## GMC OFFICIALS STARTED HERE; VISIT CHEVY AGENCY

Two officials of the General Motors Corporation inspected the mechanic's work bench where they got their start at Rutherford Chevrolet in Cisco last Thursday afternoon.

They were C. R. (Bob) Sanford, assistant manager of the Technical Service Department, Chevrolet Motors Division, Detroit; and R. L. (Dick) Thackeron, field service engineer,

Heavy Duty Truck Division, Southwest Region, General Motors, Dallas.

Both men, along with others, got their start in the automotive field at the Chevrolet garage in Cisco, and both had words of praise for the small town auto agencies that are a training ground for men who are high in the industry.

Mr. Sanford started at the old C. O. Pass Chevrolet Company in Cisco in 1928 and stayed on with the garage when it became A-G Motor Company two years later. In 1941, he accepted a job with the Abilene Chevy dealer and, in 1946, joined GMC as zone service manager at El Paso.

In 1950, Mr. Sanford went to Dallas as regional service manager. Six years later, he was promoted to be the regional service engineer. Last June, Mr. Sanford went to Detroit to take over his present post. His work deals primarily with handling liaison matters between field service and engineering centers and on future design work in engines.

Mr. Thackeron, who used to operate at the same mechanic's station at the local Chevy agency, is a native of Breckenridge and went to work at the local garage in 1940. He remained there until 1953 when he joined GMC as the used car reconditioning director. Four years later, he went to Dallas as a service representative.

In 1961, Mr. Thackeron was sent to Dallas as the area service manager for heavy duty trucks. He was promoted to his present post, which covers four states, last year. The Thackeron family lives in Irving.

Two other "graduates" of the Cisco Chevy agency who have important jobs with General Motors are Blake Stephens of Dallas, the Oldsmobile service representative for this region; and Pete Clements of El Paso, assistant zone service manager.

Mr. Sanford recalled that the Cisco High School distributive education program was responsible for many young men to find rewarding careers in the automobile industry.

Both GMC officials visited the Rutherford agency in a business tour of the Dallas region.

## Statement Made By Carrel Smith In Council Race

Carrel Smith, a resident of the Cisco area most of his life, has authorized The Press to announce that he will be a candidate for the city commission in the annual April 6th election. A mayor and two commissioners will be chosen at that time.

Mr. Smith was born in Eastland County and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Smith of Cisco. He is a graduate of the Cisco schools and is employed as a substitute mail carrier at the Cisco-Post Office. He has been Cisco agent for the Abilene Reporter-News for the past 12 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have two daughters, both married, and own their home at 1204 Avenue G. They are members of the First Methodist Church.

"I have lived in Cisco for 34 years," Mr. Smith said. "There isn't a nicer town in Texas. I have been in business for 20 years. There are always going to be a few soreheads in any town. That is what it takes to make us stay on our toes."

"Cisco has a city charter to go by in running the city's business and when we don't abide by the charter we defeat its purpose."

A Hampshire, shown by Bill Cozart, Cisco FFA boy, is the grand champion fat pig of the 1965 Eastland County Livestock Show which unreeled in Eastland this weekend.

Over 500 animals competed for prize money and ribbons in the annual show, and the quality of the stock prompted judges to exclaim "Tops," and "As good as you'll find," repeatedly. Some \$1,800 went as prize money.

Terry Geyer, Rising Star FFA member, showed the reserve champion fat pig, a Duroc, during the Friday afternoon competition.

All animals were to have been on the grounds by 10 p. m. Thursday and classifying and sifting began at 8 a. m. Friday. Judging of Angora Goats began at 10 a. m. and the breeding swine judging at 1 p. m. Fat barrow judging

began at 2. Breeding sheep (fine wool, Southdown and others) got under way at 7 p. m. Friday, followed by a FFA-4-H judging contest.

Saturday's action began with fat lamb judging at 8; fat steer judging at 11; and breeding beef cattle at 2 p. m. The annual auction at the Eastland Auction Co. closed the crowd-attracting event Saturday night.

Sam Kimmell of Cisco is president of the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, and Robert Kincaid of Cisco was general show superintendent. Both called this year's show a great success.

Wm. Leland Willis, athletic director at Cisco Junior College for the past four years, has been promoted to the position of academic dean, according to an announcement by President G. C. Hogue.

The promotion of Mr. Willis and the employment of 17 faculty members for the 1965-66 school year was approved by the CJC board of regents at their regular monthly meeting last Tuesday night, Mr. Hogue reported.

Mr. Hogue said that five or six more instructors would be needed to complete the faculty. He described the outlook for the coming year's student body as "the best we have ever had."

The new dean came to Cisco in 1960 after teaching experience at Walnut Springs, Fairfield and Henderson County JC. He holds a BA degree from Daniel Baker College and a ME degree from Howard Payne College. He has done a considerable graduate study toward a doctor's degree.

Dean Willis, who is 39, is a Methodist and the father of two children — Ronnie, 18, a CHS junior, and Jana, 10, a 5th grader. He is the son of a retired college professor. He is a native of Abilene.

In other action, the board heard reports on plans for a new dormitory and student union building at the college. Dr. H. C. Brown, board president, presided over the meeting.

## Improvements on First Baptist Church Continue

## Special Venire Is Called For Trial

Maurine Bratton, 45, of Ranger will go on trial for murder in 91st District Court Monday morning. She is under indictment for the Sept. 30, 1963, slaying of her former husband, R. L. Bratton.

The couple had been divorced for some time. The shooting occurred at Mrs. Bratton's ranch home near Ranger.

She has been free on \$2,500 bond since. Her attorney, Bill Hart of Eastland, said that no continuance motion will be asked, and that he is ready to go to trial.

District - County Attorney Perry Brown states that he is also ready for trial.

A special venire of 100 persons has been called for possible service, and qualification will begin at 9 a.m. Monday. Mr. Brown indicated that he will attempt to qualify jurors on the death sentence.

District Judge Frank Sparks, who estimates that the trial will take about three days, expressed confidence that a jury can be picked from the venire, without calling additional.

(Attorneys can strike 15 each for no stated cause and any number for cause.)

The indictment against Mrs. Bratton charges murder with malice.

The case this week will mark the first murder trial in the 91st District Court to be presided over by Judge Sparks and prosecuted by Attorney Brown.

Attorney Hart successfully represented a Ranger Negro last fall and won an acquittal on a murder trial.

Mrs. Bratton, her 19-year-old daughter and two grandchildren, live at the ranch home near Ranger.

## Grand Jury Indicts 9

A 91st District Court grand jury handed down nine indictments during a brief session Friday — bringing to 24 the number rendered this term.

Going into huddle at 9 a. m., the jury was finished and recessed by 1:30 p.m. Most were for theft.

In mid-February, the same grand jury handed down 15 indictments—two for burglary, one for robbery by assault, three DWI's and nine thefts.

This is the Friday report: four for theft; one for forgery and passing; two for burglary; one automobile theft; one theft by false pretense.

## Criminal Cases Set For Thursday

A jury panel of 35 names has been called for service in 91st District Court for Thursday, March 18, at 9 a.m., when several criminal cases are set.

Those called are the same ones who were called late last month for possible service in a damage suit trial, which was settled and never brought to trial. Fifteen of the original 50 of that No. One list were excused.

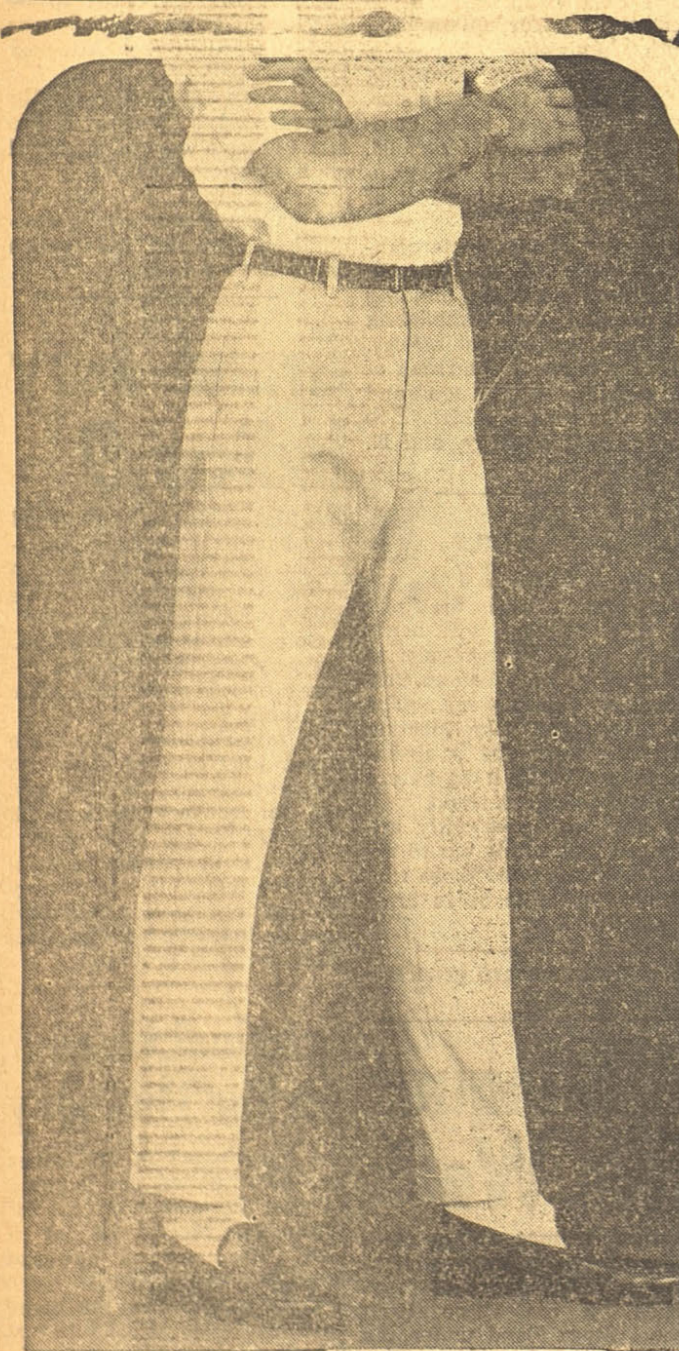

## The Book Corner

News Notes About The Cisco Public Library

One of the books in the new list section of the Cisco Public Library is "When the Cheering Stopped" by Gene Smith. This is the extraordinary story of Woodrow Wilson's last years in the White House and after, and the part played by his wife when the Nation was without a President able to perform his duties.

For seventeen long months the President of the United States was completely isolated from the world by his wife and his doctor following two thrombosis attacks. No one was allowed to see him. Senators, Cabinet officers, the Vice President, all were left in the dark, and the President's orders were scribbled in his wife's handwriting. The revelation of what happened in the White House during this and what was to follow make "When the Cheering Stopped" a unique book and one that will touch the heart.

"Unquestionably, too," says Allan Nevins in his Introduction, "this book will confirm students in their belief that the country should be armed against the recurrence of such lapse in executive authority as that here traced." It was during these months that the Senate decreed there would be no American entrance into the League of Nations.

The author, Gene Smith, was born in 1929, received his B. S. from the University of Wisconsin in 1952, served in the United States Army, and has worked as a newspaperman and free-lance writer. A lifelong interest in American history proved invaluable when he undertook the immense task of research for the writing of this book. This reviewer considers the book a "Must" for those interested in the present world situation, and past events which have led to what is now happening. Another book of interest is "The Naked City" by Vance Packard, who examines the rapidly disappearing right of individual privacy under the onslaught of Orwell's Big Brother Philosophy that is

pervading Big Government, Big Business, Big Education, and society in general. Unknown to most of us, an army of investigators is probing into our bank accounts, checking our private lives, even bugging our bedrooms, offices and automobiles.

Mr. Packard takes us with terrifying detail through the twilight world of the snooper, be he insurance investigator or personal checker for a prospective employer. He has had the benefit of experiences and know-how of a great many highly knowledgeable investigative experts, including, among others, Guenther Reinhardt. He unveils the ramifications of the secret traffic in private information between investigative agencies, both governmental and private. There are fascinating sections on what employers are doing and how our children are being subjected in school to alleged personality testing that probes into the most intimate aspects of their parental and sexual attitudes and relationships, the results of which are held secret from the parents. It is an alarming picture Mr. Packard paints of the surveillance to which we are all subjected — and for the most part surreptitiously.

The author asserts that we do not have to stand for such invasions of privacy, that good government and economic efficiency are not inconsistent with private rights, and that a mobilized public opinion behind judges, legislators and individual citizens who are striking out courageously against this can bring a halt to the creeping erosion of our basic rights.

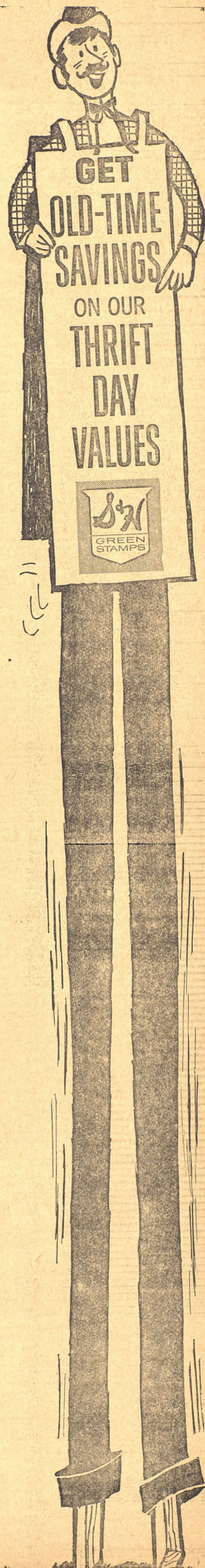

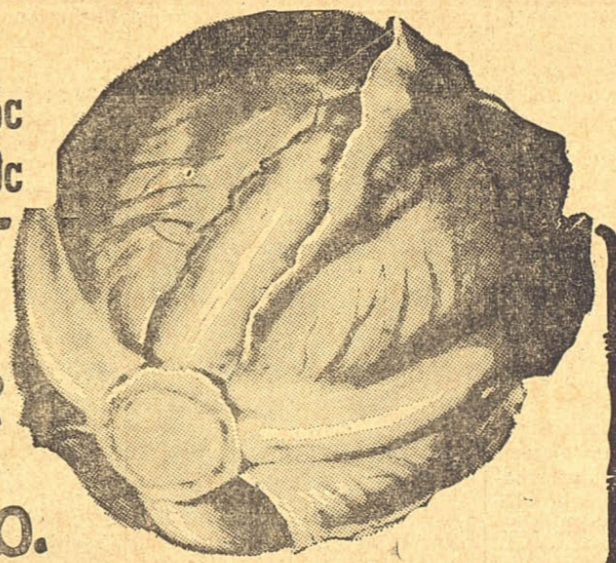

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## Advance Payments Offered With Feed Grain Program

Advance payments again this year are available to growers signing up to participate in the feed grain program, Elmer E. Blackwell, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation East-

land County Committee, has announced. Similar payments were available under the 1964 feed grain program.

According to the chairman, the advance payment will represent one-half of the esti-

ated total diversion payment to be earned under the 1965 program. The rest of the diversion payment and all of the price-support payment earned under the program will be made next fall.

The 1965 feed grain program again covers corn, barley and grain sorghum. Participants in the program may qualify for a payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved conserving uses, and also for a price-support payment on the normal production of the 1965 feed grain acreage. They will also be eligible for price-support loans on their entire production from the feed grain acreage.

Each farm has a total feed grain base, representing the combined acreage of the three feed grains grown on the farm. A producer may divert one or more of the feed grains, and his diversion payment will be based on the per-acre rate which applies to the grain diverted. Minimum diversion under the program is 20 per cent of the total feed grain base; maximum diversion is 50 per cent of the base or 25 acres if this is more.

While participation in the 1965 feed grain program is voluntary, Mr. Blackwell pointed out, the price-support payments and loans, as well as the diversion payments, will be available only to growers who sign up and carry out the program's provisions. Signup for the program started February 8 and will continue through March 26.
