Honest! What pictures does that word bring to your mind? The dictionary by Mr. Webster says that honest means truthful, trustworthy, sincere or genuine, gained by fair means or frank and open.

Members of Valley FFA, Memphis FFA, Hall County 4-H, Motley County FFA, and Briscoe County 4-H, Childress FFA and 4-H, and several others participated in the show. There were 180 entries this year, several more than last year with 96.

High Plains Baptist Hospital Outlines Services Available in Briscoe Rural Clinic

A new rural health clinic will soon open in Silverton, for residents of Silverton, Quitauque and Turkey, Texas. The clinic staff will include a billing clerk, LVN and a mid-level practitioner, or what's considered either a physician assistant or nurse practitioner. This staff, with a supporting cast of medical specialists, and services at High Plains Baptist Health Systems, will soon be the new team for your area. This clinic will be complimented by a team of rural clinic specialists whose only job is to insure the success of this clinic. The mid-level practitioner is the key quarterback of the team. The following is a description of what that role means for your community.

A family nurse practitioner (FNP) is a registered nurse (RN) who has been certified through

a recognized family nurse practitioner program of advanced education and expanded skills. These skills enable the FNP to work closely with a physician to provide family health care.

A physician assistant (PA) is a graduate of an accredited physician assistant training program and is registered a physician assistant with the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners.

Both physician assistants and family nurse practitioners work under a physician's supervision, using established protocols

(written plans for specific diseases or conditions) in carrying out health regimens for patients. The supervising physician visits the clinic, in person, at least once a week and is immediately available by phone, or is only thirty minutes from the clinic for emergencies. Both the FNP and the PA can prescribe medications according to written protocols. The supervising physician assumes responsibility and legal liability for the health care services provided by the FNP and PA.

Both FNP's and PA's often are found working in medically un-

deserved areas where a great need for health care services exist. They can obtain a health history, perform a physical examination and manage the medical care of acute and chronically ill patients.

Some of the more common problems treated and/or managed by nurse practitioners and physician assistants include diabetes, high blood pressure, colds, flu, strep throat, ear infections, tonsillitis, anemia, arthritis, asthma, back pain, kidney and bladder infection, sinus problems, allergies, bronchitis, chicken pox, pink eye, skin rashes, boils, ringworm, warts, diarrhea, stomach disorders, bedwetting, headaches, female/male problems and many others.

They also can provide immunizations and preventive health measures to patients of all ages and can take care of minor injuries such as burns and cuts. When confronted with any problems that they cannot handle in the clinic, nurse practitioners or physician assistants use the referral system available to them at High Plains Baptist Hospital or the doctor of the patient's choice.

FNP's and PA's have been trained and understand the importance of health education. They can assist their patients with nutritional information, dental hygiene education, family planning and child development guidance.

City Of Turkey Applies For Grant January 12

Last Thursday, January 12, 1995, Mayor Buddy Colvin and Water Commissioner Jerry Landry journeyed to Amarillo to present the City of Turkey's request for a grant to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. They applied for a grant for some new water lines. The grant they applied for was for \$181,000.

The last grant that the City of Turkey received was in 1987. The city has applied for a grant every year since 1989, to no avail.

The awards are awarded on scores. The PRPC reads the grant and scores. Then the grant is sent to Austin where it is also scored. The grants that receive the highest scores will receive the grants.

The 1994 grants have not been awarded at this time so perhaps Turkey will have a chance at that one and after another hearing, the awards for 1995 will be granted.

Last year 33 cities applied for the grant. This year 40 cities applied. Those 40 requests totaled over 9 million dollars.

If Turkey does receive a grant, which is quite possible, they will replace the old 6 inch cast iron lines on Johnson Street, down west of the City Hall to 9th Street and down to Denver Street. Some of the lines on Denver Street will be replaced. Also lines in front of the Church of Christ on Bell Street will be replaced for two blocks.

If the grant is received, two new pumps and motors will be installed. Also 25 new valves will be installed.
