Turkey City Council met June 8 in their regular meeting, with Louis Randell, Vicki Lindsey, Ray Whitaker, Barry Long, and Mayor George Colvin present. Jerry Landry, City Manager, and guest Margie Chaney were also present.

The council voted to contract with Ms. Chaney for the Turkey Arts and Craft Fun Feast Fair, to rent the Community Center for \$1.00.

Bills were approved for payment, and the financial report was accepted.

In other action, the council voted to attempt to sell city-owned lots, and to combine the four checking accounts into one bank account.

It was noted that a representative from Senator Gramm's office would present Turkey with a Flag on June 14, Flag Day.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Traffic Signs Vandalized

With the arrival of spring, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has noted an increase in traffic sign theft and vandalism.

Although the signs are quickly replaced, and no one has been injured due to missing or damaged signs, the costs associated with this crime are high. Damaged signs pose a danger to the traveling public, and the funds spent to replace them could be spent elsewhere.

Taxpayers in the Childress District spent more than \$28,000 last year to replace stolen and vandalized signs along state roadways. Statwide, taxpayers spent more than \$8 million replacing signs damaged by natural disasters, accidents, and vandals.

Counties included in TxDOT's Childress District include: Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Collingsworth, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, King, Knox, Motley and Wheeler.

Motorists are encouraged to write down the license plate number and contact their local law enforcement official if they see anyone tampering with a traffic sign.

Wood and metal signs cost approximately \$10 per square foot to produce. The costs to install replacement signs vary depending on the amount of time and equipment needed.

People are reminded that in Texas it is against the law to possess a sign without a permit, and the state does not sell signs or issue permits to possess them. In addition, if the loss to TxDOT is more than \$1,500 it is a felony.

The council said they felt that any use of the fire trucks for any kind of function other than fires should have pre-approval.

The 1995-96 Budget was tabled until the next Council meeting.

Tommy Lowrey of Silverton met with the Council and gave an estimate of \$4,867 for the Valley View sewer system including an extra man hole. Without the extra man hole the estimate was \$4,387. He stated that he could go to work within 45 days on the project.

Six ambulance runs were reviewed as was the delinquent water bills.

Turkey Receives Special U. S. Flag

The nation's time-honored tradition of Flag Day was observed on Wednesday, June 14, as the city of Turkey received a United States Flag from a representative of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's office.

Hans Klingler, regional director of Sen. Gramm's office in Lubbock, delivered remarks regarding the significance of Flag Day and presented a U.S. flag to Mayor George Colvin, during a ceremony held at the city hall Wednesday morning.

Flag Day is celebrated on June 14 of each year, to commemorate the day in 1777 when the Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States.

President Woodrow Wilson established Flag Day as an annual national celebration on May 30, 1916, and in 1949, President Harry S. Truman officially recognized June 14 as the Flag Day by signing the National Flag Day Bill.
