#### BIG RETURNS FROM FERTILIZER

Fertilizer properly used is an important factor in the farm program. W. E. Nisbet, county agent in Ander son county, sends in the following returns of farms which should be interesting to our readers:

An average increase of 84 per cent in lint cotton was secured this year with commercial fertilizer. Records kept by a number of farmer representing every section of the county show by comparing the unfertilized cotton that such an increase was obtained. The largest increase obtained by any individual was 128 per cent and the lowest was 46 per cent. Of the group of farmers reporting only one used a low grade fertilizer and he reported the smallest increase. A larger increase was obtained in seed than in lint.
