GTE Experiences Fiber Cable Cut

GTE experienced a major long distance fiber cable cut near Hedley, Texas at 2:45 p.m., Tuesday, April 5, 1994. Durwood Wilkinson, Brownwood district manager, stated the cut affected all incoming and outgoing long distance service to over 4,000 customers in Memphis and twelve other towns serviced from Memphis. Towns affected were Memphis, Silverton, Groom, Dodson, Lakeview, Quitaque, Claude, Estelline, Hedley, Panhandle, Turkey, Clarendon and Wellington.

After the cut was located, GTE dispatched equipment and manpower immediately. The severity of the damage to the fiber cable prevented normal emergency restoration from working and required special fusion splicing equipment to be brought in to repair the cable. Additionally the fiber cut was in the bottom of a sandy creek where repair had to be made in knee deep water and backhoe digging equipment had to be used to remove collapsing sand from the work area. These conditions caused major delays in re-establishing the toll circuits.

This outage affected only the customers ability to place or receive long distance calls. Local service within the towns was not affected. GTE employees using mobile radio and cellular phones assisted local medical agencies with several emergency long-distance calls.

"GTE wishes to apologize for any inconvenience to its customers and to again stress the importance to all individuals who dig in road Right of Ways to contact the 1-800-483-1000 'Call Before You Dig' number before doing any work in a Right of Way," said Wilkinson.

Service to the area was restored by 3:13 a.m. Wednesday, April 6, 1994.

Last Chance to File Annual Report

When I was in school, I sometimes put off doing homework assignments until the last minute. And I still procrastinate at times.

If you are anything like me, and if you worked and have received at least one Social Security benefit check in 1993, you may have delayed reporting your 1993 earnings to Social Security. On April 15, the report is due. If you don't file your earnings report on time, you risk losing one full month's benefits and you may be required to repay any resulting overpayment that you receive.

If you were under 65 in 1993, you must report earnings that exceeded the 1993 earnings limit of \$7,680. If you were 65 or over, but not yet 70 in 1993, you must report earnings that exceeded the \$10,560 earning limit. If you were 70 or older, you don't need to report your earnings to Social Security. For Social Security purposes, only wages and/or net earnings from self-employment count as "earnings."

The report should also include an estimate of the earnings you expect to make in 1994. Note that the earnings limits for 1994 are \$8,040 for beneficiaries under 65 and \$11,160 for beneficiaries age 65-69. Your benefit check will be adjusted to reflect any excess earnings anticipated.

And remember: filing a Federal tax return does not relieve you of your responsibility to report your annual earnings to Social Security.

Small birds must eat proportional to their body weight more than large ones do, because their bodies use up energy faster. Small birds require so much food that they may spend most of their time eating, while large birds may go for several days without food.

Upon completion of this course, participants will be eligible for a 10% discount on their liability insurance or dismissal of a traffic violation. All dismissals of traffic violations must be approved by the appropriate Justice of Peace.

StateWide Screening Program Offered

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that requires all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems.

This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection.

Spinal screening for Valley School school children has been scheduled to begin on Tuesday, April 19, 1994.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is an exaggerated rounding of the spine. Progression of these two conditions can often be arrested if detected early.

Weather Seminar At Memphis

HEALTH SCREENING CLINIC SPONSORED BY DO GOODERS CLUB

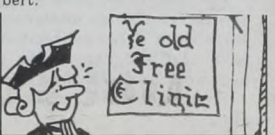

Legacy of The Famous Wills

James Robert Wills was born March 6, 1905, in Kosse, Limestone County, Texas. At the age of 8, his family moved to Hall County. Since that time Bob has always called Turkey home and his roots are firmly planted here. Bob played for his first dance at the age of 10. As a youngster, he played for many of the ranch dances in the area. Wills didn't play "fiddle music," it was fiddle music with a beat of blues and the swing of jazz, thus earning the title of "King of Western Swing."

The birth of Bob's band, "The Light Crust Doughboys" occurred in Fort Worth.

Wills' recording of "San Antonio Rose" carried his popularity from the Southwest to a national level. At the height of the Texas Playboys popularity, Will and his musicians appeared in 26 movies.

During Bob's more than 50 years in music making, he received considerable recognition as "The King of Western Swing." In 1968, he was elected to "The

Hunter "Scores" At Midland High

Bulldog senior soccer star Ross Hunter scores on the playing field and in the classroom.

Things sure are convenient for members of the Midland High boys soccer team. When they need help on the playing field, they can go to senior captain Ross Hunter. When they need help in the classroom they can go to senior captain Ross Hunter.

Hunter's 17 goals and clutch play this season have helped push Midland High to a 16-1 record and the state playoffs against Burkburnett Monday. His No. 2 academic ranking among MHS seniors and honors classes enrollment put him in a position to help his teammates decipher schoolwork.

"We look for Ross in everything," Bulldogs' stopper and junior captain Likey Miller said. "He can basically help you in everything educationwise and soccerwise. He's taking all honor classes. I'm just taking one and it's a burden."

On the field, Hunter shows a different kind of versatility. MHS coach Tom Esikhathi said he has played the senior at forward, midfield and defense in Hunter's three seasons. This year the crack student developed into one of the most dangerous scoring threats in District 5-5A.

"He brings his leadership to the forefront every game," Bulldog senior goal keeper Brandon Lang said. "He's always the one to put in the big goal, to get us over the top in the close games. This year he's always come through."

As a forward last season, Hunter scored eight goals. Esikhathi said his quickness has allowed him to score often this

year even at a position-center midfielder-that doesn't normally account for much scoring.

"It's unbelievable these last two years he's improved so much," Lang said. "I've grown up playing with him and his talent has risen to another level."

The Bulldogs have plenty of leadership with 16 seniors on the team. Hunter reacts modestly to his own designation as a leader.

One reason the Midland High midfielder scores so much is the Bulldog offense, which he said attacks from the outside and then looks to "cut it into the top of the box and that's where I hang around."

"This year, everytime I step out on the field it seems I can score," Hunter said. "I'm a little more aggressive than I was my sophomore and junior years. Last season Midland High lost to El Paso Hanks, and eventual state finalist, in the sectional round of the playoffs, 4-1. The team went 6-6 in district when Hunter was a sophomore."

Esikhathi said Hunter has been a big part of that rise in Midland High's capabilities. And he believes Hunter has the talent to play collegiate soccer. But the Bulldog honor student wants only to play recreational soccer after this season.

"I've had a lot of (college) offers, but personally, I've played soccer for 13 years and there comes a time when you have to put up the boots," Hunter said.

And there's always that academic thing he can fall back on.
