## Health Fair In Quitaque

On Saturday, October 21, 1995 a Health Fair will once again be held at the First National Bank in Quitaque. The Fair is free to one and all and will open the doors at 11 a.m. and close at 3 p.m.

Among the booths that will be open that day are the Briscoe County Clinic which will be taking anyone's blood pressure. The American Cancer Society will have an exhibit on skin cancer and its causes and cures. PRPC's booth will have information on emergency 9-1-1.

## Emergency Farm Loan Applications being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rains, winds and a tornado, which occurred on June 8, 1995 are being accepted at the Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) office located in Tulia, RECD County Supervisor Ross W. James said today.

Briscoe County is one of 8 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive rains, winds and a tornado, which occurred on June 8, 1995.

Ross W. James said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an RECD emergency loan," Ross W. James said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until April 26, 1996 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ross W. James said.

## Tammie Rice Critically Injured

Miss Tammie Rice, 19, of Dickens was critically injured in a one car accident between Lorenzo and Ralls on Monday, October 9, 1995. Miss Rice ran off the left side of the road and hit a tree in the medium. She received a serious head injury, a broken second vertebra in her neck and her heart was bruised.

Paramedics arrived on the scene in time to start her heart to beating and rushed her to a Trauma Unit in Lubbock. Miss Rice has shown no brain activity since the accident. A passenger in the car was thrown clear of the car and escaped with lesser injuries, but he, too, was transported to Lubbock for care.

Tammie is the daughter of Renay Rice and Connie Brummett Rice of Dickens. She is the granddaughter of Allen and Christine Brummett of Quitaque.

## EPA Grants Extension For Small Landfills

U. S. Rep. Mac Thornberry announced today that the Environmental Protection Agency has granted a two-year extension for small municipal solid waste landfills to comply with expensive design and ground-water monitoring requirements. The Congressman had asked the EPA for such an extension in a March 22, 1995, letter to EPA Administrator Carol Browner.

"The EPA's decision is good news for several landfill owners and operators in the 13th District, who have been wondering whether they will get relief from these bureaucratic regulations," Thornberry said. "Even with the delay, the EPA could still decide to make small landfills comply with the same expensive 'one size fits all' standards that would be illogical and unfair."

EPA's action means that small municipal solid waste landfills (MSWLFs) in arid areas such as the Texas High Plains have until October 9, 1997, to comply with regulations on ground-water monitoring and design. The EPA also is formally studying the feasibility of allowing MSWLFs to adopt site-specific alternatives to the ground-water monitoring and design regulations. The agency is accepting public comment on site-specific alternatives until Nov. 7, 1995 and expects to decide by October 1996.

"I would urge the EPA to move rapidly to assure landfill owners and operators that they will not be required to invest in ground water monitoring equipment that is clearly not needed in a region where runoff is not a problem," Thornberry said.

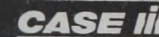

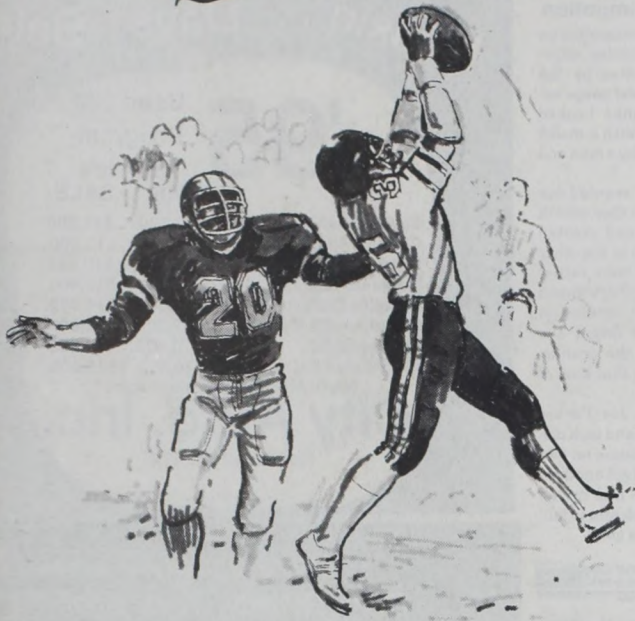

The big electric motor which the West Texas gin uses for power burned out and had to be taken to Lubbock for repairs.
