### Coach Bill Hulsey Resigns At Valley Basketball Coach

Coach Bill Hulsey, after spending three very successful years at Valley High School, announced his resignation last week. He has accepted a coaching job at Hobbs, Texas, which is located in the Rotan vicinity. Coach Hulsey will coach all sports. The school plays six man football.

Coach Hulsey came to Valley as boys basketball coach, inheriting a team that had won only two games the previous season. He also assisted as football coach. The Patriots basketball team, in their second year after being consolidated with Turkey and playing a Class A schedule enjoyed a winning season under Coach Hulsey's tutelage, defeating every other team in the district at least once with the exception of district winner Claude.

Just a few weeks before the football season started the next season Coach Hulsey took on the task of coaching the football team in addition to boys basketball. Now the football team had been taking its lumps having been winless for the two previous seasons. The Patriots 20 game losing streak extended to 21 at the start of the new season but the string was broken when the Patriots played Farwell to a scoreless tie (Valley had been dropped to Class B). The Patriots went on to win six of their last eight games that season and held five of them scoreless. The Patriots were the top defensive team in the district and with just a little luck could have won the district. Last year the Patriots lost only a single game and were rated No. 6 among Class B teams in the state. The Patriots were also winners in basketball the past two seasons, being runners-up to Hedley in '75 and to Quall the past season, the title having to be decided in a playoff. Last season the Patriots won over teams of every classification with the exception of Class AAAA. The Patriots did not play a team in the AAA classification. Coach Hulsey had given up the job as head football coach last spring and had planned only to catch boys basketball, and Rick Dill had been named head football coach.

So a very fine record has been compiled by Coach Hulsey and the Gaston Owens join the many friends of Bill and Pat and daughter in wishing them the very best for the future.

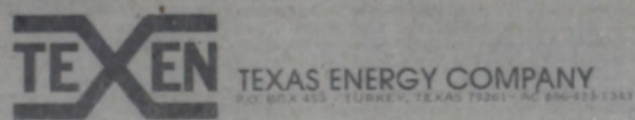

Though their names are Lynn and Cook, Green and Watkins, nine have at least one great-grandparent who was a full-blooded Indian. Stan Easter, Teresa Cook and Rosemary Burkhardt each have an Indian grandparent.

Cherokee and Comanche, Sioux and Choctaw, Creek and Apache are represented in the Company. John Red Fox leads the list. He is the grandson of the famed Sioux Chief, William Red Fox who is renowned for his interpretation of Indian characters on stage and in films. Director of

the Indians for Buffalo Bill's Wild West shows, and later for those of the 101 Ranch, he appeared in more than a hundred movies and spent his long life representing his race for audiences of all kinds. He died this spring at the age of 105. John Red Fox plays the role of the old chief in "Texas", and bases a good deal of his interpretation on the character of his grandfather.

The others playing Indian roles in the production draw on the experiences of the ancestors of cast members for their parts.

## Funds Available For Great Plains SCS Contracts

The Great Plains Conservation Program has been available to Briscoe County land users for 20 years this month. This program is designed for farmers and ranchers who want to treat all of their conservation problems. Two hundred and twenty-five contracts have been developed on 342,508 acres in the county. This is 88% of the operating units and 63% of the agricultural land.

The most popular conservation practices have been brush control, terraces and irrigation pipeline.

The following list of practices

can be cost shared: range seeding, pasture planting, field windbreaks, grassed waterways, terraces—parallel and standard, diversion terraces, grade stabilization structures, irrigation pipeline, land leveling, wells for livestock water, pipelines for livestock water, water storage facilities, ponds, cross fencing, brush control, irrigation tailwater recovery system, pollution abatement practices and critical area treatment.

Funds are now available to prepare new GPCP contracts. Contact the office of the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton for further information.
