**Water Facts**

Did you know that 50% of the United States population relies on groundwater for drinking water? Many people think of groundwater as streams, rivers or lakes that occur under the ground. For the most part, groundwater does not exist as an underground pool, but rather as subsurface water filling the spaces between the particles of sand, soil or rock. Groundwater that is capable of yielding water to springs or wells at a rate sufficient to serve as a practical source of water is called an aquifer.

Conservation is a key word to consider, when one thinks about water. 65% of the home water use is divided between: toilet use, bathing, laundry, cleaning, drinking, teeth brushing and cooking. 30% of household water use goes to the lawn and garden. **Seniors, Target For Scams**

Older Americans are increasingly the favorite targets of scammers using the U.S. mail and interstate telephone lines to pitch crooked investment schemes, warn Postal Inspectors. One convicted con man referred to his senior victims as "Woopies" (well off older people!)

Inspectors cite numerous cases worked from coast to coast that repeat a familiar pattern. Investors/victims bankroll the scammers' high rolling lifestyle rather than earning the promised high returns on their investments. A northeast "financial planner" filched over \$5 million from 40 victims, including elderly members of his own family. He was arrested for mail fraud after causing his clients to obtain second mortgages or re-finance existing mortgages to invest their cash in "muni-unit trusts," an investment vehicle unknown to legitimate brokers. Victims who now cannot meet mortgage payments are receiving foreclosure notices. Inspectors tracked this crook down in Venezuela and had him returned to the United States to face charges.

A midwestern savings club operator was indicted in Chicago for defrauding over 623 individuals of more than \$13 million. The savings club plan offered unique incentives to its members--the more cash they invested, the higher rate of return they were promised. Over half the investors were seniors and many lost their life savings. A San-Diego based telemarketer was charged with mail fraud after bilking 600 investors of \$7 million through the sale of an "equity plus metals purchase program." The scheme offered unwary investors fraudulent contracts in silver, gold platinum and palladium. Unfortunately, the only precious metals found in this case were in the pockets of the crooks.

**Horse Judging Team Places**

The biggest investment scheme of this year was indicted in Harrisburg, PA. Thirty-four Toronto-based gemstone telemarketers and ten Canadian firms were charged with mail fraud and wire fraud in connection with a scheme to sell vastly overpriced gemstones to thousands of stateside victims, many of them seniors. Their loss? Over \$35 million.

Postal Inspectors have this advice for potential investors:

- (1) Be wary of high pressure sales tactics, promises of high investments returns and minimal risks.
- (2) Take the time to check out the reputation of the offeror by contacting state and federal regulatory agencies.
- (3) Seek advise before investing from trusted friend or family member and seek professional counsel.
- (4) Remember, when it comes to making sound investment decisions, nothing returns more on your investment than doing your homework before you part with your cash.

## Sharp Says Welfare Intended As Temporary Aid Measure

"Public assistance in Texas, as in most other states, is like a treadmill with no 'off switch,'" State Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Welfare was intended to be a temporary measure to help people who are in a financial crisis get back on their feet. But too many people are forced to remain on welfare because they are unable to get solid footing in a job or decent housing. Welfare regulations discourage self-reliance and encourage long term dependence, and this has got to stop," Sharp said.

"We must find ways to ensure that welfare assistance is transitional and does not become a way of life. This means helping families find jobs and earn a living wage, encouraging parental responsibility and reducing adult illiteracy. It means taking a tough look at the current system and admitting that some parts of it don't work," he said.

According to recent surveys, eight of every ten Americans believe the welfare system is badly flawed. The most frequent criticism is that the system fails to move people off the welfare rolls and into jobs.

Other concerns include welfare fraud, inequities in benefits and rewarding out-of-wedlock births.

Even recipients complain about public assistance, saying the system leaves them isolated, frustrated and humiliated.

With this month's implementation of the Lone Star Card, Texas has taken a major step toward solving two problems: food stamp fraud and client inconvenience.

The Lone Star Card is a plastic debit card which permits welfare recipients to deduct food purchases and AFDC allotments directly from their benefits account.

With its expansion to statewide by January of 1996, food stamps will no longer be traded for cash or used to buy illegal drugs and almost anything else you can buy with cash. "Food stamp benefits will be used to feed hungry families—period," Sharp said.

Sharp added, "we still face the enormous challenge of reforming the welfare system itself."

Forty-eight of the states are actively pursuing welfare reform, as diverse as the states themselves: to encourage work by reducing penalties on earnings; enforce parental responsibility, particularly child support; change rules that penalize two-parent families; simplify the delivery of benefits; create jobs for welfare recipients and improve access to health care and child care.

Three welfare reform initiatives are generating the most controversy: time limits on welfare benefits, denying additional benefits when welfare mothers give birth to more children and "cashing out" food stamps—providing cash or equivalent benefits instead of food stamps.

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### Mesquite and Mushrooms, Two of Texas' Many Forest Products

What do books, ice cream, plastic, Japanese mushrooms and some soups have in common? They're among the thousands of everyday items that have their beginnings in trees.

According to the Texas Forest Service, about 14 percent of Texas—an area the size of Indiana—is forested. These timberlands support a \$6 billion wood products industry. Forest products industries employ about 60,000 Texans, and roughly 5 percent of all economic activity in the state is related to wood products. That means there's a wooden nickel in every dollar we spend.

Of the 43 timber-producing counties in East Texas Pine Woods, wood-based manufacturing is the largest manufacturing industry in 17 Texas forest based companies to make a variety of products. Some, like lumber, paper, plywood and furniture, have obvious origins in the forest.

But the origins of others aren't as easily recognized. Printing inks, plastics and some chemicals are made from base wood materials. And wood pulp is a major component of rayon, a fiber found in clothes and tires.

When it comes to questions about wood and wood uses, the forest service's Forest Products Laboratory offers a clearinghouse of answers. Laboratory head Dewayne Weldon and his staff answer 100-150 requests for information about wood products each month. More than half of those calls are from individuals, the rest from forest product companies, Weldon said.

Some Texans want information about the proper stains and paints to use. Others need to know about fire retardant treatments for wood

shingles. Quite a few want to grow mushrooms—Shiitake mushrooms to be exact.

"It's like gardening, but instead of using soil, you're using hardwood logs," Weldon said.

Many callers want to find out how to grow the Japanese mushrooms—which retail for \$10-\$12 per pound—for their own tables.

The lab's technical assistance to industrial clients includes moisture content analysis of wood and treatment information for products like shingles. Among other duties, the lab staff helps develop building code guidelines, Weldon said. One lab success story is a burgeoning \$20 million mesquite wood industry. Weldon said that just a few years ago, landowners who wanted to get rid of mesquite trees had to pay up to \$200 per acre to have them cleared. Thanks to a growing demand for crafts, flooring, furniture and cooking wood, the message today is different.

"Don't pay somebody to destroy it," Weldon said. "There's a valuable crop out there to harvest."

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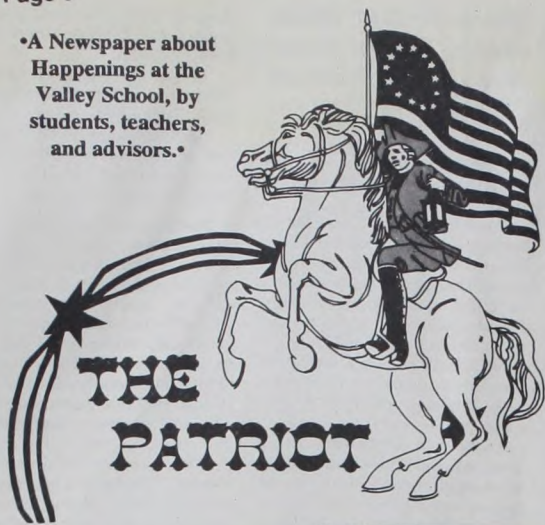

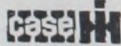
