West Texas Utilities Office In Turkey To Close Within Two Weeks

West Texas Utilities Company will be closing its area office in Turkey sometime in the next two weeks.

The decision to close the office was made for efficiency reasons. "Good management of our resources is important to WTU in all areas," said Keith Edwards, area manager for WTU's Quitaque office.

In years past, a large number of local offices were necessary to provide WTU's electric service, especially to the company's many rural customers. Today, with modern telephone and highway systems, the picture has changed. It's easier than ever for WTU customers to get the efficient service they need. "We're always just a phone call away, no matter where you live," said Edwards. "And just because our office will not be there, doesn't mean our community support won't be. We'll continue to be active in civic events in Turkey. WTU is proud to help in all the towns we serve."

The Turkey office will close sometime in August or September. The office serves 380 customers. The office's one em-

ployee, Tami Lucero, will be transferred to WTU's Childress office to replace a retiring employee.

After the office closes, WTU customers in Turkey will continue to be served by the Quitaque area office. Keith Edwards is WTU's Quitaque area manager. Jan Ramsey is the customer service representative. The telephone number for the Quitaque office is (806) 455-1300. Customers who have questions about their bill or need any kind of service from WTU can call this number collect.

Arrangements have been made with Turkey City Hall to accept WTU payments there.

Handicap Ramp Constructed At Courthouse

Construction of a ramp which meets state specifications for the handicapped has been completed on the south entrance of Hall County Courthouse.

The ramp was completed and final payment made to the crew leader, Robert Gonzalez, according to Hall County Judge Kenneth Dale.

Last month Judge Dale was authorized by the Commissioners Court to arrange for the construction of the ramp. The old ramp into the courthouse did not meet state specifications because its slope was too steep, the County Judge said.

In a meeting Monday morning, Commission Bobby Barby made the motion that they hire Tadd Knight as County Extension Agent to begin work September 1, 1992. The motion was seconded by Commissioner U. F. Coker. The motion carried.

The Commissioners also voted to make restrooms of Hall County Courthouse available to the public during the Hall County Picnic Celebration Saturday, September 19.

County Judge Dale presented a proposed county budget and the Commissioners voted to accept the budget as presented. The commissioners approved the reading of the minutes, accepted the various reports and voted to pay the outstanding bill.

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Farmers to Voice Opinions August 24 On FmHA Emergency Loan Program

Panhandle and South Plains area farmers will have a chance to voice their opinions on the Farmers Home Administration's (FmHA) Emergency Loan Program on August 24, 1992 in Floydada before a congressional public hearing arranged by Congressman Bill Sarpalius.

The House Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit, and Rural Development will hold this public hearing on Monday, August 24, at 2:00 p.m. in the District Courtroom of the Floyd County Courthouse and is open to the public.

"The purpose of this hearing is to listen to the farmers and producers of the 13th District," Sarpalius said. "It is a chance for farmers to discuss their experiences with the Emergency Loan Program and to help Congress understand the difficulties farmers are facing."

"Apparently, the federal emergency loan program is not reaching the producers that need assistance getting through weather-related disasters," Sarpalius continued.

"So, I convinced Chairman Glenn English, to bring Washington to Floydada and learn first-hand the problems confronting our farmers," Sarpalius said.

Representative English is the chairman of the Conservation, Credit, and Rural Development Subcommittee which oversees all FmHA programs, including the emergency loan program. In addition, the committee oversees the Farm Credit System, conservation programs, and rural development.

This field hearing will focus on the effectiveness of the Emergency Loan Program. Sarpalius added that the committee is also interested in hearing producers' opinions on crop insurance and direct disaster assistance.

"I'm bringing the committee to

Floydada so it can hear the ideas and suggestions of the producers most directly impacted," Sarpalius continued, "and hopefully this will result in a legislative remedy."

"This is the American farmer's chance to be heard and make a real impact on the policies that effect the way he does business," Sarpalius added.

Representative Sarpalius invites those who wish to testify to contact his Washington office by August 19 at 202/225-3706. Written testimony of any length may also be submitted by August 21 to the Amarillo office at 817 S. Polk, Amarillo, Texas 79101 or brought directly to the hearing.

HOME ECONOMIST GIVES TIPS ON HOME CANNING

Ms. Beverly Thomas of Vernon, Home Extension Agent, was the feature Gooders' Club meeting at the Flomot Community Center, Tuesday afternoon, August 11. She gave tips on home canning.

She said people home-can foods to save money, to have healthier food, to know what's in the food, to can for special diets and for personal satisfaction, but asked: "Does home canning pay off?"

The only way found that home canners could save half the cost of buying commercially canned foods was to produce their own garden vegetables and fruits and discount the value of their labor. Canning is the least expensive followed by drying, then freezing. When checking pressure canner lids, she stated the initial costs of purchasing necessary equipment must be considered by the new home canner.

The VALLEY school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for .80 7-12 GRADES and breakfast for .35. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 15¢ for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

REVISIONS (Changes): If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$30 per month or \$300 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Renewal/Extension: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Substitutions: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

We will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

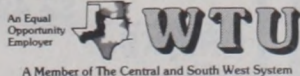
