NEW TIL RULING TO CAUSE A LOT OF CONTROVERSY

Several weeks ago superintendents of Texas schools voted a change in the awards program that has already brought about a lot of arguments against the ruling and will cause even more when the news of the ruling becomes more widespread.

We are speaking of the rule, which according to our information becomes effective next year, which states that athletes will be allowed only one award jacket in four years. This means that if a student plays football, basketball, baseball, and runs track, the first time he letters in any one sport, that is the only jacket he will be allowed to receive as far as his high school career is concerned. In other words, if a boy or girl letters as a freshman in high school and receives a jacket, then that is it.

The voting on the ruling was 511 superintendents for the new rule and 396 against, according to figures this reporter saw.

The student will be allowed to receive only one \$20 award, and from then on only a token award will be given, such as a letter or medal not to exceed \$3 in value.

I am against this ruling. When a student goes through a couple of weeks of pre-season workouts, then through a 10 week football season and a long basketball season, then that student has earned a jacket. Of course, there must be limits to the award program for things can get out of hand. According to the way I understand it, the only reason for the new ruling was a matter of expenses. However, it seems that the matter should be left to the individual school districts. If a school cannot afford to give awards or jackets every year, then let that school take care of that problem in its own way.

The Turkey schools, as I understand it, gives jackets to junior and senior students only. The Quitaque schools give only one jacket a year — that is, if the student letters in basketball and baseball, only one jacket will be given.

The jacket awards is an old tradition and one that should be kept, to my thinking.

We have been gratified with the response to The Valley Tribune, both in Quitaque and in Turkey. All of the comment we have heard has been favorable. BRISCOE COUNTY From The County Agent's Desk

Years ago hogs went to market
 weighing over 400 pounds. Em-

phasis then was on fat because
 lard was in demand for high-
 energy diets.

Today's ideal hog is marketed at
 200 pounds, and is mostly lean
 pork. Research has helped farm-
 ers make this change by develop-
 ing lean - type strains of hogs and
 feed rations which allow producers
 to grow the types demanded by
 the modern market.

Too, the tough, stringy range
 steers our grandfathers knew and
 the overly conditioned beef animal
 of the fat stock shows of the past
 have both given way to a faster
 gaining, moderately - finished
 meat animal.

In the early years of this century

a milk cow did well to produce
 4,000 pounds of milk per year. The
 national average for all cows to-
 day is more than twice as high.

Production per cow in the Texas
 Dairy Herd Improvement Associa-
 tion herds is over 11,000 pounds
 per cow and climbing. Better care
 and disease control account for
 part of this gain. But feeding and
 breeding knowledge pioneered by
 the U. S. Department of Agricul-
 ture and the Land - Grant Institu-
 tions, such as Texas A & M Uni-
 versity, account for much of the in-
 crease.

Despite the progress made to
 date, important work still remains
 to be done in areas such as feed ef-

efficiency; prevention and control
 of diseases and pests; market-
 ing and retail outlets in the
 country.

With the non-stick coating, even the most crusty-on foods float away with the swish of a hot sudsy



sponge. There is no messy scouring, scrubbing or soaking of pots and pans, which uses a great deal of precious water. It's also kinder to your hands, getting them out of the water faster and making them less subject to chapping in the chill air. This eliminates one of the most disagreeable cleanup chores in outdoor living, as any camper will tell you. The nested aluminum sets usually include pots and pans of varying sizes, unbreakable plates and cups, and the indispensable coffee pot, all of which nest neatly into the largest utensil for easy carrying and storage. SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES —

Many people have the idea that they do not need to get in touch with the social security office until they retire. This is not true, according to Travis C. Briggs, manager of the Amarillo social security office. Recent changes in the social security law make it possible for people who are still working full time to qualify for Medicare, monthly cash benefits, or both.

"Upon reaching age sixty-five," Briggs said, "almost everyone can qualify for both the hospital insurance and supplementary insurance programs of Medicare, even if he is still working and earning too much money to be eligible for monthly benefits. Retirement is not a requirement for Medicare eligibility. Therefore, it is extremely important to get in touch with the social security office during the three - month period before the month you become age sixty-five.

"Another change in the law increases the possibility of receiving

some social security cash benefits for those who are still working. Beginning this year, one can earn up to \$1680 and still receive all of his social security benefits for the year. Even if the applicant is earning over \$1680, it may be poss-

ible for him to receive some benefits during the year," Briggs added.

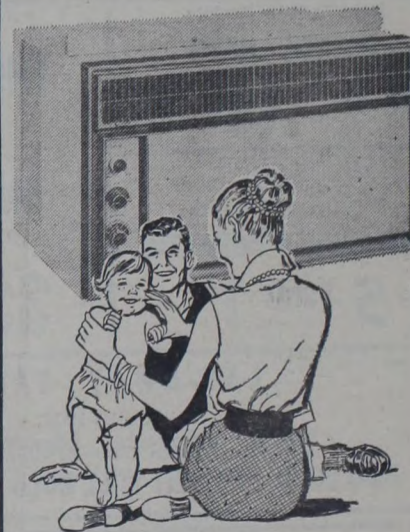

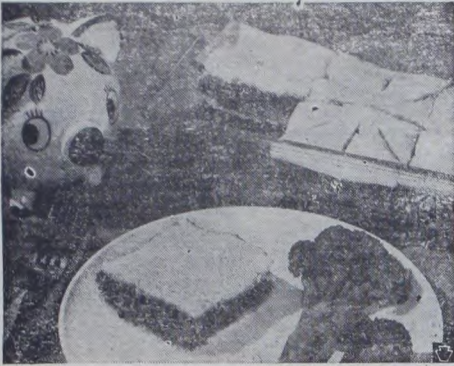

Heat oven to moderate (375°F.). For filling, sprinkle salt into hot skillet. Add ground beef. Cook until lightly browned, stirring frequently. Stir in remaining ingredients, one at a time, in order listed. Cover and cook over low heat about 10 minutes.

For pastry, sift together flour, corn meal, baking powder and salt into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add water, a tablespoon at a time, stirring lightly until pastry can be formed into a ball.

Turn out on lightly floured board or canvas. Divide dough in half. Roll one half to form a 10x6-inch rectangle. Place in 10x6-inch baking dish. Cover with filling. Roll remaining dough to same size. Cut slits in center to allow steam to escape. Place over filling.

Bake in preheated oven (375°F.) about 30 minutes or until lightly browned. To serve, cut in 6 pieces.

NEW SCHOOL FOR PATROLMEN TO START ON JULY 30th

A training school for 120 new patrolmen with the Texas Department of Public Safety will start July 30, Major Luther Moore, Regional Commander, announced today.

"We have several new benefits to offer qualified young men," Moore said. "For instance, the pay during training is \$500 per month and upon graduation this is increased to \$571."

"Also, our selection methods are more liberal in that an applicant is not required to live in Texas for one year prior to employment, and the entrance examination is given every day at our larger offices."

To qualify for employment in the uniformed services of the DPS, a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches tall, have a high school education or its equivalent, be in

sound physical condition with good vision and must be a citizen of the United States.

"Among the many benefits that patrolmen enjoy," Moore pointed out, "are two weeks annual vacation, all holidays provided for by the Legislature, modern liberal retirement systems and group hospitalization and life insurance plans, traveling expenses and longevity pay, and uniforms and all the necessary equipment to perform their duties."

For complete information concerning the position of patrolman, training and benefits, Moore asked that those who are interested contact the nearest DPS patrolman or DPS office. "In return," he said "they will receive complete information in regard to the application and examination."

BRIDES AND GROOMS HAVE OFFICIAL RECORDS TO CHANGE

COLLEGE STATION, — Brides and grooms have many official records to change, reminds Wanda Meyer, Extension home management specialist.

Working brides should make sure all the records at their places of employment show their new status. Failure to do so can cause confusion later in regard to state federal and local income taxes, says the Texas A&M University specialist.

In addition, check all insurance policies and benefits which frequently are offered through employers or labor union. Make sure all the names are in order on the benefits.

Other records that need to carry the bride's new name are social security records, driver license and credit cards. These changes should be made as soon as possible after the wedding, says Mrs. Meyer.

The Social Security Office has a change of name card that must be filled. The main office issues the bride a new card with her new name.

A duplicate driver's license with the bride's new name can be obtained from the local driver license office for one dollar. If the license expires within 90 days then the license will just be renewed with the new name on it.

The change of name on credit cards varies with the company. The bride should notify the companies that she has changed her name. They will let her know if there are additional forms to be filled out or they will change the name and send her a new card.

perch family, and may grow 36 inches long and weigh 25 pounds. They are indigenous to the great lakes area with the greatest numbers caught in Lake Erie.

Crabtree says that while no tiny fry have been located, adult fish removed from the lake by biologists and anglers show spent reproductive glands, evidence that eggs have been deposited by the females and an effort to fertilize them has been carried out by the male.

The first walleye season opened May 1, and Crabtree says anglers have enjoyed good success in catching them.

In 1965, approximately 500,000 walleye were released in Lake Meredith, and 2,000,000 were released in 1966 in an attempt by the Department to establish a fishable species which would not compete with native game fishes for food

and which would peacefully co-exist and supply the angler with more outdoor recreation.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ — PAYING ESTATE TAX

If we have accumulated a few thousand as the years go on, we start to worry about how much tax our children will owe when we die. There is an inheritance tax in the State of Texas, and a federal estate tax to consider. On the federal tax you do not have to file an estate tax return unless your estate amounts to more than \$60,000. If you own community property this goes up to \$120,000.

Publication No. 448, a Guide to Federal Estate and Gift Taxation, is available for 25 cents from the Government Printing Office. A 25c investment could help you avoid a lot of problems for your heirs.

Pizza Party by Betty Crocker

Since your pizza dough and toppings are ready to go (you do them ahead) — now take orders for individual pizzas. Then toss an Italian salad and serve fresh fruit for dessert. Oh, and don't forget, light the candles. In pretty colored bottles, of course.

Pizza

- 1 package active dry yeast
- 3/4 cup warm water (105 to 115°)
- 2 1/2 cups Bisquick
- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 can (15 ounces) or 2 cans (8 ounces each) tomato sauce
- About 1 cup chopped salami
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 1/2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese or 2 packages (6 ounces each) sliced mozzarella cheese, cut into thin strips
- 3 to 4 teaspoons crushed oregano leaves

Heat oven to 425°. Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add Bisquick and beat vigorously. Turn dough onto surface well dusted with flour. Knead until smooth, about 20 times. Allow dough to rest a few minutes. Divide dough into 4 pieces. Roll each piece very thin into a circle, about 10 inches in diameter.

Place on ungreased baking sheets or in shallow pie pans. Mix onion, garlic, tomato sauce, salami, salt and pepper; spread on dough. Sprinkle shredded cheese over all or place cheese strips on top. Sprinkle with oregano to desired amount. Bake 15 to 20 minutes, until crust is brown and filling hot and bubbly. Serve immediately.

Anchovy Pizza: Follow recipe for Pizza except — substitute 2 cans anchovies, chopped, for salami.

Hamburger Pizza: Follow recipe for Pizza except — prepare topping before making crust and substitute 1 pound cooked ground beef and 1/2 cup chopped green pepper for salami.

Pepperoni Pizza: Follow recipe for Pizza except — substitute 1 cup sliced pepperoni for salami.

Mushroom Pizza: Follow recipe for Pizza except — substitute 2 cans (4 ounces each) mushrooms, sauteed in butter, for salami.

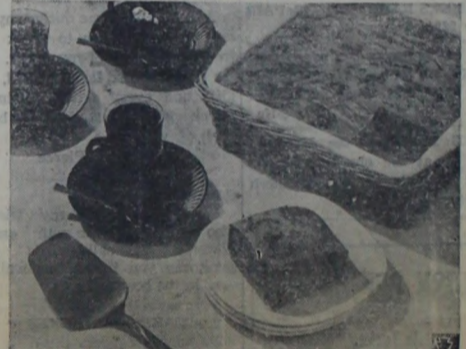
