessings in disguise. You may be avoiding a bigger let down later.  
It takes more than reading things to build your confidence. It takes application and practice. More next week.

**Work Crews Begin Tearing Out Rails**

The crew pictured is picking up the rail which ran across the Los Lingos River bridge southwest of Quitauque. The Burlington Northern crew has been in the area for two weeks picking up rail which will be reused by the railroad elsewhere.

They have taken up "ribbon rail" near Turkey as well as at Los Lingos and at the Quitauque River bridge. Approximately seven miles of the heavy gauge rail which runs up the Caprock will be removed before Burlington completes their work next week.

In the near future the Burlington Northern will take up approximately ten miles of rail near Estelline. This will essentially complete their work in the area. Then the salvage company's crews will begin their task of completing the removal of the track and clean up.

## Medical Milestones

### Developments in Treating Alzheimer's Disease

Researchers have recently come up with a discovery that could lead to treatments, perhaps even prevention of Alzheimer's disease, a condition that robs elderly Americans of their dignity and personality while costing \$9 billion annually.

Oddly enough, the research involved an animal that doesn't get Alzheimer's on its own, the laboratory rat. By injecting the brains of laboratory rats with a small fragment of a protein called beta amyloid, the researchers produced a parallel degeneration of rat brain cells.

The researchers found that the beta amyloid protein, when injected into the hippocampus, the region of the brain that controls memory and reasoning, attached to those cells, accumulated there and destroyed them. Twisted mats of beta amyloid, known as plaques, are found in the brains of Alzheimer's sufferers.

The researchers also noted that beta amyloid has a region that resembles Substance P, a short chain of protein that transmits signals between nerve cells and through the spinal cord. They then found Substance P could bind to the cells that would have been targeted by

beta amyloid and protect them. What's more, unlike most molecules, Substance P can pass from the bloodstream into the brain. Substance P injected into rats protected their hippocampus regions from later injections of beta amyloid.

While much research remains to be done, there may be reason to hope that within a decade the mystery of Alzheimer's disease will be revealed and that treatments to arrest or prevent the disease can be developed.

There is much to be said for a "macho" man. I'm talking about the Old West type of macho. The kind of man who has respect for women, is kind and tender to little children, and protective of them.

In this age of "gay rights" and women's lib; pro-choice militants and their counterparts; of men who act like women, and women who act like men; of equal rights and equal pay, and women saying "if it's good for the gander, it's good for the goose," it is refreshing to see a man who behaves like the men I remember from my youth. To witness a father who is kind and gentle, but firm with his children, and who respects and loves his wife.

The saddest thing in the world to me is to hear a father cursing

and screaming at his child (or his wife); physical abuse is not the only, nor maybe the worst kind of abuse to a child, although verbal and physical abuse usually go hand in hand. Physical scars do heal to some extent, but those scars put on a child's tender little soul by verbal abuse from a beloved parent may last forever, and have such an effect on his/her adolescent and adult life that the harm cannot even be calculated.

The brown-eyed spouse deals with abusive fathers (and mothers) and abused children almost every day in his job; (yes, Cottle County does have many cases of child abuse each year, and it often falls to the Sheriff to investigate the situation). Sometimes he comes home so

soulsick and disgusted with the adult human race that he can hardly talk about it. Children are like baby animals -- they have no way to defend themselves against hurt and abuse; they just develop the attitude that they probably deserve to be treated this way; if that parent whom they love thinks they are worthless, then they must be. We tend to live out our idea of ourselves.

How thankful I am to have had loving, supportive parents, who encouraged, taught, sacrificed--without ever letting me know they did--and even though I was punished for disobedience or misbehavior, they never yelled or cursed, or made me (nor any of my sisters) feel that we were no good or that they hated us.

We always knew we were loved, even when they were out of sorts with us. Thank God for my own husband -- and a son who is also a father -- who were and are loving and kind to their children.

After a wedding trip to Jamaica, the couple now make their home in Lubbock.

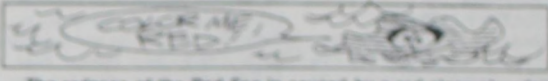
The groom's parents hosted a rehearsal dinner at the Quitaque Community Center for the wedding party, friends and relatives. The meal was catered by Roy's.

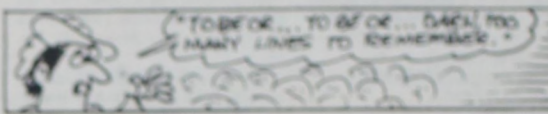

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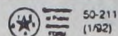

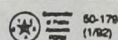

## Children Advised To "Play It Cool"

Children should "play it cool" on hot, summer days.

Too much summer fun can result in dehydration, so parents should make sure their children have plenty to drink before sending them outdoors, says a scientist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"Once they become dehydrated, a single drink will not instantly replenish their body's need for water. It is important that parents 'tank up' children before they be-

come preoccupied with play and ignore that parched throat," said Dr. Rob Shulman, an associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Dehydration is a condition where the body's water loss exceeds intake. The body depends on a consistent water content for healthy functioning of cells and tissue.

Parents should watch for symptoms including lethargy, nausea, complaints of dizziness, confusion, severe thirst, a dry mouth or de-

creased urination. In infants, one of the first signs of dehydration is a consistently dry diaper.

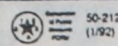
Children normally drink at least six 8-ounce glasses a day. The amount of liquid children need during the summer depends on the

climate, how long they are outdoors, and the degree of activity.

Although the body needs water to keep from drying out, an array of drinks can complement nature's ultimate refreshment.

"Most juices make ideal thirst quenchers and safeguard the body's water supply as well," said Janice Staff, CNRC nutritionist.

Staff does not recommend drinks that contain high levels of caffeine such as ice tea, a Southern favorite, and some soft drinks. Caffeine is a diuretic, so instead of replenishing the water, it can promote dehydration.

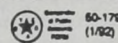

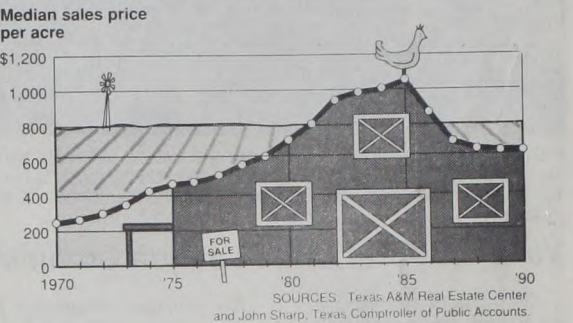
