JOHN FRANCIS IS TOP CONSERVATION FARMER

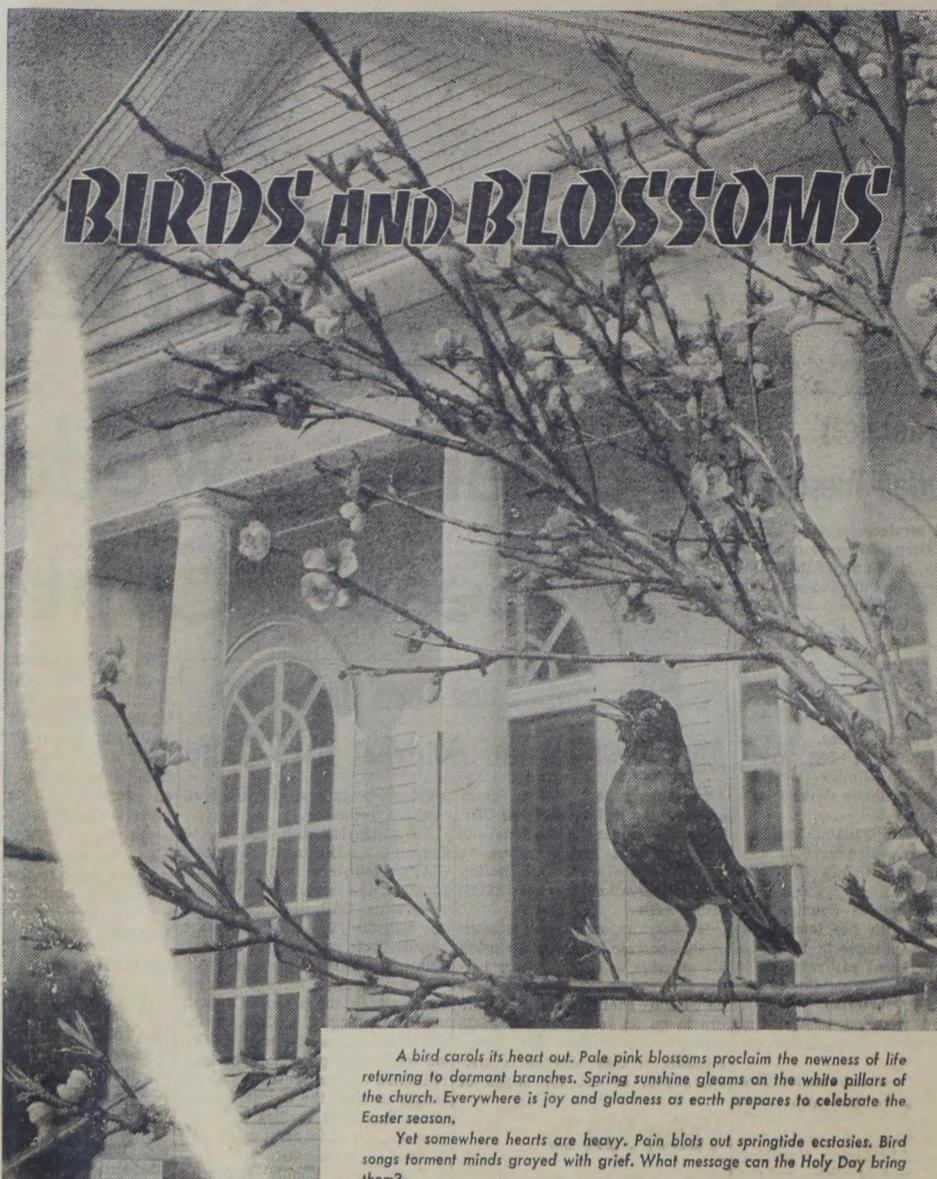
