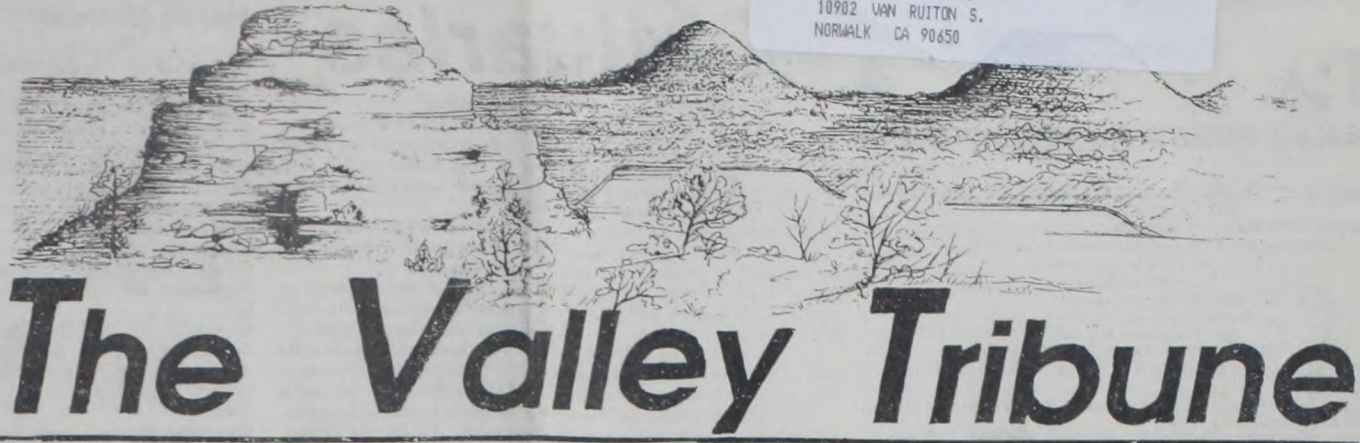

Public Meeting Held in Turkey

The city of Turkey held a public meeting last Tuesday, September 8, at the City Hall. This meeting was held in regard to the submission of an application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for a Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) Grant. This was the first of two public meetings to be held in regard to applying for a grant. If the grant is acquired, it can be used for new water lines and water pumps as the main priority. It can also be used for water tower repairs, if needed, street paving and repairs, landfill expenses, housing projects, etc. The consensus of opinions of citizens present favored a grant for water lines and new pumps. Jaime Johnson, an engineer from Wellington, who has done the work on previous projects that grants have permitted, was present to furnish new information on the new regulations concerning grants. The second meeting will be held Friday, September 18, at 2:00 p.m. at the City Hall in Turkey. All concerned citizens are urged to attend.

Bike-A-Thon To Benefit St. Jude's

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital announced today that Judy Barrett will serve as coordinator for the Quitauque "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon with October 3, 1992 as the date of the event. The Bike-Thon will be held from 9-11 a.m. with registration beginning at 8:30 a.m. St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, which was founded in 1962 by the late entertainer, Danny Thomas, is America's largest childhood cancer research, treatment and education center. The Memphis based hospital has a local impact because it freely provides area doctors and hospitals with assistance in diagnosis and the latest information for treatments and procedures. The non-sectarian hospital currently follows over 4,500 active patients. Because treatment is provided to all patients regardless of their family's ability to pay, it costs St. Jude Hospital over \$215,000 per day to keep its doors open. These funds come primarily from public donations. This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Ryan Martin of Waxhaw, NC. Ryan was diagnosed in June 1986 with a Wilms' tumor on his left kidney. The kidney was removed and Ryan was given 6 months of chemotherapy at St. Jude. When he was 2 1/2, he developed a Wilms' tumor on his right kidney. Ryan again received chemotherapy and his doctor discovered during surgery that nothing remained of the tumor but scar tissue. Today, Ryan is cancer free and only has annual check-ups.

Plastic bags reduce waste. Makers of plastic bags now use one-third less plastic in their products than in 1976, so the bags take up less room in disposal.

Plastic bags are recyclable. More than half of the nation's 31,000 supermarkets now offer collection and recycling programs for plastic bags.

Josh Suggins had a blocked punt and covered it in the end zone for a TD. Alie Clardy scored on a 14-yard run and also made an extra point kick.

Following close to the Colorado River they witnessed some kayaks and rafts fighting the rapid waters going upstream.

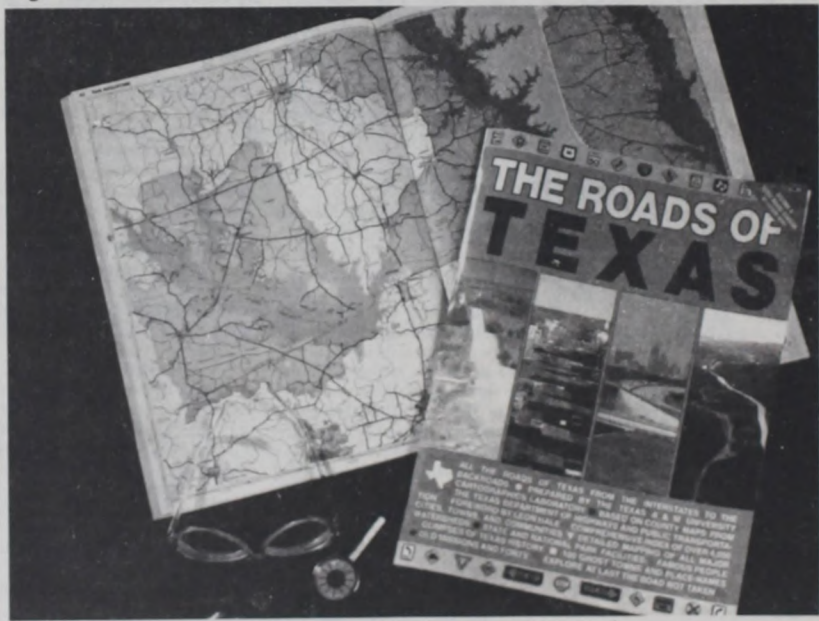

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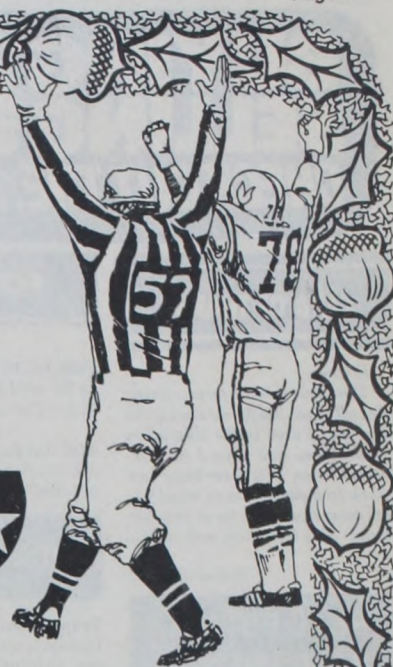

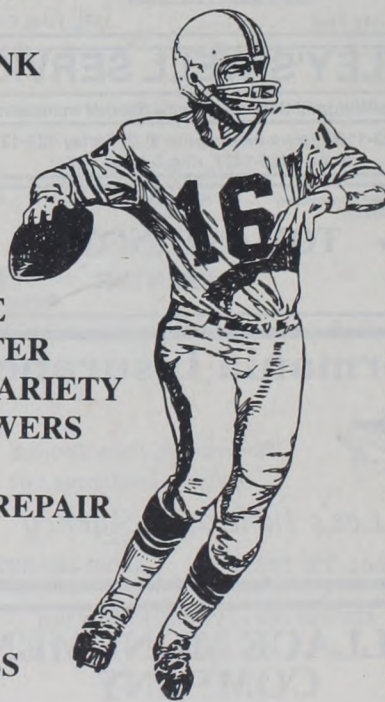
