Site Secured For Valley High School

A building site has been bought for the new Valley High School, it was announced last week. Final papers have not been signed as yet but school board president Buster Chadwick said that he believes the deal will go through without any trouble and that the final details will work out okay and that work can get underway on the school before too long.

Twenty acres of land was purchased from Mrs. Dutch Payne for the new school. The land is located on the south side of Highway 86 across the road from the old Roll Tyler home, and is located very close to the halfway point between Quitaque and Turkey. The Midway Drive In is called the halfway point between the two towns, but according to those who have measured it, the theatre is a little bit closer to Turkey and the actual halfway mark is a bit west of the theatre and the new school will be near that point.

DIABETIC CAMP OPENS MAY 28

Camp Sweeney Diabetic Training Center for diabetic boys and girls will open its 23rd season on May 28 with three three-week sessions as follows: May 28 to June 17, June 18 to July 8, and July 9 to July 29.

Camp Sweeney is located nine miles east and one mile north of Gainesville, on 338 acres of beautiful rolling timbered hills with three dormitories for boys and three for girls; a non-denominational chapel; a modern hospital; a 30-acre lake for boating, fishing and water skiing; a sanitary swimming pool, tennis courts, recreational pavilion, target range and 20 gentle saddle horses.

Under the supervision of a specialized medical staff, dietitian and counsellors, these children are taught their proper diet with regulated exercise, how to take their own urine tests and give their own insulin injections. Of major importance, through this group association with other young diabetics, they realize they are not alone

AUSTIN — Rep. Tom Christian, today applauded the accomplishments of the Second Called Session of the 62nd Texas Legislature.

"In three short days the Texas Legislature elected a new Speaker, passed emergency legislation, and in my opinion, passed for the first time in history much needed rules reform."

"Under the capable leadership of Speaker Rayford Price, the House voted to limit the powers of conference committees, to put an end to additions and deletions in legislation without the knowledge of the House, to reduce the number of committees from 46 to 25, to create a limited seniority system to promote expertise within the committees, and to record the proceedings of all committees and make them public record," Christian said.

Rep. Christian further stated, "The discharge of three committees — Appropriations, House Administration and Revenue and Taxation — will take the business of appropriations and administration out of the hands of Bill Heatly and Tommy Shannon and put it back into the hands of the full committees."

Shannon was recently convicted, along with former Speaker Gus Mutscher, of bribery conspiracy.

"The most meaningful reform comes in the rule which provides that the appropriations bill be presented to the full membership of the House at least seven days before a vote is taken," Christian said.

"When the Heatly-Mutscher team controlled the House, the appropriations bill was drawn in secret and not made available to the members of the House until the final minutes of a session. Members never knew what it contained until it was too late."

"Another safeguard of the public's right to know, is a provision that requires that public hearings be held for the Appropriations Bill with notice to be posted prior to time of the hearing," he said.

Christian said, "I am pleased with the recognition of the Republican delegation as a force to be dealt with. The votes of nine members of the GOP delegation made the difference in the victory and defeat for reform in the leadership of this legislative body. By voting as a bloc we were able to swing the election of Price, the conservative, and away from the liberal-Mutscher faction led by Rep. Tewitt Hale of Corpus Christi.

"I feel that we are moving in the direction of real reform in our legislature. We must continue this positive action until we have restored the faith of the people of Texas in their government."
