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The basketball season, as far as the girls teams, has been in full swing at Valley but the editor has failed to get any stas on any of the games.



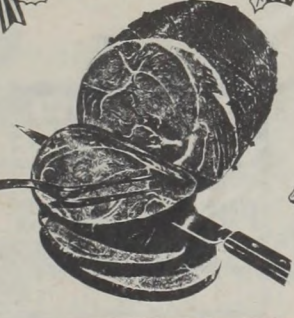

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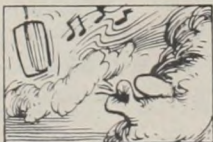

THE SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

There was a 50 percent decline in certified teachers produced in Texas between 1973 and 1981—from 15,623 to about 7,500. The Texas Education Agency projects an annual shortfall of 4,340 for the rest of the decade, with particular shortages in math, science, vocational education, bilingual education, and special education. It has been reported that only 20 new math teachers graduated in Texas in 1982, and 13 of those went into other fields.

Most professional groups, business groups, some teacher groups and strong elements of the Governor's Select Committee on Education are supporting alternate ways for qualified but noncertified people to enter the teaching profession. It is evident that college schools of education are not attracting many of the bright potential math and science students to the teaching profession. There will be continued strong efforts made to bypass the current procedures in order to acquire needed teachers.

Valley School is more fortunate than most schools in that it is staffed with outstanding certified math teachers in both junior high and high school. Pat Maupin teaches six hours of math each day in high school and Ruth Ann Scrivner teaches five hours of junior high math along with one computer literacy course.

The school has just acquired five additional instructional computers. That brings the total to ten Commodore 64's. There has been some expressed interest in the school sponsoring an adult computer class. This may be a possibility sometime next semester.

There have been a number of rule changes for basketball this year. One rule which fans may notice throughout the season has to do with the number of timeouts allowed. Each team now will be allowed two times-out each half with no cumulation. Previously, a team was given five and a coach could save all five until he chose to use them at anytime during the game. Nor may a team call two times-out back to back.
