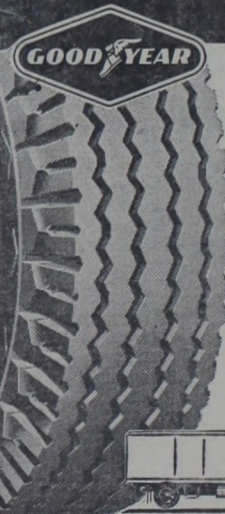

Shirttail Sermon

"Is the Bible an adequate guide for the space age?" This question is asked quite often today.

The answer is a firm "Yes, the Bible is adequate for the space age." For that matter, the Bible is an adequate guide for any age through which man might pass. It has been found to be adequate for every age up to this time and there is no reason to doubt that it is adequate for this and any future age.

It is adequate for two reasons. First, it is concerned with man's relationship with God. It contains stories of romance, mystery, conflict, faith, and any other relationship that men might become involved in, but under the surface of every story there is a moral: Man must enjoy a right relationship with God. His love for woman must be holy love. The greatest mystery of all is: Why does God regard man who is so sinful and unworthy of His notice? His conflict must be with the forces of evil. His faith must rest in God alone.

The second reason for the adequacy of the Bible is that it is also concerned with man's relationship with man. Jesus Christ rated this as being equal in importance to the first concern. This is still important because man's nature has not changed one iota since Adam first drew the breath of life. Love, hate, greed, lust, envy, jealousy cruelty and other driving forces have made men do the things they have done. They still drive men. They will continue to drive men until men become perfect. When that happens, love will drive men and the Scriptures will be fulfilled. Until then, men will resort to the Bible for guidance in every situation and the Bible will be adequate to their needs.

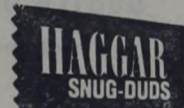

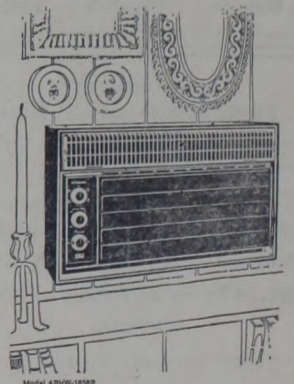

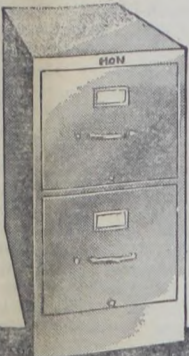
