Patriots Destroy Eagles 80-46 At Chillicothe

The Valley Patriots improved their record to 5-4 with an 80-46 win over the Chillicothe Eagles Friday night. The Patriots can clinch a playoff berth with a win Friday night against the Patton Springs Rangers along with a Guthrie win over Harrold.

Valley started out quickly against the Eagles as Kirk Garner scored four touchdowns on runs of 5, 39, 23, and 1 yards. Before the Eagles could score Ron Brittan hit on two of the extra point tries to move Valley ahead, 28-0.

The Eagles did get on the scoreboard with 44 seconds left in the half, to cut the lead to 20. But Valley moved the ball downfield and Bradley Price hit Clay Edwards on a 10-yard pass

as the horn blew. Brittan missed the extra point, but Valley led 34-8 at halftime.

Garner started the second half the way he had the first--with a 65 yard touchdown run to increase the lead to 42-8. Scoring went back and forth in the third and fourth quarters. Bubba Clardy returned a kickoff 58 yards; Edwards scored on runs of 30, 30, and 33, and Jason Smith took in a 20 yard pass from Lawrence Hendrix for another score.

Brittan finished up the night hitting 7-11 extra point attempts. On defense Valley was led by Bubba Clardy who had 13 tackles. Cory Pointer contributed 11 and Bradley Price had 8

to his credit. Jason Smith had 8 tackles and one interception.

The boys played a great first half. Our defense must keep working on keeping our positions, but overall, a good job. Lawrence Hendrix played well at QB in a backup roll. Kirk Garner ran well along with Clardy and Edwards. The line, Pointer, Tommy Pinkerton and Chad Powell, did a great job. Manual Silva did a good job at fullback on offense.

Valley will play Patton Springs Friday at Patriot Stadium at 7:30 p.m. The Valley JV game will be announced later, and the Jr. High will play Chillicothe at Valley at 5:00 p.m. Thursday.

Social Security News

If you are planning to retire around the first of the year, here's some advice from Social Security. Don't wait until you retire to contact Social Security. It's a good idea to apply about 3 months before you stop working.

Applying ahead of time will give you time to resolve any problems that crop up. Such problems may range from a discrepancy in the available proofs of age to inability to establish the relationship of your spouse or children.

When you apply, you'll have to establish that you will be at least 62 years old when benefits are to start. If your spouse and children are also involved, you'll need a marriage certificate and birth certificates to establish the relationships. Other proofs may be needed if there have been previous marriages, or if there

are minor children outside the present marriage.

The preferred proof of age is an official birth certificate issued before age five. If this is not available, other evidence, such as a baptismal certificate issued early in life or a combination of other documents may be acceptable. The Social Security office will help you find any necessary proofs not immediately available.

You can apply for retirement benefits at any Social Security office. You can also apply by phone or mail. Just call Social Security's toll-free telephone number to start the process or to make an appointment. The number is 1-800-234-SSA (1-800-234-5772). You can speak to a representative 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays.

Edwards Named Player of Week

Clay Edwards, junior running back, led an offensive explosion in the Patriots' 63-57 District 2-1A win over Vernon Northside.

Edwards rushed 20 times for 282 yards and three touchdowns (51, 66, 14 yards). On top of it, Edwards suffered a back strain that limited his production.

Reunion Planned For Orphaned Children From 1880 To 1929

Over 4,000 orphaned, abandoned, homeless children were brought to Texas from New York City and Boston Orphanages from the mid-1800s until as late as 1929. Reunions of these children, now 70 and 80 years old, are planned on Nov. 28, 1990 at Odessa and Dec. 1 in Austin.

These children were brought to Texas in groups accompanied by two adults and placed with new families. Since the children came on trains, this era of Texas history is called the "Orphan Trains Era." During the 75 years of this mass movement of children in America at least 150,000 children were relocated.

Mary Ellen Johnson, a family historian as well as founder of the 785 member organization, Orphan Train Heritage Society of America will be in charge of the meeting.
