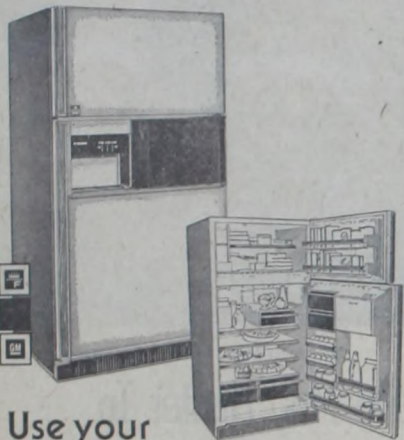

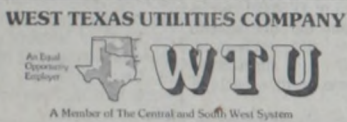

**ASCS Will Register Beef Producers June 6 Through 17**

The Bristow County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office will register beef producers June 6-17 to vote on the beef research and information order. Beef producers who fail to register cannot vote in the July referendum.

If over half of registered producers vote in the referendum and two-thirds of those voting approve the order, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a beef board, composed of not more than 80 beef producers, from names submitted by producer organizations. The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the ASCS county office to mail registration cards.

All persons who produced beef during calendar 1976 are eligible to register. This includes feedlot operators as well as dairymen. Each production entity—such as a family, partnership, or corporation—is entitled to one vote. A 4-H or FFA member may register, provided he or she produced beef independent of the family operation.

From June 6 through 17, the ASCS county office will daily post a list of producers registered to vote in a conspicuous place. A final list will be posted June 22. Anyone may challenge the eligibility of any producer listed. James Griffin, ASCS Bristow County

Congressman Jack Hightower announced that an early morning meeting with United States Special Representatives for Trade Negotiations, Bob Strauss clearly revealed the United States is heading for increasing agricultural exports. In the meeting with a Congressional delegation made up of Hightower, George Malton, and Bob Kruger of Texas and Ron Marlowe of Montana, Strauss reported that he has had two discussions in the last months with officials in the Japanese government in regard to beef exports. President Carter and Prime Minister Takao Fukuda discussed the beef export problem when the Japanese Premier visited Washington recently. Strauss indicated he has also discussed the matter with the Japanese Vice-Premier for agriculture.

Currently the United States has about 12 percent of the beef import market in Japan. Our 1976 trade deficit with Japan is in the neighborhood of five billion dollars. United States beef can be shipped to Japan and sold for a profit at the price level of \$3.38 per pound. While the Japanese consumer pays around \$18 to \$15 per pound. Presently Japanese import quotas prevent more American beef from being sold in that country. Strauss expects bilateral discussions to begin in late summer or early fall.

The Special Trade Negotiator restated his commitment that in all trade negotiations conducted in the future, agricultural considerations will be treated on a par with industrial needs. This is in direct contrast with the procedures in the past.

A prime example of the past policy was the Kennedy rounds when agriculture was taken up at the conclusion of the talks after all other issues had been resolved. Both Strauss and the Congressional Delegation agreed that this consideration alone will make a significant difference.

Congressman Hightower expressed the concern of many Congressmen from agricultural areas when he stated "depressed beef markets for the past three years and grain prices that are dropping every day has put our agricultural economy in a depressed state that desperately needs a boost. The export market can and should be that boost to both the producer and the taxpayer."

**To Attend Farm Electrification Meet**

More than 100 Future Farmers of America members and leaders will attend Southwestern Public Service Company's 10th annual Farm Electrification Workshop to be held June 12, 14, 15 at the Episcopal Conference Center in Amarillo.

The FFA members, who come from Texas and New Mexico, will be competing for five trips to the National FFA Convention at Kansas City. Thirteen hours of Executive Director, will resolve challenges.

**Asked To Focus On Important Legislation**

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman has called on the 65th Legislature to focus its attention on three important pieces of state legislation which are important to agriculture before lawmakers rush to their final adjournment just days away.

The three legislative matters which Naman labeled as "deserving of immediate action due to their important effects on farmers" are the issue of school finance, property-taxation of open-space land based on its agricultural productivity and the Family

**Large Hailstones Needed By Tech Engineers**

"Hail falling? Don't let it melt. We need hailstones, golfball-size or larger only, individually wrapped and fresh frozen."

Texas Tech University industrial engineers are requesting small-sized fresh hailstones to be used in a study of hail damage to solar mirrors.

If you have some hailstones the engineers can pick up. Dr. Milton L. Smith of the Industrial Engineering Department urges you to call or write him. Call collect at (900) 742-3494, or write Dr. Smith at the department, College of Engineering, Texas Tech University, 7968.

A part of the Texas Tech solar energy research project at Crosbyton, the hail damage study requires golfball-size or larger hailstones. A Smith said, "the larger the better."

Smith and associates Dr. Joseph E. Minor and Lynn Beason, both in the Civil Engineering Department, will fire the hailstones from an air gun at sample solar mirror glass.

"We can fire the hailstones at the approximate velocity with which they would fall in a hail storm," Smith said.

"For example, a two-and-a-half-inch hailstone would fall at the speed of about 150 miles per hour. Smaller hail of course would fall at slower speeds. We can duplicate these conditions."

The researchers will then assess the damage caused by the artificial hail storm. Later they will try to devise means to reduce hail damage to constantly exposed solar mirrors.

"Glass windows are ordinarily vertical, but solar collectors form a concave dish at times horizontal, or almost so, to the sky, and thus more exposed to hail storms."

Results of the research will be helpful to scientists studying the feasibility of locating a solar-powered electricity plant at Crosbyton or anywhere else. Also, individual solar-energy homes with roof collectors will benefit from the weather-oriented information, Smith said.

The engineer outlined how to collect the hailstones.

"The hailstones must be collected soon after they fall and before they begin to melt. It is desirable to wrap each stone separately, preferably in wax paper, and then place them all in plastic bags and immediately into a freezer."

"We cannot use a block of ice formed from hailstones."

Instruction is offered in each of three subjects, Farm Motors, Farm Wiring and Electric Controls. Two students from the wiring and motor courses and one from the controls course are selected as outstanding and receive the trip to Kansas City for their accomplishment. Each student who finishes the course he is enrolled in is awarded a certificate. Alternates are selected in each course in the event the winner is unable to attend the convention.

Heading the staff of instructors at the workshop are Ken Pollard, Texas A & M Agricultural Engineering Department, Electric Controls, Bobby Browning, Texline, Farm Wiring; Truman Kidwell, Childress, Farm Wiring; Frank Kennedy, Vega, Farm Motors; and Jay Eady, Turkey, Farm Motors.

The program for the conference was coordinated by Walter Lohay, Area I Vocational Agriculture Supervisor, and Sam Thomas, Southwestern Public Service Company's Agriculture Development Manager. Glenn Bickel SPS Power Sales Engineer, will moderate the general sessions.

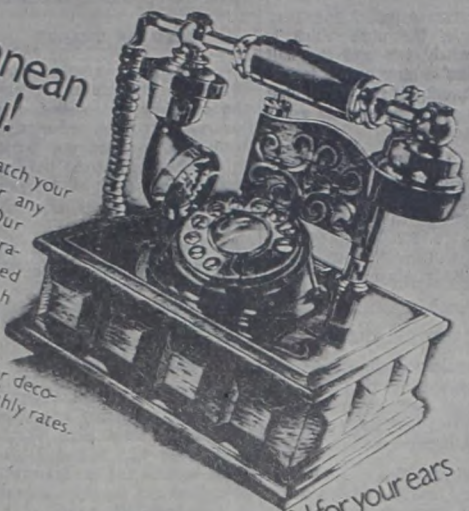
The Scouts meet each Tuesday evening at the Scout building. Any boy 11 or older is welcome to join. The troop is planning a number of activities for this summer.
