Immunizations Clinics For September

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) are to be held in September.

The Texas Department of Health charges for the shots according to the family size, income, and the ability to pay.

Shots will be given in Memphis at Hall County Court House at the Texas Department of Health office on September 10 from 9-12 and 1-4 p.m., at Tulia in the Texas Department of Health Office, 310 West Broadway, Room 115 on September 11 from 9-11:30 and 1-3:30 p.m. and also on September 18 and 25; at Childress at the Texas Department of Health Office at 201 Commerce Street on September 12 from 9-11 and 1-3 p.m.; at Clarendon at the Texas Department of Health Office on the 2nd floor, 300 S. Sully on September 10 from 9-12 and 1-3 p.m. and at Valley Consolidated School on September 18 from 10 to 11 a.m.

County Farmers Reminded That They Must Comply With Program

Herbie Marchbanks, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, reminds Hall County farmers to control weeds on cropland removed from production by the 1991 acreage reduction programs.

Approximately 13,334 acres of Hall County cropland was diverted to the ACR and other conserving uses.

"Once adequate conservation protection has been established on the land to prevent wind and water erosion, maintenance measures must begin," said Mr. Marchbanks. "Farmers cannot neglect the acreage and allow it to grow into weeds or to become a harboring place for insects and rodents." The ACR and CU for payment acres must be cared for in accordance with the program contract, he said.

Under the contract, producers are required to control weeds, insects and rodents on cropland

A Wind Stripcropping System

Wind stripcropping is an inexpensive method to help control wind erosion on cultivated lands.

Interspersing rows of Plains Bluestem or Weeping Lovegrass with rows of spring planted crops serves as an effective wind barrier for young seedlings during high velocity months, and, if planned and applied according to SCS guidelines, the system will meet the Conservation Compliance Provision of the Food Security Act of 1985.

Wind Stripcropping with perennial grass: gives comparable yields to an open-field system, enhances the growth of the crop, reduces sand fighting, poses no pest problems, poses no weed problems, and needs minimal fertilizing.

A wind stripcropping system helps save soil moisture, topsoil, and seedlings at a cost of about \$30.00 an actual acre planted to establish and a cost of about \$4.00 an actual acre planned to maintain.

Scientists at Texas Tech University College of Agricultural Science have completed a three-year study analyzing the agronomic and economic feasibility of wind stripcropping with high residue crops. The results of their study indicate that wind stripcropping is an efficient system for bringing erodible land to soil loss tolerance levels.

The scientists analyzed and evaluated the migration habits of insects in the wind stripped fields with encouraging results, noting only one minimal problem. During mild winters the perennial grass strips may serve as an overwintering spot for the cotton Boll Weevil. However, the majority of winters pose no problem, and should overwintering occur during a mild year, the grass strips can easily be shredded or chemically treated to remove the pest.

September Field Day Planned At Halfway

Research results which can help Briscoe County farmers make more effective use of water and other resources to control crop pests and hold down costs will be featured at the 82nd annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Halfway.

The program will be September 10 at the Experiment Station's High Plains Research Facility at Halfway. It is 14 miles west of Plainview on U. S. Hwy. 70. Tours will begin at 1 p.m. and end by 4 p.m.

Visitors will be transported by trailers to four major stops. One stop will feature work being done to control pests in corn, a major crop on the High Plains. Other stops will feature farming systems and weed control; chemigation, and developments in use of low-energy, precision-application (LEPA) irrigation.

Walking tours will be conducted in the research vineyard and the vegetable plots. The new Texas A&M System Computer Training and Education Center at the Halfway facility will be open and will demonstrate a variety of computer programs for home and farm management.

Home Economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will have a display on corn processing and products. Other displays will show new farm and research equipment.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, High Plains Research Foundation, Texas Forest Service, USDA-Agricultural Research Service and Texas Tech University.

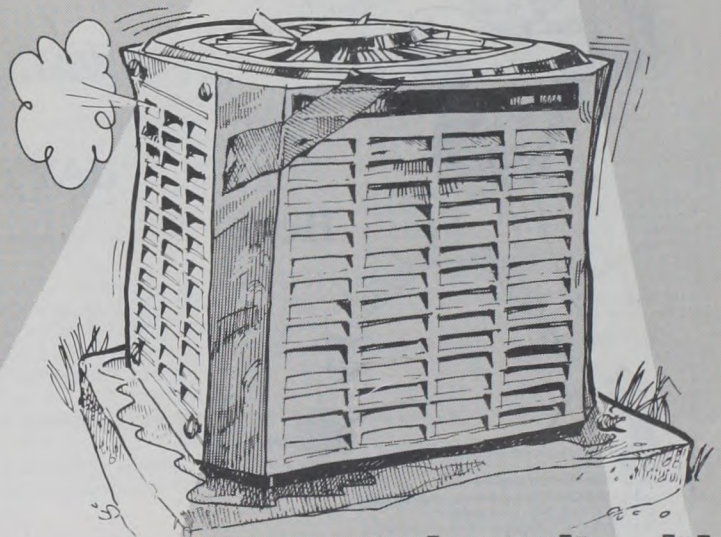

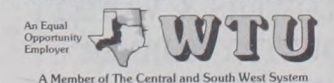

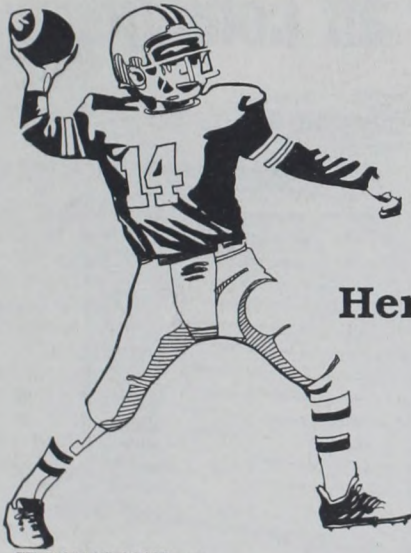
