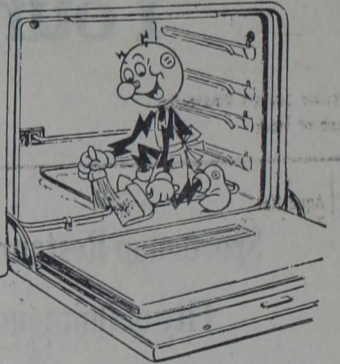

Shirttail Sermon

"These (men) that have turned the world upside down." Acts 17-6. There are several truths brought to light by a study of this Scripture.

First, the world is the wrong side up. A brief look at the world around us supports this statement. Evil seems to reign at every level of society and government. The evil, the sordid, the wrong dominates the headline of every form of communication. The good, the deserving, the uplifting elements seldom are noted and then they are relegated to the back pages as fillers in otherwise empty space.

Second, the world must be turned right side up. This is not natural. It is never good or natural when evil is held up to attention

at the expense of good. So the world needs to be set aright. There should be a true turn about in the thinking of men. So long as men are in error in their thinking, just that long evil will reign. When men's minds are set on the good, evil will be put down.

Third, we are just the ones to do the job. "We" refers to the Christians of the world. We have at our disposal a force that cannot be resisted or defeated. That force is the power of humble, fervent prayer. If the Christians of the world were united in prayer as the force are organized, the change that would result would be the most spectacular event since the birth of Jesus, the Christ in the stable in Bethlehem.

This is precisely the force that Jesus Christ would exercise over men. He would not control them by threats but by their own willing dedication of their whole lives to His cause.

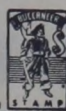
