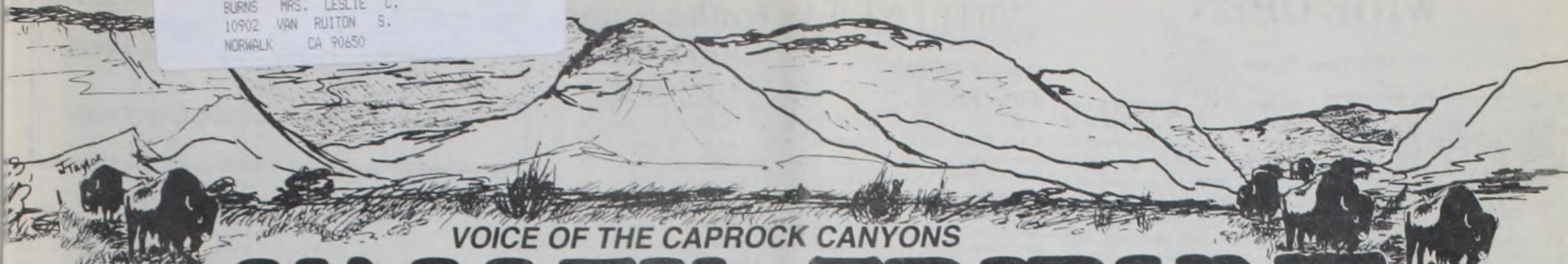

BEWARE SPRING STORMS Spring Is Here As Well As Storm Season... Watch The Clouds

 Spring is upon us once again, and so is the potential for violent weather. This weather can come in the form of thunderstorms, lightning, flooding, wind and tornadoes. The months of April, May and June are the predominant months for severe weather. This is a reminder for all citizens of Briscoe County. It is time to think about severe weather and prepare for it. It is only through planning that we can be prepared to deal with the weather and know what to do.

Below is the type of warnings from the National Weather Service.

- THUNDERSTORM WATCH**—Potential for thunderstorm to occur
 - THUNDERSTORM WARNING**—Severe thunderstorms are occurring. It is possible for a tornado to develop from a thunderstorm.
 - TORNADO WARNING**—A tornado has been detected. Take Shelter immediately.
 - TORNADO SAFETY TIPS:**
 - Homes**, take cover in the center of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom.
 - Shopping centers**, go to the interior room and halls on the lowest floor.
 - Office buildings**, go to the interior hallway or the lowest floor, or to a designated shelter area.
 - Schools**, every school has a prepared plan. Follow the plan to the hallway or to a designated shelter.
 - Automobiles**, leave your car and seek shelter in a near by building. If there is not any buildings, lie flat in a ditch or ravine. Never attempt to out run a tornado in your car.
 - Mobile homes** are venerable and should be evacuated. The best shelter is in a basement or cellar, or any structure underground.
- Please, make sure that you have some type of plan in case of severe weather. Rehearse and make sure that every member of the family knows what to do when severe weather occurs.

Immunization Clinics For May

Immunization Clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for May. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (haemophilus influenzae type b).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income, size, and the ability to pay.

Immunizations will be available at Talia at the Texas Department of Health Office at 219 E. 2nd Street on May 13, May 20, and May 27 from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Immunization will be available at Memphis at Memphis Middle School on May 14 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Immunization will be available at Quitaque at the Community Room of the First National Bank on May 19 from 2 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Immunization will be available at Clarendon at the Texas Department of Health Office Medical Center, Highway 70 North on May 19, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Applicants Needed

The Texas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified applicants to receive a Federal Grant to provide transportation for elderly and/or disabled persons. The program, known as Section 5310, provides funds to private, nonprofit organizations, public entities, and associations.

The program provides up to 80 percent of the cost for capital equipment such as buses, vans, and other paratransit vehicles used to transport elderly and/or disabled persons. Also included are the purchases of vehicles for service expansions, radio and communication equipment, wheel chair lifts and restraints, and vehicle rehabilitation. The funding is appropriated by the Federal Government under the Federal Transit Act.

Qualified projects will be selected for funding by TxDOT using quantitative measures such as coordination efforts, ability to meet service needs of elderly and/or disabled persons based on passenger trips per month, local match ability, hours of operation, ability to maintain equipment, average fleet mileage where applicable and average fleet age where applicable.

Matador Couple Killed April 30 In Grinding Crash

James "Chip" Smith, 50, and his wife Ellen Smith, 46, both of Matador, were killed Thursday, April 30, when their 1998 Saturn collided with a tractor-trailer rig at an intersection near Lubbock, according to Department of Public Safety reports.

The crash occurred when the Saturn, southbound on FM 400 entered FM 40 and slammed into an eastbound truck, reports said. Traffic is controlled by flashing red lights and a stop sign on FM400.

The Smiths died instantly. The truck driver suffered minor injuries and was treated at University Medical Center. Smith was a salesman and Mrs. Smith was an obstetrics nurse at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. Both were active in church programs and other spiritual activities. When they died, they were headed to a religious retreat with prisoners from the Montford Psychiatric/Medical Unit in Lubbock.

The couple has three children, 20-year old Jeremy, a student at Clarendon College, 18 year-old Scott, a high school senior, and 13-year old Rachel, an eighth grader, both at Matador.

The meaning of two words, when used together, really frighten me. They are discrimination and apathy. Using the meaning of those two words together—the German people permitted the Nazi government to practice the most horrendous crimes of man to mankind in modern history. I saw (to me) the practice of the former word and almost practiced the latter word myself at the Bob Wills Celebration in Turkey, Texas this year. I saw law enforcement officers arrest, seemingly without any regard for the rights, of some of the individuals and haul them into what I would describe as a "Kangaroo Court" and then levy some of the most outrageous fines I've ever heard about. There was no offer of legal council...that I know of...or any consideration for the rights of an individual that we as Americans (rightfully, I hope) have. Then, I began to practice the latter word...apathy. My words...I'll get out of here and I won't come back and anyone who does deserves what they do to him."

Upon leaving Turkey and traveling south towards home—I had a highway patrol turn around and follow me...close...for between one fourth and one half mile...his lights on dim...the brightest dim lights I've ever seen...trying to make me nervous enough to make a mistake so he could do his job and issue me a citation. I was lucky—I didn't make a mistake—I did get angry! Consequently—this letter—This is my interpretation of what I saw. I could be wrong—I don't think so. But I'm just one voice. If you think you saw something not right—speak up—write a letter to this paper. If we are right and enough speak up...we will force an investigation into this. If it is illegal as I think it is—it must be fixed—if we are wrong I would like an independent council to tell us so.

I am writing to you to comment on what I witnessed at last week's Bob Wills Day celebration.

First, I want you to know this was my 24th year in a row to be there. I was introduced to Bob Wills Day by members of some of Turkey's finest families (Eudy, Coker, Hamm). I have brought over 100 people to the festival over those years -- some from as far away as St. Joseph (Mo) Michigan, Cincinnati, and Phoenix. They have all bought T-shirts, posters, dance tickets, barbeque, ice, film, munchies, drinks, and gas, while there. I have done this EVERY year. I have an Otho Stubbs painting, and his book; I also have Robert Townsend's book which I bought there. I have Jody Nix tapes. I have Playboys tapes.

This was my last visit to Turkey. Last weekend, I was made to feel like an outright criminal. I came face to face with an Orwellian, Nor World Order, Multi-jurisdictional task force set out to break any and all arrest and citation records all in the name of "safety." Safety! I've been to the old folks area by the school every year for 24 years. There's as much drunkenness there as anywhere else in or out of town. My crime? Instead of celebrating Bob Wills Day with the old folks at the school, I chose the rodeo arena east of town with all those "horrible" college students. These students actually acted as good or better than when I started 24 years ago. We were pretty rowdy then too. Even the leading citizens I went there with from Tech. Thank goodness I did not get arrested. I am a regular of Dallas businessman who cannot afford an arrest record, no matter what the Mickey Mouse charge. I feel sorry for many who did. Those students that did will suffer economically forever because of what happened to them when they made the decision to travel to your area. If you run off all the young people like you have me, there will be no Bob Wills day in 10 years, when all the old folks die off.

Traffic Signs Vandalized

With the arrival of spring, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has noted an increase in traffic sign theft and vandalism.

Although the signs are quickly replaced, and no one has been injured due to missing or damaged signs, the costs associated with this crime are high. Damaged signs pose a danger to the traveling public, and the funds spent to replace them could be spent elsewhere.

Statewide, taxpayers spend more than \$8 million annually replacing signs damaged by natural disasters, accidents, and vandals.

Wood and metal signs cost approximately \$10 per square foot to produce. The costs to install replacement signs vary depending on the amount of time and equipment needed.

People are reminded that in Texas it is against the law to possess a sign without a permit, and the state does not sell signs or issue permits to possess them. In addition, if the loss to TxDOT is more than \$1,500, it is a felony. Motley and Hall Counties are in the TxDOT Childress district. Local Maintenance supervisor Douglas Campbell says "missing signs can endanger travelers."

Motorists are encouraged to write down the license plate number and contact their local law enforcement official if they see anyone tampering with a traffic sign.

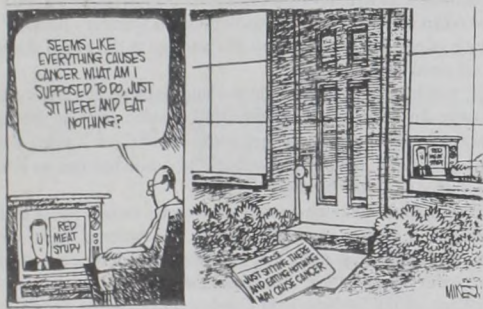

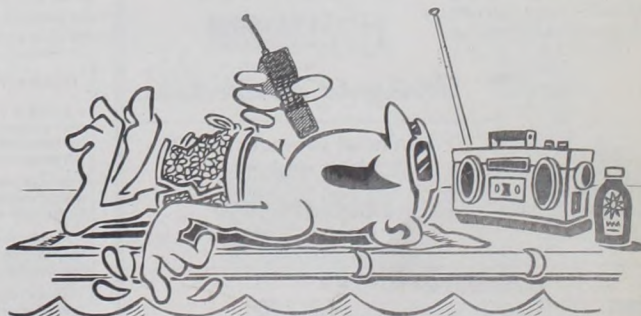

Manufacturers have found another use for a tree that's typically posed more of a nuisance than an asset in Texas and surrounding states. Mesquite now sports a new and improved image as flooring in weight-lifting platforms. Texas A&M strength coach Mike Clark says the team's new mesquite platform is both beautiful and durable.

He says noticeable notches are chewed out of the old plywood platform, but not out of the slick, polished new mesquite platform. The university intends to order another 20 mesquite platforms for the athletic training center. Marketers also hope to get other college and professional teams interested in mesquite platforms.

Mesquite manufacturer Doug Florence is pleased to hear his wood is holding up so well. He's among many ranchers looking to find a use for acres of mesquite trees that blanket their pastures. He's says he's tried making everything from furniture to golf clubs out of mesquite and he welcomes this new opportunity. Extension forest science marketing specialist Dr. Judd Michael says the platform maker was originally going to use another type of wood, but the Aggie athletic department convinced him to use native Texas mesquite. Coach Clark says the wood seems to have almost a launching pad effect for weightlifters. Manufacturers and ranchers hope this launches mesquite into another niche market.

Ann and U. F. Coker recently spent several days in Sabinal visiting their daughter Brenda, who coaches and teaches computers there.

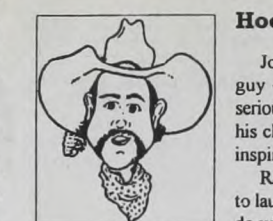

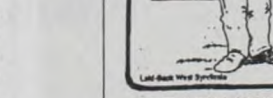

After three hours of formal art school training in a coffee shop in San Antonio, Rankin's intensive apprenticeship in caricature art, illustration and cowboy cartooning has taken him all over the world, participating in shows and entertaining people with the magic that flows from the tips of his pens.

Rankin has also done some humorous illustrations for *American Cowboy* and *Cowboy Sports and Entertainment* magazines. Rankin now resides in the Texas Hill Country with his wife Sandra, daughters Janni and Ammeke and his four-year-old son, David.

Be Water Smart When Planning Landscape

Water usage can triple during the summer as we take more showers, wash the car more often and water the lawn and plants more. But if you plan ahead, you can plant flowers, trees and grass that make better use of their water.

A concept called xeriscaping can help curb the demand for water. According to Extension Horticulturist Dr. Doug Welsh, it does not center around planting cactus; however it is quality landscaping that conserves water and protects the environment.

"The example I'll give is: It's as inappropriate to put cactus in Houston as it is azaleas in El Paso," Welsh said.

"We're trying to choose those plants that are adapted to the environment we live in. And if we do that in Texas particularly, if they can take the heat, take the strange winters that we have, take the drought conditions, take the soil conditions in many cases and take sometimes our very hard water, then we want to use them."

There are seven principals involved in xeriscaping, Welsh said. These are planning and design, soil analysis, appropriate plant selection, practical turf areas, looking at what the function of the turf is in the landscape, the use of mulches, efficient irrigation and appropriate maintenance such as lawn mowing and the management of insects and disease.

Texas is blessed with an abundance of beautiful native plants that are becoming more available in retail nurseries and garden centers. Welsh says you

should group the plants depending on their water requirements and set your irrigation system accordingly instead of watering the entire landscape every time.

"You can put the irrigation system accordingly so that you're watering turf grass separately from the perennials, so that you water them on different schedules," he said. Turf grass may be watered every other day during the middle of summer, but perennial flowers may need watering every three to four weeks, he explained.

"That way we become more efficient when it comes to landscape irrigation," he said.

A Sweet Wheat Deal Offered

This year's High Plains wheat grower is facing a mixed future. So far, the 1998 wheat crop is the best in years, possibly the best since 1973. Most analysts project a bumper crop in the Texas Panhandle. At the same time, wheat prices are at a four and a half year low. Wheat growers are pressuring the Department of Agriculture to get more aggressive with export guarantees, which they say would help sell more wheat to our overseas customers. But, so far, USDA is failing to move on that request. Unless something happens between now and harvest time, wheat farmers face a below cost-of-production market.

KGNC Radio has stepped in to help. It won't help all wheat growers, but KGNC Agri-business Director Bob Givens says, "This year, one lucky farmer, will be glad he's a wheat grower." KGNC, 710AM Radio, has started a \$7.10 a bushel Wheat Guarantee. From May 11 through June 17, wheat growers can register at various sponsor locations throughout the Panhandle and South Plains. June 18, KGNC will draw one name during the Noon Agri-business Hour and pay that winner the difference between \$7.10 per bushel and the Kansas City Board of Trade July Futures Settlement, as of the close of business on June 17th, for 500 bushels of wheat. Bob Givens says, "Based on this week's futures market, that would pay close to \$2,000 to the winner." He adds, "The contest is just like farming. We don't know if the market will go up or down between now and June 17th, but, just like a Risk Management Plan, the winner will be guaranteed \$7.10 come June 18th.
