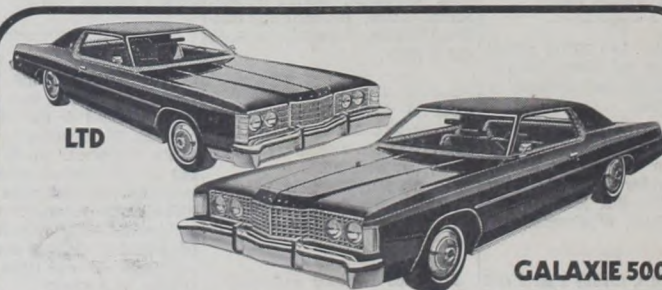

TECH TO OBSERVE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

The bells throughout the city of Lubbock were ringing August 8, 1923 when it was announced by Governor Pat Neff that Texas Tech University would be coming to Lubbock.

In recognition of the 50th Anniversary of this outstanding event, the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with Texas Tech University will be re-enacting this historical event starting at 11:00 a.m., August 8, 1973. Citizens from Lubbock and all surrounding communities are invited to attend.

According to A. C. Verner, President of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, the ceremonies will be held in the vicinity of the Ex-Students Association building on the Tech campus.

Features of the program will include music by the old-time community band, remarks by Dr. Grover E. Murray, Tech President, concerning the background and importance of the University to the Lubbock area and the reading of the original declaration of Governor Neff by former Governor Preston Smith. The bells will again be sounded on this occasion.

Special guests for the occasion will include college officials, Lubbock citizens and government leaders who were on hand at the original announcement.

Lubbock leaders have expressed the opinion that the decision to locate Texas Tech here was one of the greatest single factors in the fast and tremendous growth of

Lubbock from a small town of approximately 5,000 to a metropolitan city of over 150,000 with a booming economy.

The anniversary observance committee is composed of Preston Smith, chairman; Mrs. W. B. Blankenship; Arch Lamb, County Commissioner, and Jack E. Baker, City Councilman.

INTEGRATED CATTLE FEEDING

An integrated cattle feeding system could boost profits from \$9 to \$11 a head, according to a study by agricultural economists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Such a system, in which the whole process from the weaning age calf to slaughtering is pre-arranged, lowers marketing costs and cuts down on the transfers and resulting losses. The idea is to plan and organize for minimizing stress and time in the market channel.

COUNTY AGENTS TO MEET

The annual meeting of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association will be held August 5-7 at the Villa Capri Hotel in Austin. Highlight of the meeting will be an awards banquet at 7 p.m. August 7 during which six outstanding agricultural leaders in the state will be honored as "Men of the Year in Texas Agriculture." Seven county agricultural agents will also be recognized as recipients of the Distinguished Service Award, the highest award bestowed by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents. State Senator R. A. (Babe) Schwartz of Galveston will be the banquet speaker.

POLLUTION PERMIT

Livestock and poultry feeders with more than 1,000 animal units must now comply with water pollution control regulations established by the Environmental Protection Agency. The new regulations became effective July 5 and set up a water pollution control permit program for agriculture, according to an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Operations with less than 1,000 animals can also be regulated if they are believed to present a pollution problem.

GARDEN POOL

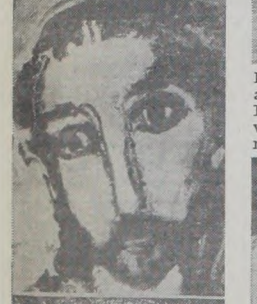

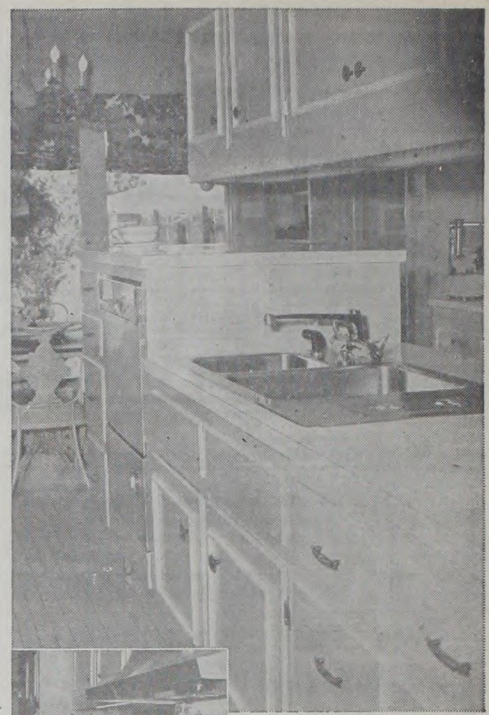
