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Valley Receives Light To Heavy Rainfall



For the past two weeks and more this area has been enjoying cooler and cloudy weather, and on many of the days showers have fallen on some parts of the Valley.

One day last week up to two inches of rain fell in the Turkey area. Late Saturday afternoon, the rains fell again and this time in the Quitaque vicinity the moisture ranged from less than half an inch south of town to five inches and more west and northwest of town.

Gerald Smith reported that five

inches of rain fell at his place, where Cottonwood Lake is located. Some indication of the amount of rain that fell in a short time can be guessed from the photos of the road leading to Cottonwood Lake and the Jim Stroup ranch. Two 10' steel culverts spanned the road where the gaping washout is located about 200 yards off Highway 86.

The culverts are probably in the lake owned by Mrs. Ollie Nall a quarter to half a mile below the washed-out roadway. The editors drove out Sunday afternoon and snapped the photos of the road and the lake which is pictured. What appeared to be one of the culverts could be seen next to the dam along with a tremendous amount of dead trees and trash. Mrs. Nall, who says the lake suffered much damage from the heavy rain, has more water in it than ever before.

Mrs. Warren Payne, who lives just north of the highway above the washed-out road and Mrs. Nall's lake, hesitated when asked about the rainfall at their home. She said that when they checked their rain gauge after the rain they found it had overflowed, which indicated that it had rained more than seven inches and they didn't think it had rained that much.

Jim Stroup, who lives a mile or so south of Gerald Smith, reported that he had only 1 1/2 inches at his home and not that much all over his ranch.

Sunday afternoon the showers came again and this time the heavy fall was north of Quitaque, where it was reported that 6 inches fell at Lake Theo.

Just about everyone now has had some rain but there are still some spots in the Valley that could use some more.
