Violet Storm Hit Turkey Late Sunday Afternoon

It was a good thing that no rain fell with the storm, as the store would have been flooded from the broken skylight.

A storm, thought to be a small twister, hit the town of Turkey about 4:30 Sunday afternoon, causing much damage to roofs, electric poles, plate glass windows and trees. It came out of the northwest, stirring up huge amounts of dust and debris.

A light pole was broken off south of the Paymaster Gin and also one behind the West Texas Utilities building and the Valley Tribune office, which had a radio antenna attached to it.

The plate glass storm door at Two J's China & Gifts was broken and had to be boarded up temporarily, also plate glass at Beth's Beauty Shop and a vacant building next door.

Extensive damage was done to the roof of the now-vacant Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Yard storage building. Huge portions of the north side of the roof were blown off, two large chunks landed in the back yard of the Tony Galvan, jr. place.

Large limbs of the cottonwood trees west of the Gulf Station were broken off and strewn on the highway, and many in the park. It was also reported that some damage was done to the garage doors at Vera Guest's home. The roof of a small barn at Mutt Holland's blew off and landed by the side of the house, cutting the phone and electric lines.
