FmHA To Propose New Lending Laws

Proposed rules, which could assist hundred of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued today, according to FmHA Texas State Director J. Lynn Futch.

The new regulations will carry out portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by congress last December. "There will be a 30 day comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective," Futch said.

One of the changes would allow FmHA to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. There are approximately 5,000 delinquent borrowers in Texas, many of whom should be assisted with this Program once implemented.

Committee Election June 3

Farmers in Briscoe County will have an opportunity to choose one person from candidates running for the Farmers Home Administration county committee in the June 30 election, FmHA County Supervisor Becky D. Via said today.

Any person who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper is considered a farmer and is eligible to vote, Ms. Via said. Spouses of eligible farmers also are considered farmers for voting eligibility.

Ballots for the election are published in this weeks edition of the Tribune and also are available at the FmHA county office at 104 E. California in Floydada. If they cannot be returned to the county office in person, ballots may be mailed in, Ms. Via said.

Among other duties, county committees help determine whether an applicant is eligible for a FmHA farm loan. Two of the three members are elected by county farmers, and the third is appointed by FmHA.

Bagworm Hatching Time Is Time for Effective Control

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says County Extension Agent Curtis Preston.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long, Preston adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Preston. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control

measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.

GTE Southwest Files Updated Rate Increase Petition

After failure to gain acceptance of an offer to withdraw its 1984 rate filing and failure to negotiate a settlement concerning tax and expense issues, GTE Southwest has filed updated rate schedules in accordance with directives of the Public Utility Commission of Texas to update the company's unresolved 1984 filing for

\$84.8 million of additional revenues. The financial information contained in the updated rate filing demonstrates the company has an \$81 million revenue deficiency based on a rate of return which is actually lower than the commission's last authorized rate of return.

GTE Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley said,

"The last time the company raised rates was in 1983. We have known with increased expenses and capital investments that eventually we would have to ask for increased revenues. With the downturn in the Texas economy we wanted to delay this as long as possible. However, since we are being required to update the current financials and process the merits of the rate filing, we have decided to seek the rates necessary to cover the revenue deficiency."

The company filed a petition early in 1987 to withdraw its 1984 filing, but some participants in the case resisted the move, voicing concern the company could be overearning because of changes in state and federal tax laws. As a result, the company was ordered to prepare the updated information by April 30. An extension was granted to allow for additional negotiation, but the parties to the case were unable to resolve the issues.

Langley said the four-year delay in the rate proceeding illustrates the complexities caused by deregulation and other major changes affecting the telecommunications industry in the 1980's.

GTESW initially filed for \$84.8 million in additional revenues in February 1984. Prior to hearings, the case was suspended to await a decision in another commission proceeding concerning changes brought about by the AT&T divestiture and competition in long-distance service. Due to the many complexities associated with these issues, a final order was not issued in this proceeding until September 1986.

"Our updated financials show we are not over-earning," Langley said. "We have factored in all the changes affecting the company, both positive and negative, and the result is that the company still has an \$81 million revenue deficiency."

"The reduced expenses, such as the reduction in both state and federal taxes, have been more than offset by increases in other expenses and in our investment in providing service in the state," he said.

The company now expects the administrative law judge in charge of the company's filing will set a schedule of dates to allow other parties in the case to file appropriate testimony and date, and set hearing dates to consider the new proposed rates.

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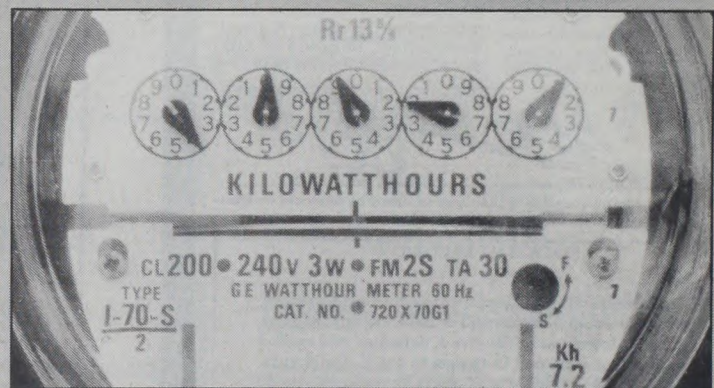

NEWS OF VETERANS

Washington Group Works For Veterans' Entitlements

A group of concerned citizens is working in Washington to preserve the entitlements earned by the men and women who fought for our country.

That group, the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), has urged the Congress to upgrade the Veterans Administration (VA) to a federal department thereby allowing the VA Administrator to bring the concerns of America's 27 million veterans directly to the President.

The VFW has also asked the Congress to provide an adequate funding level for the Veterans Administration which will not only maintain the basic integrity of its entire medical care system and entitlement program, but will also enable it to properly prepare for increasing demands.

The VFW wants to ensure that medical treatment will always be provided to all veterans seeking VA health care. Not only does the Administration's proposed budget for 1989 fail to allow for needed improvement in the VA health-care system, it does not even provide sufficient resources to maintain

current services. At a time when our veteran population is rapidly aging and will require more extensive, sophisticated and labor intensive medical care, the Administration is proposing to cut medical care staffing by 1,782 employees.

The VFW also supports increased funding for such important programs as the replacement and modernization of aging VA facilities, the Veterans' Job Training Act—a program which strengthens our economy by getting people jobs, not welfare—and non-institutionalized extended care programs that allow aging veterans to lead independent, productive and purposeful lives.

The VFW believes the VA deserves more than just a current services funding level—that Veterans deserve more than just a "make do" budget. 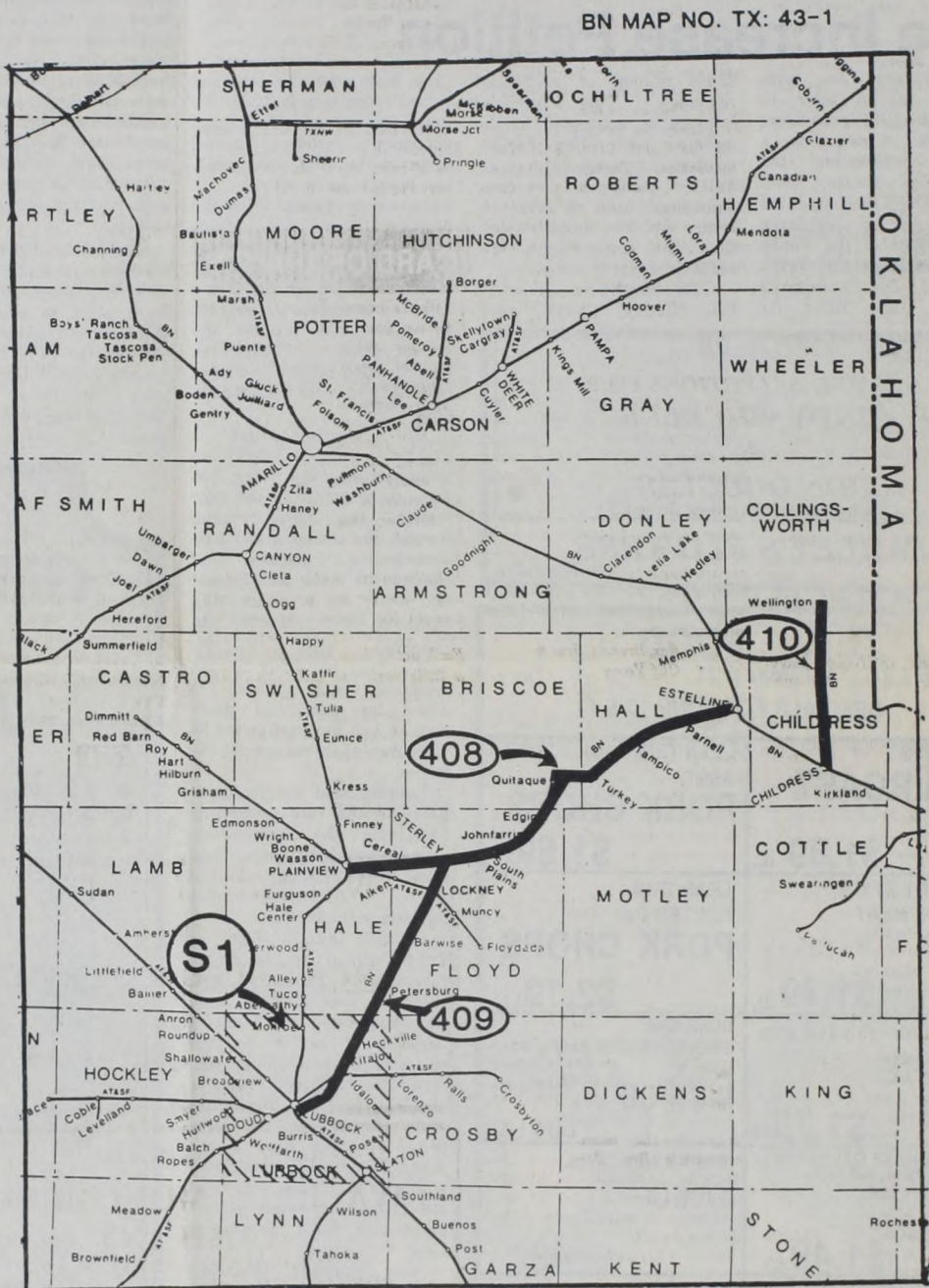

HINTS FOR THE HANDY

Working outdoors can be both safe and enjoyable if you choose reliable equipment and make sure it's complete and in perfect condition. Here are six rules from the clearing saw experts at Husqvarna on how to use a clearing saw safely:



Always wear personal safety equipment: goggles or helmet, gloves, etc. when using a saw.

- No one should be within at least 30 feet of you when you're operating the saw. If you're clearing in young tall stands, the distance should be twice the tree length.

- Only blades designed especially for the clearing saw should be used. Make sure the blade is properly secured.

- Always wear personal safety equipment.
- Keep your blade properly ground, set and sharpened. A sharp blade is key to saw performance. Never grind the blade with the engine running.

- The blade should be inspected several times a day. If there are any cracks or indications of fracture, scrap the blade. A spare blade should be carried.

- Make sure the clutch and idling speed are correctly adjusted. The ratio between engagement speed and idling speed should be at least 1.3:1. The blade should not rotate at idle.
