## NOTICE-Missing Barricades

During the past two weeks, someone removed the barricades that were placed on the south end of the road that runs in front of Cottonwood Lake west of Quitauque.

These barricades were placed there for public safety. Anyone found to be removing, or interfering with these or other barricades in the future will be prosecuted in accordance with VCS Art. 6674u-1. "No person may damage, remove, deface, carry away or interfere or tamper with a barricade after the device has been set out by a contractor or by the state or a political subdivision of the state.

A person who violates a provision of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$1000.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than two years or both.

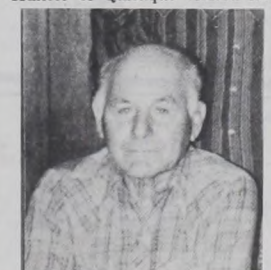

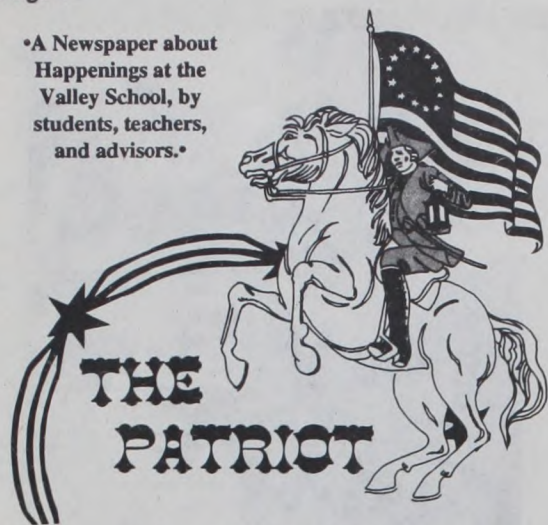

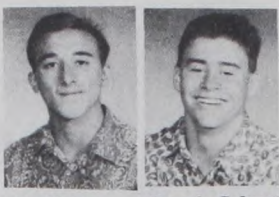
