Briscoe Co. Extension

A variety of computer programs which will help cattle operators make management decisions will be explained during a two-day short course at the Texas A&M University System Computer Training and Education Center at Halfway.

The training, July 23-24, will be presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Extension agricultural economists and management specialists Stan Bevers of Vernon and Jose Pena of Uvalde will conduct the course.

The program will cover several software programs designed to help with cattle production records and decisions. These include historical calf records, weaning weights, birth weights, herd summaries and programs on 205 adjusted weight gains.

"We will look at the Quicken program and how it can be used in cow-calf operations," according to Bevers.

Participants will receive hands-on instruction in operating the programs. Training will be from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. daily.

The \$100 registration fee includes training materials and catered lunch each day. The computer training center is 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70. Lodging is available in Plainview.

Deadline for registration is July 17. Participants may sign up by telephoning Jane Green at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock, Telephone 806-746-6101.

League Clay of Clovis, NM, 15 year old grandson of League Clay of Flomot, had recent meniscus transplant surgery on his knee at the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. Orthopedist Stephen Cord is believed to be the only doctor in Texas performing the procedure.

A meniscus from a cadaver was frozen for four months prior to the transplant to allow time for all disease tests to come back negative. The donor's meniscus was placed in the knee with sutures and pins during a two hour operation.

Within three days, League was dismissed from hospital. A brace and crutches will be his constant companions for three months. If the transplanted meniscus tears again, surgery is not recommended a second time.

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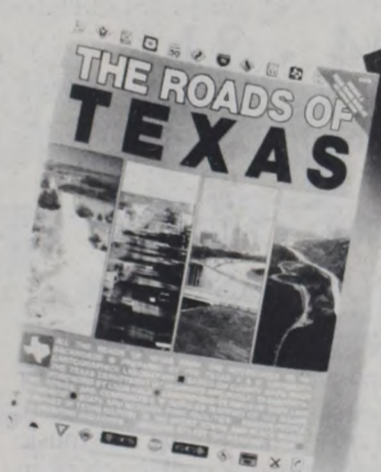

Social Security News

Not all Farm Work is covered by Social Security. Farmers and farm workers need to know when farm work is covered by Social Security.

Farmers must pay Social Security taxes for any worker who is paid at least \$150 in cash during the year. If the farmer's total expense for agricultural labor is \$2,500 or more, all workers are covered by

Social Security, even if they earn less than \$150. An exception is made for some piece-work laborers.

The exception applies to laborers who live at home and commute to work daily during harvest season to pick fruit or vegetables by hand. If the work is paid on a piece rate basis, it is only covered by Social

Security if the worker is paid at least \$150 in cash.

To Toss Texas G

Editor's Note: See the Omnibus Recycling bill relating to recycling reduction. Texas cities are asked to implement programs to recycle 40 percent of their solid waste by 1994. The City of Quitaque is a recycling program. Cost-effective and requirements set forth at the same time, the city is trying to consider all solid waste disposal alternatives that house trash will be prohibited. 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To Toss or Not to Toss; Texas Garbage A Problem

Editor's Note: Senate Bill 1340—the Omnibus Recycling Bill—deals with solid waste management, especially relating to recycling and waste reduction. Texas cities are being asked to implement recycling programs to recycle 40 percent of their solid waste by 1994.

The City of Quitaque is developing a recycling program that will be cost-effective and will meet the requirements set forth in this bill. At the same time, the city is also continuing to consider alternate forms of solid waste disposal as there are indications that household burning of trash will be prohibited.

The following editorial by David Brunson, Quitaque city manager, relates to the garbage issue faced by all Texas cities.

Garbage and what we do with it is a high-visibility issue these days, as communities around the country find they generate more solid waste than they have places to dispose of it.

Every day, each person in Texas produces 3.5 pounds of solid waste that ultimately ends up in landfills. Many of these landfills will soon reach capacity and be forced to close. Because of the difficulty and expense of siting new landfills, each of us must begin to practice the easiest and most responsible alternatives: waste reduction and recycling.

The following steps can greatly reduce the amount of solid waste placed in landfills, conserve energy, and reduce the drain we are presently placing on our non-renewable resources.

- Avoid buying products with excess packaging. Product packaging accounts for one-half of our domestic trash by volume.

- Buy in bulk. It is not only cheaper but eliminates the need for many small containers.

- Don't accept bags or boxes if you don't need them. Bring your own bag, or put the goods in your pockets, purse or briefcase.

- Avoid buying throwaways. No one really needs a disposable camera or razor, and neither do the landfills.

- Save your aluminum cans. Taking your aluminum cans to a recycling center not only saves raw natural resources and energy, it can bring you a little extra cash.

- Ask about the availability of recycled paper in grocery, drug, or stationery store. Paper towels,

napkins, bags, tissue, writing paper, art construction paper, and greeting cards are frequently made from recycled fiber. Buy them and encourage your friends and family to buy them.

- Recycle waste paper. Recycling old newspapers into new paper takes 34 percent less energy than making paper from virgin pulp.

- Avoid hazardous disposal of motor oil. Never throw old motor oil down the sewer or drain, or on the ground. Motor oil can be cleaned and reused.

- Recycle your yard clippings. A backyard compost pile for yourself or your neighborhood is a source of mulch and soil-enriching nutrients which can replace manufactured fertilizers.

- Install a low-flow shower head and low-flow aerators on kitchen and bathroom sink faucets. Water use is cut by out half. A typical family of four can save as much as 280 gallons per month by installing low-flow aerators on sink faucets.

- Save water each time you flush. Installing a water-filled plastic jug in the toilet tank will save a gallon of water per flush.

- Use screw-in fluorescent bulbs instead of your regular bulbs. "Compact fluorescent bulbs," cost \$10 to \$20 each but slash electricity consumption by 75 percent and last 10,000 hours. The savings over the life of the fluorescent bulb is about \$30.

- Keep your tires properly inflated. It will give you up to 5 percent more miles per gallon. The tires last longer, too.

- Plant a tree. Planting a tree in your yard will help the earth's atmosphere.

By making these minor adjustments in our everyday lives, we can protect our environment for future generations, conserve our natural resources, reduce the final costs of solid waste disposal, and put a little extra spending money in our pockets.



Road trips can be taxing

Many Texans rent trailers and vans for summer vacation. Texas has an abundance of private campgrounds to park these recreational vehicles.

No sales tax is charged for RV and trailer hookups at these campgrounds. But sales tax is due when you rent RVs. The tax rate is 6 percent, but no local tax is charged. Even non-profit organizations that do not usually pay sales tax must pay tax when they rent RVs.

Bus tours are taxable

Guided bus tours are taxable amusement services. Tour companies will sometimes separate the cost of their services from the fee for the bus, but itemizing shouldn't change the amount subject to sales tax. Tax is due on the total cost of the tour.

Don't pay the baby-sitter tax

When you hire someone to look after your children and home while you're away on vacation, no taxes are collected.

Most personal services such as house sitting, haircutting and manicuring are not taxable. Even if you take your children to a day care for babysitting, no tax is due.

However, commercial maid and lawn maintenance services are taxable. When you hire a commercial maid service to clean your house or office, or a gardener to take care of your lawn and garden, you owe tax. These folks are hired to provide a specific taxable service.

Employers Of Domestic Workers, Certain Farmers Not Required To File Notice Of No Coverage

A major new filing requirement for Texas employers does not apply to employers of domestic workers and certain farmers, the Texas Workers' Compensation Commission (TWCC) has announced.

Texas employers who have one or more employees and who did not carry workers' compensation insurance as of March 20, 1991, were required to file Form TWCC-5, the "Employer Notice of No Coverage," with the TWCC by May 15, 1991.

On June 7, the six member Commission amended the TWCC rule relating to the Notice of No Coverage, excluding certain employees. The amendment states that a person who employs only employees who are exempted under Section 3.10 of the new workers compensation law does not have to

Study tax records before you buy a business

If you're planning to buy an existing business, find out if it owes any state taxes beforehand. A little research may keep you from being stuck with a second-hand debt you knew nothing about.

Texas law holds the buyer of a business responsible for any tax owed by the previous owner. The buyer is also required to withhold money from the purchase price to cover a tax liability.

There's an easy way to find out if the business you are purchasing still has a tax liability with the state. Just contact the Comptroller's Office.

Our office will send you either a Certificate of No Tax Due or a statement of the amount of tax that must be paid before a certificate can be issued.

file a notice. Employees exempted under Section 3.10 include a person employed as a domestic worker or a casual worker engaged in employment incidental to a personal residence, and certain farm and ranch employees.

However, some farm and ranch employees are subject to the new law: migrant workers, certain seasonal workers, and employees of a person who meets a gross annual payroll specified by the new law. Employers of farm workers are encouraged to consult with an insurance agent concerning their specific situations.

Please be advised that the amendment does not change the filing requirement for an individual who has incorporated. An individual who "incorporates" and is the corporation's only employee must file the TWCC-5 on behalf of the corporation.

Although the Commission amended the rule after the May 15, 1991 filing deadline, the change is retroactive. Employers who are exempt now are also considered to have been exempt for the May 15, 1991 filing deadline.

Beginning June 1, 1991, penalties and sanctions of the new law went into effect. As of June 1, employers who are required to file, and who fail to file the yearly notice of non-coverage by May 15 may be assessed an administrative penalty of \$500 for each day of non-compliance.

Copies of form TWCC-5 were mailed to employers statewide in April. The form was included in a mailout called the "New Law Guide To Workers Compensation For The Employees And Employers Of Texas."

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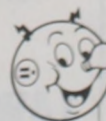
