Memories Of Crank Phones And The Old Party Line In Flomot Long Ago

Warm memories are sure to be stirred by remembrance of crank phones and the old party lines of long ago during the Flomot Tri-Annual Homecoming Saturday, July 6th.

Just ask a grandparent who remembers the days before that "Infernal Ringing Box", the telephone was omnipresent. Yes, there as a day when total strangers didn't have the power to make bells ring in your home.

Would you believe Flomot had numerous stores in the 1920's

and 30's and not a single one today? The M.J. Pyron family had a large home that accommodated a meat market, cafe and telephone exchange

Families put up individual owned telephone lines and crank type telephones. To make a long distance call, they had to go to the Pyron telephone switchboard in Flomot. The big problem was they closed the switchboard for lunch, dinner and at bedtime.

Using a series of signals called "shorts" and "longs" you could

still call the other people on your line. When the phone rang, if you picked it up quickly, you could hear 12 more clicks. I think that the modern television talk show got its start on the party line. You didn't discuss anything on the party line you didn't want public. However, everyone knew that in case of an emergency, they could give a general ring and get instant help from their


You will have to give Alexander Graham Bell credit for the first telephone, March 10, 1876, that allowed us to get in touch without smoke signals. This invention has become a necessity and a blessing. It is a curse when trying to get your doctor, dentist or a business and get a recording that gives you 10 options, none of which applies to your problem. If you had a choice, you would rather wait for two old ladies to get off the line than sort through all the options!

The old time phones were wall models and usually in kitchens or a huge wooden contraption used mostly on farms. It was both exciting and sad when the first dial telephone was installed. There had been something friendly about a human voice saying, "Number

In 1963 bids were taken for construction of rural telephone lines in the Flomot and Whiteflat areas. Telephone service was established in 1967 with Caprock Telephone Company in Spur. The service began with party lines and they became private lines several years later. You have to dial 7 numbers to get a local number and as many as 11 to get long distance

Joe Degan of Flomot served on the board of directors of Caprock Telephone Company from its inception until his death in 1992. His son, Stanley Degan of Kalgary is serving on the board today

I wonder if the younger generation would know how to turn the crank on one of those old phones and say, "Hello, Central?

Farris Wade Martin entered the Armed Forces on February 4, 1943. He served in the U.S. Army. He trained at Camp Howze in Gainsville, Texas.

Farris went overseas May 7, 1944 to New Caladonia where he joined the 25th Infantry Division. He left there November 18, 1944 to Luzon in the Philippines. He went ashore January 9, 1945 and fought the Japanese for 165 days.

He was decorated with the Combat Infantryman Badge. He also received the American Theater Ribbon, Asiatic Pacific Theater Ribbon, Philippine Liberation Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal and Victory Medal.

Farris returned to the United States and was discharged January 14, 1946 at Fort Bliss, Texas. He served a total of three

Lynn Cullen Davis entered the Armed Forces on January 21, 1942. He served in the U.S. Air Corps. He trained at Davis Monthan Field, Tucson, Ari-

Lynn went overseas on December 25, 1943. He was in the Theatre of Operations in the Pacific in the Philippine Islands, New Guinea, Mendaua, Leyte, Mendora and Luzon during 1944 and 1945.

He was discharged on November 29, 1945. He achieved the rank of Master Sergeant and served a total of thirty five months.

Silverton Man Charged In Shooting Death Of Turkey Native On Sunday

A Silverton man was charged Monday with murder in the early Sunday morning shooting death of Joe Mark House, a Tarkey native, said Becky McPherson, 110th District Attorney.

In a statement McPherson said, "Fernando Patino, 45, of Silverton, is accused of shooting Joe House, 41, of Amarillo, with a handgun outside the home of Linda Baird, in Silverton."

Patino was arrested a block from Baird's house and charged with the unlawful carrying of a weapon, McPherson said

She went on to say, Patino was later charged with attempted murder also, because he apparently shot at Baird, but she was not hit by any bullets. Patino is being held in Swisher County Jail.

House's body was sent to Lubbock on Monday for an autopsy and it was not know when results would be available.

McPherson said details were sketchy at this time on the crime, but the Briscoe County Sheriff's office and the Texas Rangers are currently investigating all aspects of the incident.

McPherson said charges could be presented to a grand jury as early as August 5. A conviction on the murder charge could carry from five to 99 years in prison.







2002 Loan Premium And Discount Table **Shows Across The Board Increase**

Following USDA's June 24 release of the 2002 Upland Cotton Loan Premium and Discount tables, High Plains cotton growers can point to a solid piece of good news regarding the 2002 crop.

The first thing that growers will notice is that across the board the new loan chart contains lower discounts for all grade combinations and

only a few scattered instances of smaller premiums on higher Grade/Staple

Another boon for producers is the fact that the trend toward smaller discounts carries over to the Micronaire Discount T able which has lower discounts throughout.

Discount tables for Uniformity and Bark proved to be little changed in

the 2002 schedule. Strength discounts, however, did increase slightly in

The tables provide the applicable premium and discount figures used to determine marketing loan values for cotton produced in the United States and cotton supplied as loan collateral to the Commodity Credit

USDA indicates that the 2002 table was developed using an evenly weighted mix of the 2001 Crop Premium and Discount table and reported 2001 Crop Spot Market quotations. This is the usual manner for determining Premium and Discount tables for Upland cotton and was unaffected by the recent passage of the Farm Security Act of 2002.

Outdoor grilling is a popular way to prepare food during warmer weather while enjoying the company of family and friends. However, grill-ing does "open the door" to foodborne illness if proper cleanliness and preparation measures are not followed. Also, excessive smoke and charring may be unhealthy and should be avoided.

To keep your cookout a fond memory rather than a regretful experience, follow these simple steps from Cory Edwards, CEA-FCS of T exas Cooperative Extension, Briscoe County:

FOOD PREPARATION:

elect fresh meat, poultry, or seafood that is high quality for best cook-

Keep these perishable products at 40 $^{\rm o}$ F or colder until immediately * Marinate foods in the refrigerator or defrost in microwave and immediately place on grill.

* Marinate foods in the refrigerator and discard leftover marinade.

* Wash your hands before and after working with raw meat, poultry or

* Wash your work surfaces and cutting boards with hot soapy water before and after preparing food. To sanitize use 1 tsp. bleach per quart of water. If possible, use a separate cutting board for fresh produce and raw meat, poultry, or seafood.

* When away from home, keep your meat and poultry away from other

food in a separate cooler with ice

* After placing raw meat on the grill, wash utensils and platters with

hot, soapy water before using them to serve cooked food.

* Cook foods to an internal temperature that destroys harmful bacteria. Check the temperature by placing a thermometer in the center most part of the meat, not touching the bone. Internal temperatures for thor ough cooking to prevent foodborne illness are; whole poultry 180 °F; poultry breasts 170° F; ground beef patties 160° F; ground poultry 165° F; beef, veal, or lamb steaks, roasts, or chops 145 °F; all cuts of pork 160° F * Serve food immediately after grilling or keep at 140 $^{\circ}$ F or above until

* Place on a clean platter.

* Refrigerate all leftovers immediately at 40 ° F or below.

* Discard any food left out longer than 2 hours or 1 hour if temperare is above 90 ° F. **GRILLING TIPS**

To prevent heavy smoking or charring of food and less smoke in your eyes follow these tips:

* Choose low fat meats or trim excess fat before grilling

* Precook meat in the microwave or by boiling to release juices that may cause flare ups. Do not interrupt cooking, Immediately transfer precooked food to the grill to finish cooking and provide "cookout" flavor

* Avoid high fat marinades or basting sauces.

* Cover grill with aluminum foil. Punch holes between grids to re-




