FRANK D. BARNHILL BURIED TUESDAY

Funeral services for Frank Doyle Barnhill, 66, of Canyon were conducted Tuesday at 10 a.m. in the Canyon Hills Church of Christ. Donald Lacy and Bob Wear, ministers, officiated.

Graveside services were at 3:00 p.m. that same day in Dreamland Cemetery at Turkey, with Jack Hutton, minister of the Turkey Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Home of Canyon.

Barnhill, a native of Crockett County, was pronounced dead at 8:22 p.m. Sunday on arrival at Palo Duro Hospital in Canyon following a short illness.

The former Turkey resident was president of Canyon Senior Citizens. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Church of Christ, and was a former faculty member at West Texas State University Training School.

Barnhill was on the original planning committee for Lubbock Christian College.

He married Margarite Shelton March 23, 1935, in Plainview.
