The community of Turkey is now tuning, cleaning and polishing up the place in preparation for this year's event, which will take place on Saturday, April 24. Another large crowd is expected for this Bob Wills Day as Mrs. Wills plans to come to Turkey several days in advance of the big day, bringing a lot of Bob's memorabilia, such as items of clothing, some of his old fiddles, awards he received, records,

a large portrait, and other items which will be placed in the Bob Wills Museum which is now being put together in a portion of the building which houses the Turkey City Offices. Mrs. Wills has said that many of Bob's keepsakes are on display in museums throughout the country from the West Coast, Washington, D. C., Nashville, Tennessee, in Oklahoma and Texas. They are on loan, however, and Mrs. Wills said that many of these items are going to be placed in the Turkey Museum, for Bob stated to her one time when he was speaking of Turkey and calling it his home town, that he wished that all of his items of this sort were or could be placed at

Turkey. In addition to Mrs. Wills, the old Texas Playboys will be on hand to play for the people and also for a dance Saturday night. Al Strickland, the old piano player for the band, will introduce his book which tells of his days with the band. Dr. Townsend of West Texas State, who also has gained a lot of recognition for his writings on Bob Wills, will have his new book for sale. There will be the opening parade on Saturday morning, a noon barbecue, the Arts and Crafts Show, a fiddlers contest and then the program presented by the band. There will be something for everyone. The Bob Wills Day Queen Contest for 1976 will be held Saturday, April 17, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Bob Wills Community Center. The old Turkey High School auditorium is being remodeled and the event will be staged there.

Mrs. Neil Guest is in charge of the contest this year.

The committee is inviting high school girls from all over the area to enter the contest.

Anyone who desires can sponsor a contestant for the event. Sponsors must pay a \$10.00 entry fee for the contestant and that is

all the sponsor is required to do. The contestant must furnish her own costumes. She will be required to wear western clothing and a formal dress.

Mrs. Lura Elmore Meacham, 83, died Tuesday, April 6, at a hospital in Borger. Funeral services were conducted at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday at the First United Methodist Church in Turkey with the Rev. James Wilborn, pastor, and the Rev. Roy Patterson, a retired Methodist minister, officiating. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery by Seigler Funeral Home.

Mrs. Meacham was the first child born in Hall County. Her husband, Joe, died in 1951.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

Surviving are one son, Jessie Lee of Albuquerque, New Mexico; two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Ware of Turkey and Mrs. Marion Summers of Pampa; two grandchildren whom she reared in her home, Mrs. Doyle Purcell and Joe Barton Meacham; two brothers, Homer and Luke Lane, both of Turkey; two sisters, Mrs. Goldie Russell and Mrs. Mabel Christian, both of Turkey; nine grandchildren; five great-grandchildren, and three great-great-grandchildren.
