Quitaque Ambulance Service Updates Method of Dispatching

Emergency No.
455-1444

The Quitaque Ambulance Service recently improved and updated its method of dispatching emergency personnel to the scene of both medical emergencies and fires. In addition to the present emergency telephone outreach, a pager-repeater system was installed. This new addition consists of a repeater station, an auxiliary telephone interconnect, 20 tone and voice pagers, two walkie-talkies with

remote telephone capabilities as well as a mobile unit for each ambulance.

All messages should reach Emergency Medical Technicians, drivers, rescue personnel and firemen within a 20-mile radius of Quitaque, enabling them to respond more quickly.

Procedure for reporting an emergency HAS NOT CHANGED and the ambulance or fire department will still be accessed by dialing 455-1444.

Guidelines for reporting emergencies:

1. Give the exact location of patient or fire.
2. Clearly state patient's name.
3. Describe patient's reason for calling.
4. Remain on the line for any additional questions or instructions.

Briscoe County Herbicide Regulations in Effect Now

The Texas Department of Agriculture would like to remind those persons wishing to apply hormone-type herbicides in Briscoe County, that the Herbicide Regulations adopted by the Briscoe County Commissioners, became effective April 25.

The special provisions of the herbicide regulations for Briscoe County state as follows:

1. The aerial application of any regulated herbicide is prohibited in Briscoe County from April 25 through October 1, except in Precinct 2 where aerial application of regulated herbicides is prohibited for the period beginning May 10 and ending October 15 each year.
2. The aerial application for brush control may be permitted under the direct personal supervision of the Texas Department of Agriculture.
3. The ground application of regulated herbicides is banned except for dicamba (BANVEL) products, with permits obtained prior to the application.
4. In Briscoe County Precinct 2, the application of 2,4-DB is

permitted for ground application only, with permits obtained prior to the application.

Hormone-type herbicides that are regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law include 2,4-D, MCPA, dicamba (BANVEL) and derivatives or formulations containing these substances.

A permit must be obtained from the Texas Department of Agriculture prior to any aerial application for brush control, any ground application of dicamba or any ground application of 2,4-DB. A permit fee of ten cents per acre will be charged for each permit. Permits expire when the acreage for which the permit was granted has been sprayed, or after 180 days. If a person does not spray a total of more than 10 acres during any one year, permits or permit fees are not required, but that person must give notice to the Texas Department of Agriculture of the application.

Commercial applicators should remember that equipment used to apply hormone-type herbicides must be inspected by the Texas Department of Agriculture before the equipment is to

Wheat Field Day Slated Today

The annual Wheat Field Day at the USDA Research Laboratory at Bushland will be held today (Thursday, May 22), according to Dirk Aaron, County Extension Agent. Tours and exhibits will be available starting at 1:00 p.m.

Visitors taking tours will see irrigated and dryland small grain varieties and hybrids, cropping systems, no- and reduced-tillage systems, water conservation practices and terraces systems. The Russian Wheat Aphid and other pests will be discussed. Activities will be coordinated by Dr. Kenneth Porter, TAES Small Breeder at Bushland.

The event will be sponsored by the USDA Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Texas Wheat Producers Association. For more information contact the County Extension Office, 823-2343.

Starkey Selected as SHS Principal

Slaton School trustees unanimously named Slaton High School Assistant Principal James Starkey to replace departing Principal Kurtis "Fritz" Leifeste.

The school board met Tuesday afternoon to review the proposed satellite teaching program but finished out their meeting with several personnel matters including formally accepting Leifeste's resignation. Leifeste, who has been in the Slaton system two years, has accepted the superintendent's position in Southland.

The 42-year-old Starkey joined the Slaton School last year in the number two spot at the high school.

School Superintendent Jerry Hogue told the board that when Starkey was hired it was with the understanding that Leifeste would probably leave for a superintendent's job in time and Starkey would probably become principal.

"It happened faster than we thought," Hogue said.

Hogue also said he wanted to speed the move forward because he also has several good applicants for the assistant principal's job and would not want to lose them to some other school system.

Starkey is a 20-year veteran of Texas education having graduated from Texas Tech University in 1966 and begun work that year in Smyer. In 1967 he joined the Plainview Schools as a teacher and tennis coach and advanced there to high school dean.

He also holds a masters in education from West Texas State

University.

Mr. Starkey is a Quitaque native, having attended Quitaque elementary schools and having attended Quitaque High School. His wife is the former Chlonez Woods.

Chandler Cousins' Reunion to Be Held This Weekend

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The Chandlers have been blessed with fourteen children,

all of them living. All were present at a family gathering about two months ago, and could not return for the wedding anniversary. The couple also has twenty-three grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

A short history of their married life was written in rhyme by their daughter, Mrs. Weldon (Inex) McBrayer of Lamesa, which just about tells the whole story, except for the unusual fact that even though they had a very large family, there were very few occasions when a doctor's services were needed. Von was called on from over a wide area to minister to ailing animals, as he was the veterinary for this and adjoining communities until ill health forced his retirement two years ago.

Following is the rhymed history:

It was down in Arkansas in 1902,
