Texas Land Heritage Enters 19th Year

The Texas Department of Agriculture will soon begin its 19th year of registration for the Family Land Heritage Program.

This program honors those families who have managed to preserve the tradition of agriculture and land stewardship for 100 years or more.

More than 2600 Texas farms and ranches have qualified for the Family Land Heritage program since 1974. To satisfy the program's guidelines, applicants must present supporting documents to the office of the County Judge for certification before mailing in the completed application.

Application forms are available at the County Judge's office. Final approval rests with the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The deadline for 1992 Family Land Heritage applications is August 21.
