Vote Turnout About Half Of Eligible Voters

Forty-nine percent of the registered voters in Briscoe County came out to vote on Tuesday, April 9, 1996. Jerry Beck won the run-off election for sheriff with 347 votes. Dick

Roehr trailed with 288 votes. Precinct 6 in Quitaque had 67 voting for Beck and 11 voting for Roehr.

Precinct 2 gave Beck 119 votes and Roehr 44 votes.

A total of 241 voters came out in Quitaque for this run-off sheriff election.

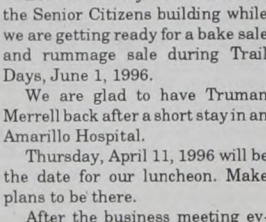

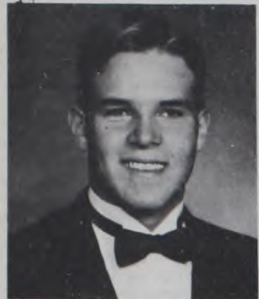
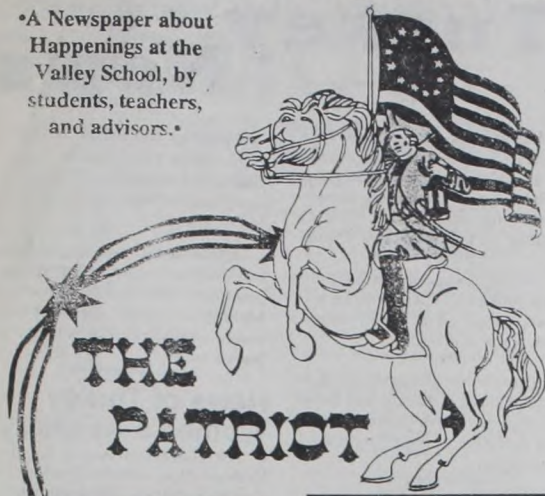

Briscoe County has been approved to extend emergency Grazing of 1996 CRP acres. The cost to graze this acreage will be 25% of the annual CRP payment per acre grazed. Producers who were approved to graze CRP acreage from February through March will be permitted to continue grazing the acreage if they agree to pay an additional 15% fee.

Grazing is authorized through September 30, 1996 if the drought continues. The State FSA Committee will review current grazing condition each month to determine if conditions have improved. If conditions do improve the grazing extension would be cancelled and participants would have 10 days to remove their livestock.
