Science Eliminates Most Bandage Allergies

"It's bad enough to cut yourself accidentally, but you are in even more trouble when the bandage you apply causes an allergic reaction," said William O. Elson, medical research director of the Curity Division of the Kendall Company.

Most people are not aware, according to Elson, of the reason why some bandages create skin problems for many.

The customary adhesive used for many years in all small bandages, and still used by many makers, is a combination of rubber and various resins. The skin may well be allergic to any one of these components - and the result may be a painful collection of tiny blisters and cracks in the outer layer of skin.

Protection against the latter is also now possible, according to Elson, as a result of the Curity laboratory's development of a plastic material called "telfa." It is a highly-absorbent, gauze-covered sheet of soft, pliable plastic, punctured with dozens of tiny holes engineered to permit the escape of fluids from the wound. In ordinary bandages, this fluid sticks to both the bandage and the scab, and often results in painful re-opening of the wound when the bandage is removed.

The new adhesive, made by Curity scientists and researchers, is made of a single substance, under carefully-controlled conditions. Chances of allergic-reaction to it are extremely small.

Don't Create New Problems
"An injury or a burn which penetrates the skin is a serious wound," Elson said. "Doctors warn us to protect it against

NEW FARM OWNERSHIP LOANS AVAILABLE FROM FHA
Farm ownership loans are available to local farmers through the Farmers Home Administration according to Don Cruce, County supervisor who serves Swisher and Briscoe counties from his office in Tulla, Texas.

Mr. Cruce stated that Farm Ownership loans are made to applicants for various purposes. Some loans enable tenant-operators to become owner-operators and others enable present owners to enlarge, improve or refinance their farms. Loans to purchase farms, in most cases, include

funds to fully develop the farm.

In recent years one of the most prominent uses of loan funds has been to purchase and improve farms for young tenant farmers who are trying to establish themselves more soundly in the farming industry. With loan terms at 5 percent interest and up to 40 years to repay, the young farmer will more likely be able to pay the land debt, meet operating expenses and realize a profit. Loans to young farmers can be repaid at the rate of \$58.28 per \$1000.00 per year and the loan can be up to \$60,000.00. The Tulla office of the Farmers Home Administration has closed nine Farm Ownership Loans since July 1, 1968 totaling \$301,320.00. Three more loans have been approved and awaiting funding. The loans can only be made through the help of local lenders willing to invest their money in government securities.

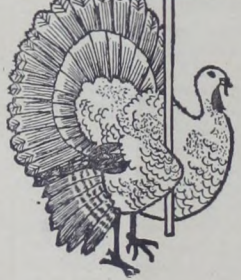

Shirttail Sermon

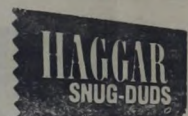

From The County Agent's Desk

GUIDELINES AIED FOR HIRING YOUTH FOR FARM JOBS

Summer is almost here and many farmers and ranchers will be hiring boys and girls to fill in for the critical labor shortage during the summer months. But before employing such youth, certain requirements must be met under the Fair Labor Standard Act as amended in 1966.

Employers must abide by the Agriculture and Child Labor Requirements when hiring youth under 16 years of age other than the owner's or operator's own children.

This law states briefly that

youngsters under 16 cannot be hired to operate or ride on tractors (over 20 belt horsepower) or self-unloading wagons or hoist wagons; operate or unclog combines, field balers, hay conditioners, forage harvesters, corn pickers, roughage blowers or crop dryers; operate post hole diggers or power driven saws; or work inside a gas-tight forage or grain enclosure or in a yard, pen or stall occupied by a dairy bull, boar or stud horse.

These standards do not apply when a youngster under 16 is employed by his parents on a farm or operated by such parent. Also, those youth under 16 who have completed a bona fide cooperative vocational training program are exempt from the provisions of the act.

Many counties and many county agricultural agents in the area are conducting such training programs at the present in order to prepare youngsters between the ages of 14 and 16 for summer employment.

This training mainly involves the safe operation of tractors and farm machinery. Identification cards are issued after successful completion of the training program, and employers should make sure that youngsters have these cards before hiring them. An employer can be fined up to \$10,000 for willful violation of the Labor Act.

Check with your county agriculture agent for additional information on Child Labor if you have plans to employ youngsters on your farm or ranch this summer.
