HIGHWAY PATROL REPORT FOR MONTH OF MAY IN BRISCOE CO.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Briscoe during the month of May, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$3,030.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1969 shows a total of 13 accidents resulting in one person killed, six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$10,395.00.

From The County Agent's Desk

HORN FLY SEASON AT HAND

With warmer weather at hand, horn flies are once again menacing cattle throughout the Plains area. Livestockmen can keep pests

in check with an effective control program.

"Horn flies irritate cattle by piercing the skin and sucking blood." Fighting the flies drains an animal's energy and interferes with feeding resting. The flies usually attack in the backs of animals and when the air is cool they often rest on the base of the horns.

An animal may lose as much as half a pound a day during fly season. Milk production may be reduced as much as 20 percent.

"A number of materials give good control of the horn fly. Approved insecticides include Clodrin, coumaphos (Co-Ral), dioxathion (delnay) and toxaphene. The key to effective horn fly control is for cattle owners in a community to band together in a spraying program. Then less spraying of insecticides will be necessary during the season.

Insecticides can be applied in various ways and the method of application depends on the material used. Effective methods of application include spraying, dusting, dripping, dust bags, backrubbers and treated mineral or salt blocks. Livestock owners should read the manufacturer's recommendations before using a particular product.

Horn flies reproduce rapidly so herds must be checked regularly to determine the need for additional insecticide application. The flies complete their life cycle from egg

to adult in about two weeks. They resemble house flies but are only about half as large.

The females lay their eggs on fresh manure and these eggs often hatch in less than a day. The maggots mature in about five days, then pupate and develop into flies in about seven days. In two days, the flies begin to lay eggs.

Good and Cheesy

A savory cheese sauce, rich and creamy smooth, can do wonders for vegetables, such as beans, cauliflower, and potatoes. This cheesy sauce is lightly thickened with a small amount of corn starch, giving it the delicacy associated with a perfect sauce. For a flavorful change, try it over an omelet.

Cheese Sauce

- 1 tablespoon margarine
- 1 tablespoon corn starch
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper
- 8 ounces cheese, shredded (about 2 cups)

Melt margarine in small saucepan. Remove from heat. Mix in corn starch; gradually mix in milk, salt and pepper. Bring to boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute. Add shredded cheese; stir until melted. Remove from heat. Try adding pimiento for flavor and color. Serve over vegetables.

Shirttail Sermon

Once an elderly man discovered about \$5,000 in bank notes in a family Bible. It seems his aunt died when he was just a young man, and one clause of her will read: "To my beloved nephew, I will and bequeath my family Bible and all it contains, with the resi-

due of my estate, after funeral expenses and just debts are paid". The estate amounted to only a few hundred dollars which he soon spent, and he neglected his Bible for thirty-five years and lived in poverty. But while packing his trunk to move to his son's home,

where he expected to spend the remainder of his years, he discovered the money hidden in the Bible.

Those who fail to read the Bible today lose even greater treasures than that man. They lose the riches of God which are worth more than all the wealth of this world. The Psalmist said of God's Word, "More to be desired are they than fine gold, yea, than much fine gold; sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb. Moreover by them is thy servant warned: and in keeping of them there is great reward" (Ps. 19:10-11).

Again, he said, "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light to my pathway" (Ps. 119:105).

THREE TEXAS GOVERNORS ADDRESS SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Three Texas Governors joined forces in Austin recently as they spoke before a large group of prominent Texans assembled for the organizational meeting of the Governor's Committee of 500. They were Governor Preston Smith and former Governors Price Daniel and John Connally.

The Governor's Committee is the organization set up to campaign for the passage of Constitutional Amendment Two in the August 5 special election, the next step in the Texas Water Plan.

Governor Smith said, "This is one of the most important elections in Texas history. It will determine whether or not Texas can act in time to meet the future needs of an adequate water supply."

Former Governors Connally and Daniel gave their full endorsement

to the amendment. Each spoke in behalf of its passage. Another ex-Governor, Allan Shivers, was to have been present but he was called to the bedside of his son, Alan, jr., 23, who was seriously injured in a swimming accident at Eufaula, Alabama, on Friday. Young Shivers is in the hospital in Columbus, Georgia.

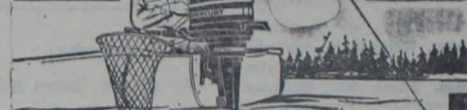
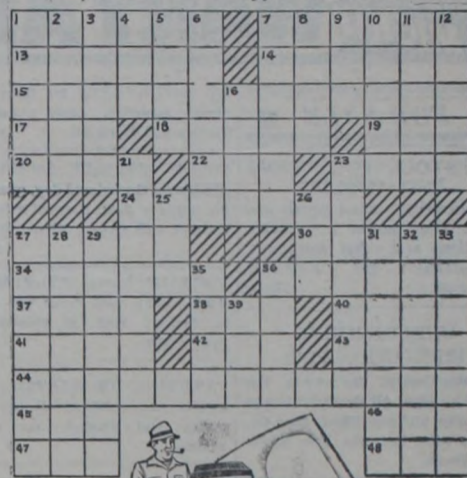
Each person who attended received a name tag made with a miniature boll of cotton. These were hand made by Mrs. Walter Bean.

SPECIALIST TELLS HOW TO REMOVE MILDEW

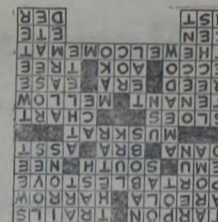
COLLEGE STATION — If you find mildew spots on your clothing, remove them by these suggestions from Mrs. Hazel Roberts, Extension clothing specialist.

If clothes are dry, brush off surface growth of mildew. If stain remains, washable clothes should be laundered at once with soap and water. Rinse well, Mrs. Roberts says, and dry in the sun.

If stains remain after washing, dip white cotton, rayon or linen

in a dilute solution of chlorine bleach. Rinse thoroughly and dry in sun.

For colored fabric, the specialist suggests you first test the bleach on a sample of the cloth to be sure it will not change the color.
