Local Farmers And Ranchers Workshop On Options Marketing Set

A workshop, titled "Marketing For Tomorrow, Today: Trading the Options Market", will be held on Thursday, February 9th at the Quitaque Community Center. The workshop will begin at 5 p.m. with refreshments provided by the Paymaster Gin—Quitaque.

The workshop is designed to introduce farmers and ranchers to the fundamentals of trading ag commodities on the options market. Topics to be discussed include: *What Are Options and The Futures Market?*; *Benefits of Forward Pricing*; and *How to Get Started Trading Options?*. The workshop will be conducted by Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Economist—Lubbock, with support materials and equipment furnished by DTN Marketing.

With the growing uncertainty regarding U. S. agriculture and

price-support programs, there is a big demand for producers to learn about the futures market and the benefits of trading options. Based on the success of this meeting, future workshops will be held to assist producers in the utilization of options as a risk management tool. Producers interested in learning more about options and how to incorporate them into their current farm operation are encouraged to attend the workshop.

The Briscoe County Stock Show was the scene of a full day of activities, Saturday, January 28, 1995 at the County Show Barn in Silvertown. The 1995 show included 225 prospect hog, market hog entries, steer, dairy heifer, beef heifer, and lamb entries that were exhibited by Valley FFA, Silvertown, FFA and Briscoe County 4-H members from the Valley and Silvertown Schools. The show day ended with a premium sale that set a new record of \$51,333 dollars.

The "Don Burson Memorial" award was presented to Krisse Pigg. Winner of the swine showmanship and also the beef cattle showmanship was P. J. Merrell. Brandi Price received the award for dairy showmanship. Matt Strange won the lamb showmanship. Michael Dawson of Plainview was the showmanship judge.

In the Lamb Show, Kassie Strange with her Light Weight Medium Wool lamb won Grand Champion while Matt Strange's Heavy Weight Fine Wool Cross lamb was Reserve Champion.

The Grand Champion Dairy Heifer, Bred, award went to B. J. Price. Reserve Champion Dairy Heifer, Open, went to Brandi Price.

Grand Champion Steer award was received by Leland Wood with his Middle Weight European Steer. Reserve Champion Steer was awarded to Leland Wood with his Medium Weight British Steer.

Ewing Vaughan

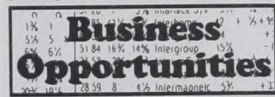

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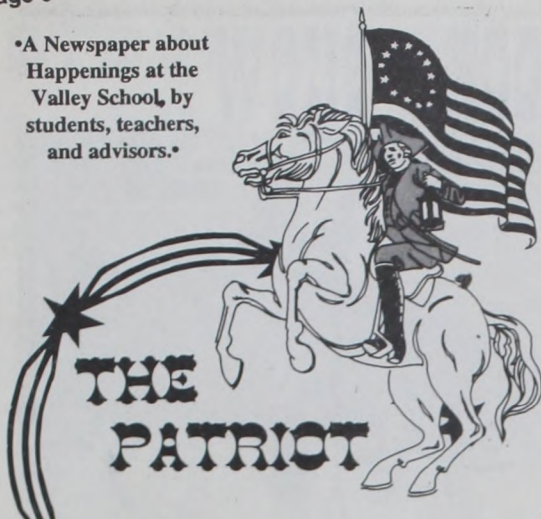

The emphasis of the Dietary Guidelines is to eat a variety of foods in order to get nutrients from a variety of foods, rather than from a few highly fortified foods or supplements.

The new Food Guide Pyramid has been designated to help us eat a variety of foods from each of the 5 basic food groups. The recommended daily servings from each food group are: Bread, Cereal, Rice and Pasta—6 to 11; Vegetable—3 to 5; Fruit—2 to 4; Milk, Yogurt and Cheese—2 to 3; Meat, Fish, Poultry, Dry Beans and Nuts—2 to 3; and Fats, Sweets and Oils—sparingly. Rita and Tracy Guest traveled to Amarillo last Monday. Tracy had a checkup on her knee and received a good report.

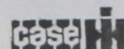
