Patriots Crush Motley County

The Valley Patriots had a chance to try anything that came to mind Friday night in their effort against Motley County. They started off passing, running, defense, you name it, as they cruised to a 39-6 victory over Motley County. The Patriots hosted the Matadors.

The Patriots are 7-1 overall and 4-0 in district play. They had 247 yards passing with all of them by Kirk Saul, who connected on eight of eleven Friday night. The team rushed for 182 yards, and limited the Matadors to only 102 yards total offense.

Three Valley receivers had at least 57 yards in pass reception, and Matt Barrett took 78 on three catches. Shon Phelps gained 66 yards on three catches, and Eric Scoggins made two recep-

tions for 57 yards.

Barrett scored on a 31-yard reception, while Phelps had TD receptions of 57 and 10 yards.

Tim Clardy ran seven yards for the first TD and Rosendo Silva kicked the PAT. Will Williams took the ball in from one yard out and Silva kicked the PAT. Kirk Saul connected with Matt Barrett on a 31-yard pass and the kick failed. The quarter ended with the score 20-0 in the Patriots' favor.

In the second quarter, neither team scored.

In the third period, Shon Phelps received a 34-yard pass from Saul and the kick by Silva was good.

Tim Clardy ran 12 yards for another TD and the kick failed.

The third quarter ended with Valley leading 33-0.

The Matadors decided to come alive in the last period and made their only score of the night on a run by Cody Christian. The extra point try failed.

Shon Phelps capped Valley's scoring on a 10-yard pass from Brandon Smith. The kick failed, and the final 39-6 score was made.

Coach Giddens said, "The young men played well again Friday night. I was proud we concentrated on Motley and were not looking ahead. Now we must concentrate on Aspermont. They are undefeated. If we can upset them, we will win the zone championship. It will take a supreme effort by every player we have."

The varsity goes to Aspermont for the game Friday night and kickoff time is 7:30. All fans are urged to be there to cheer the boys to victory.

The Superintendent's Corner

The recent visit to Valley School by the Texas Education Agency accreditation monitors left us feeling real good about ourselves in some ways and a bit disappointed in others. Although the audit pointed to certain deficiencies which they termed "concerns," we choose at the present time to enjoy what we believe to be an admirable rating. A number of favorable opinions were voiced by the monitors and the foremost commendable item involved the members of the faculty.

The monitors visited with almost every teacher in school and in some cases frequented classrooms. One of the findings coming out of the two-day visit confirmed that Valley is blessed with a lot of fine teachers. It was evident that the teachers are doing a good job and it is nice to be appreciated.

It is time again for the school to verify the income information which was submitted on all applications for free or reduced-price lunches. This is an annual required practice which serves to make sure that only eligible children receive free school lunches. To verify income, certain households will be selected at random and informed of the types of information needed to verify income.

The school would like to announce its appreciation to those parents who check from time to time on how well their children are doing in school. Knowing that parents care means a lot to the student and teacher.

The four weeks of October was the period of time in which the Average Daily Attendance for the year was determined. School enrollment was up compared to a year ago and the attendance was very good.

The highest enrollment at any point this year has been 327 students with kindergarten being the largest class with 29 members. The senior class is the smallest with 20 members, followed by grades one, four and seven with 23 members each. At the end of the six weeks period just ending, there were five grades having 27 members or more. Those grades were the kindergarten, second, ninth, tenth and eleventh.

The six weeks reporting period showed an amazing overall total of 98.03 percent attendance.

According to school attendance records, this is the best. The fifth grade had the best percent of attendance with 99.59 while the kindergarten was lowest with a very good 96.32. That is great for kindergarten. Other grades with excellent attendance were grade two with 99.0, grade twelve with 99.11, and grades three, seven, eight and nine were above the 98 percent range. Combined, there was an average of less than one student per grade absent each day and the senior class had a total of only five absences the whole six weeks period.

We at Valley are very proud of the attendance report. Parents and students are to be congratulated!

The kindergarten was learning about the letter "F" last week. In concentrating on things which begin with F, the class took field trips to a farm and to see a fire engine. Then on Friday, Mr. Cecil Purcell came to school with his fiddle and played for the class. Sounded like a fun week.

We just received word that Ron Eudy, a 1976 graduate of Valley, successfully completed his attorney bar exam. Ron has been attending law school at The University of Texas and passing the bar exam is a tremendous milestone in his career. Ron and Kim will remain in Austin where Ron will practice law and Kim is employed by an accounting firm. Congratulations!

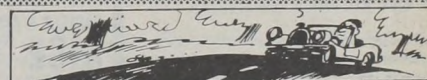

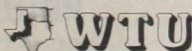
