Criswell will be leading in a year of great mission and revival emphasis as Baptist Churches of Latin American, Negro, Anglo Conventions will be participating in the "Crusade of the Americas" reaching from the tip of South America to the Northern part of Alaska and Canada."

ADMINISTRATION TO KEEP AREAS

Agency leaders representing 18 states will attend. Mr. Cappelman said that the Farmers Home Administration will loan about \$1.3 billion during the coming year to create jobs in rural America, improve rural housing, strengthen family farms, develop needed rural community facilities.

"The main drive in all Farmers Home Administration programs is to strengthen the economy of rural America, to make it a place that will attract rather than repel people," Mr. Cappelman said. He estimates that 4 million people would benefit from the services of the Farmers Home Administration in fiscal 1969.

The Farmers Home Administration through 1,600 county offices located in rural areas in all states provides development credit accompanied by management aid. Funds advanced by the agency are used to help low-income rural families obtain needed resources and raise their incomes, and to help disadvantaged rural communities obtain modern community facilities.

As of December 31, 1967, the agency reported losses of less than one percent on funds advanced through current programs. Loans outstanding total \$4.2 billion.

TULIA PUBLISHER WRITES CONCERNING PLIGHT OF SMALL TOWNS EVERYWHERE

H. M. Baggary, publisher of the Tulia Herald and one of the top

newsmen and columnists in the country, writes about many subjects concerning the state of our country, as well as other nations. Several months ago Mr. Baggary wrote concerning the troubles of small towns and what must be done to stay alive, economically speaking. We believe this is a good time to run his editorial. It was as follows:

Top financial story last week was the devaluation of the British pound. First time we recall considering the relationship of a British pound to a U.S. dollar, we were told that a pound was worth about \$4.85. A week ago Saturday the value of a British pound dropped from \$2.80 to \$2.40.

Britain has for many years been spending far more abroad than she has been selling abroad. Because of this year - in, year - out deficit in her balance of payments, there has been an almost constant drain of her holdings of gold and such hard currencies as the U. S. Dollar.

Strange as it may seem, Britain is in the same fix that many small towns, such as those surrounding Dallas . . . and Amarillo are in.

What is the source of this money or wealth, it does not come from taking a dollar out of one pocket and putting it into another. If we take a Herald dollar and spent it in a local store, nothing has happened. The wealth of the community remains the same. We have one less dollar and some Tulia merchant has one more. However, it did help to give employment to a clerk.

There are two ways to increase the community's wealth. If we grow a bushel of wheat or build a bird house and sell it to an Amarillo resident, the profit we made on the transaction hikes the wealth of the community by that much.

Or, if an Amarillo resident comes to Tulia and spends a dollar while he is here, the profit one of us made on that Amarilloan is added to the community's wealth.

On the other hand, we can decrease the community's wealth in two ways. If we buy a bushel of wheat which was grown elsewhere or if we go out of town and spend a dollar, we have decreased our community wealth.

Wealth is constantly coming to and leaving Tulia. Wealth comes into the community whenever we grow food or fiber which we sell outside the county, when we manufacture something which is sold outside the county, or when someone from out of town spends some money with a Tulia merchant.

Money leaves the county when we 'import' items for sale such as automobiles, groceries, television sets, clothing, items that have been manufactured or grown elsewhere, and when we spend money out of town.

Only when we are able to export as much or more than we import do we increase our wealth and grow.

Quite obviously, we have no con-

rol over much of the money that leaves the community. If we are to buy a new automobile, we must buy one that has been manufactured elsewhere; consequently, at least the wholesale price of the car goes to Michigan. We have no opportunity to purchase a Tulia - built automobile. We have two ways of increasing our community's wealth: (1) We can increase our agriculture income, or we can introduce industry into the community. (2) We can keep a dollar at home by spending it here instead of out of town.

One of the reasons Amarillo is larger than Tulia is that more Tulia dollars are spent in Amarillo than there are Amarillo dollars spent in Tulia.

Now if it were possible for Tulia to "devalue" her dollars, it would mean that a dollar would buy more in Tulia than it would in Amarillo, thus Tulians would be inclined to spend more money at home and Amarilloans might come to Tulia.

Some of the negative factors in Tulia's economy are: School teachers who earn their living here but commute from out of town, thus spending Tulia dollars for rent or taxes in another community; Christmas shopping in other communities; buying an automobile out - of - town; patronizing an out of town physician, dentist, or optometrist; financing a home with an out - of - town loan company; buying shoes in Amarillo; buying printing or office supplies from out - of - town salesmen; buying ads on basketball schedules printed in Pampa.

The nationalist in the home refuses to face reality just as he also refuses to face reality as a citizen.

The patriot loves his country in spite of her faults.

The patriot is loyal to his country, but sees it in perspective—one of many nations in a community where each has its privileges and responsibilities. The nationalist sees his country as cock of the barnyard, a believer in the principle that "might makes right."

Adolf Hitler was a nationalist, not a patriot.

So is a John Bircher.

In our efforts to discover what is right concerning Viet Nam, the race issue, the draft, the war on poverty, a tax hike, and a thousand other issues that we must face from day to day do we note the influence of self-interest on our decision?

Do we find that those who have decided we should not be in Viet Nam are invariably (1) those of draft age, or (2) parents of sons of draft age?

Do we find that persons quite hawkish in the case of Korea, when their sons were perhaps two or three years old, have become quite dovish, now that these sons are 20 or 21?

Do we find that those most affluent are quite unsympathetic towards the poor on poverty?

Do we find that those drawing social security payments are favorable to hikes in social security payments.

Do we find that invariably people think that the fairest of all

taxes is that which hits hardest the other fellow?

Do we find that those most bitter towards civil rights legislation are those who have always had their civil rights respected?

Do we find that those most opposed to the farmer's receiving his fair share of the economic dollar are those who buy food and fiber in their various forms, not those who have food and fiber for sale?

Do we find that man who makes his living exclusively by feeding cattle opposes high feed prices, while the grower of feed favors high feed prices?

Do we find that the aged, childless individual generally opposes new school construction?

Do we find that labor wants high wages and short hours, while management wants low wages and long hours?

Do we find that non-property owner favors the ad valorem tax while the property owner favors a sales tax?

Do we find that the rich man wants a low income tax and a high sales tax, while the poor man thinks the fairest tax of all is the high income tax and no sales tax?

The point is too few people want fairness and justice, too many want advantage.

The housewife wants a BARGAIN! To heck with the merchant who may have taken a beating in order to offer that bargain.

She wants to trade in Amarillo to heck with the hometown merchant.

The labor wants sky - high wages - let management worry about paying them.

Business wants to show a greater profit every year, let the laborer get by the best way he can.

If Jesus Christ were here on earth and invoked absolute justice, we wonder how many earthlings would cry "unfair deal."

How would Jesus Christ handle the war in Viet Nam to the satisfaction of those who want to "fight Communism" anywhere and everywhere in the world - and those who believe that the United States is incapable of successfully policing the world; those who believe that evil must never go unchallenged - and those who insist that every person and nation must be free to live its own life regardless?

How would He please both the cultured and affluent Negro who wants to enjoy the good life on a par with his white counterpart - and Governor Wallace.

How would He be able to convince General Motors and the UAW that each was receiving a fair share of the dollar.

Somewhere there is justice. There is a fair wage. There is a fair price for a bushel

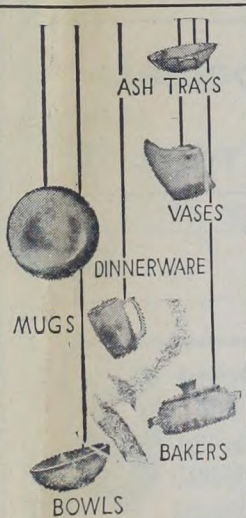
