Caprock Public Library To Have Grand Opening Sunday, May 17

The dream of having a public library for Quitaque will become a reality on Sunday, May 17, 1992 when Caprock Public Library will have its official Grand Opening.
On February 11, 1991 an eleven member steering committee met for the first time to see if the need for a library existed.
Kindergarten graduation will be held Thursday, May 21, 1992 in the Valley Cafetorium at 9:30 a.m.

After fifteen months of hard work, extensive research and a grant for \$14,650 for a core collection of books, Caprock Public Library does indeed exist.
The number of volumes available increases weekly. The collection includes three different sets of reference books, juvenile, fiction, non-fiction, books on cassette and magazines, currently totaling over 1500 volumes.
Librarian Arlene Hinkle and her corps of volunteers have done an outstanding job of getting the books catalogued and shelved.
Caprock Public Library has

one of the finest collections of material available in this area.
Everyone is encouraged to come by the library, Sunday afternoon from 2:30 to 3:30 to help celebrate a dream come true. At the Quitaque Community Center a reception will also be held during this time from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES SAVE MORE LIVES, DESPITE INCREASING DEMANDS

A commitment to professionalism, the spirit of volunteerism, and an emphasis on teamwork combine to provide Americans with the best emergency medical care in the world.

Nearly one out of three Americans will visit an emergency department this year. In fact the number of emergency department visits--an important measure of EMS utilization--continues to use drastically, from under 66 million visits in 1973 to more than 90 million in 1990, according to the American Hospital Association.

As a result of the development of accepted standards and guidelines, much like those that characterize other professions, citizens throughout the country

now benefit from the expertise of EMS providers that have been trained and certified in providing lifesaving care.

Individuals who are involved in EMS--whether career or volunteer--commit to anywhere from 40 to 1,000 hours of training initially, and years of continuing education, as part of their professional commitment as providers of quality patient care.

A highly skilled force of EMS providers is just one of the results of the standards and guidelines developed as a result of the EMSS Act. Similar guidelines contribute to advances in equipment, communication, and administration.

Approximately 60 percent of the more than 750,000 emergency medical providers in the United States are volunteers. Volunteer EMS providers have exactly the same training and responsibilities of their career counterparts, and many communities are served exclusively by a volunteer EMS Service.

The regional approach to the development of EMS systems means that services can be adapted to serve the specific needs of the community. In the surrounding communities EMS is provided by volunteer services and work along with the area fire departments.

In addition to the personnel and equipment needed to provide pre-hospital care, the EMS system includes a communications system that allows for two-way communication between EMTs and the doctor on duty, dispatch, and public access. Hospital emergency departments and trauma centers are also part of the EMS system.

EMS is a system. It depends on cooperation to run smoothly. Just as the responsibility to support EMS is shared by federal, state, and local government, the responsibility for the life of the patient is shared by a team of dispatchers, first responders (EMTs, paramedics, firefighters, and police), emergency physicians and nurses.

This year, approximately one in three Americans will experience a medical emergency serious enough to require a visit to the emergency department. Many of them will require pre-hospital care as well. But few people think about the emergency care available in their communities until they have a need.

There have been many significant advances in emergency medical care over the past twenty years. Increasingly, however, our nations emergency health care system is facing serious challenges such as funding and manpower shortages.

As patients and as bystanders, the public has an obligation to know how and when to use the EMS system. By showing their support for EMS providers, the public can ensure that the EMS system remains strong.

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

For an informal review, contact the appraisal district staff at the courthouse or call 823-3161.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at the courthouse or write Briscoe C.A.D., Box 728, Silverton, TX 79257.

Note: you shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, TX 78746-6565.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.
