


Lions Enjoy Mobley Restoration Work To Start In Coming Week

The explosion of some 25 pieces of fireworks that were ignited when sparks from a "dud" fell into their midst provided a spectacular finale for the community's annual July the Fourth program at City Park last Thursday night.

There were no injuries and no damage as the assorted fireworks shells went off simultaneously, shooting a curtain of colored fire from the ground to about 100 feet into the air. Supervisor Bruce Smith, who was directing a group using three mortars, saw sparks from the "dud" fall into the box of fireworks and yelled a warning.

Working at the mortar site with Mr. Smith were Frank Spangler, Keith Deitiker, Greg Qualls and Bobby Fink. Two fire trucks and an ambulance were standing by. Several patches of grass nearby were set on fire and firemen quickly extinguished the flames.

The day-long program opened at 10 a.m. with a flag raising ceremony at the park flag pole. The Dyess Air Force Base color guard, which had accepted an invitation to hold the ceremony, was unable to attend due to a conflict with a funeral service. In their absence, Sgt. Al Gaeta, Jr., of Cisco, and Private Billy Tidford of Eastland, members of the National Guard Unit at Breckenridge, raised the flag. Cisco's Sweet Carolines led in singing the national anthem.

To open the day's activities, the City Park Swimming Pool held Splash Day and staged a number of contests in the pool for area youngsters. Carnival booths were opened by the Cisco Lions Club, the Girls Softball Association, and others around 10 a.m. and remained open until after the fireworks show at 10 p.m.

Beginning at 11:30 a.m. with singing by Pat Owens, there was continuous entertainment at the Lions Pavilion, including the Senior Citizens Band, the Sweet Carolines and the Ghost Riders Band.

National Issues Report Is Made By Congressman

The tobacco industry, which received a large federal subsidy, faces a trouble in congress, he said. Answering questions, Mr. Stenholm said that he thought Kent Hance made a mistake when he recently switched from the Democratic Party to the Republican Party. "He is my good friend, but I think he was wrong," he said. "I expect to remain a Democrat. I believe in the two party system."

The congressman said he would not vote to send troops to Nicaragua or any Central American country. He added that "we must send notice to Russia that we will not allow another 'Cuba' in our hemisphere."

Why do people dislike our government, he was asked? His answer: "Perhaps it's because you and most people do. He suggested that America might seek the advice of allies in efforts to improve the country's international image."

NOTES—Arrangements for the coffee were made by the farmers of the United States are subsidizing consumers and this condition must change, Mr. Stenholm said. "We are producing more than we can use and sell. We have a bumper crop this year and there is no market for much of it."

Mr. Stenholm said the house agriculture committee would offer solutions to farm problems but that passage of their recommendations would face a hard fight in the house.

Mr. Stenholm suggested that retaliation would not be appropriate without knowing the identity of those we relate against." He expressed the hope that "we can deal on their terms."

Commenting on the state of the economy, Mr. Stenholm noted that "everybody wants tax reform—for others." Few members of congress, he said, believe that a tax reduction would solve the deficit problem.

The country's trade deficit is alarming, he said. "We are exporting jobs at an unrestricted rate and have been for several years—jobs in oil, automobiles, agriculture and textiles."

The dollar's high rating over the world, he added, "gives us a 40 per cent handicap in world trade."

Solving the growing deficit problem will require a cut in defense spending and in entitlements, the congressman believes. He said the Pentagon's spending would have to be limited and that cost of living increases in pensions would have to be frozen for all except the poorest of the poor and the elderly with no income other than pensions.

water is all that is available then I recommend that you boil the water 15 minutes in a stainless steel or enamel-lined container. Remove from heat, cover, and let sit 24 hours. Remove the scum which may form and slowly pour the water from container, taking care not to disturb the sediment on bottom.

Successful pickling comes from following recommended directions exactly, never double or triple recipes. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service & USDA recommend the quick boiling-water bath method for processing pickles and relishes. This helps to destroy bacteria, molds, yeast and enzymes which cause spoilage of food.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
Squash is very abundant now in our gardens and if you find yourself with more squash than you can use — then I recommend you try Squash Pickles.

SQUASH PICKLES
8 cups sliced yellow squash,
 $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick
2 cups sliced onions
2 large green bell peppers
1 small jar pimento peppers
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup salt
3 cups sugar

Galvanized or iron utensils; these metals may react with acids or salts and cause undesirable color changes in the pickles or form undesirable compounds some of which may be toxic. Also use fresh spices.

Spices can be tied in a cheese cloth bag and heated with the brine or put directly in the jar. Whole or ground spices may tend to darken pickles if left in the final packing container. Often I am asked why the recipe calls for a grape leaf. Grape leaves may be added during brining to inhibit enzyme activity which may lead to softening. Your Muscadine grape leaves are best since they contain the highest amount of tannin which is the main substance responsible for this inhibitory action. The tannin-like substances are very bitter and could cause some off flavors if too many leaves are added.

It is best not to use hard water when pickling if hard







Hilo, Hawaii



"...between Hell and high water..."

Tuesday at Hilo, Hawaii (the big island). Capt. Wu's quote of the day was especially meaningful. "Success is a journey, not a destination". The 18th was our 25th wedding anniversary and we made arrangements for the captain to preside at the re-newing of our vows, set for the next day.

Hilo is a quite tropical seaport town; its history filled with devastation. Much of the coastline was wiped out by a great tidal wave in 1946. Another, in 1960, was less destructive, but took 61 lives and injured 300 more. Though much of the town was rebuilt, the waterfront area in the arc of the bay has been left as a park - and a safety barrier.

In addition to the threats from the sea including tidal waves, Hilo rests in the shadow of two 13,000 foot volcanoes. A local told us: "We live between hell and high water!"


Dormant Mauna Kea is a snow-capped ski spot and is not considered extinct.

Active Mauna Loa may be the largest single mountain on earth. It rises 13,677 feet above sea level and extends another 16,000 feet to the ocean floor. In 1881 lava flowed from Mauna Loa to within a mile and half of downtown Hilo. Flows from the eruption of 1964 stopped 16 miles above downtown. Steam can be seen rising from the flow area of March, 1964, which has not cooled.


Four-thousand foot Kilauea, the most active volcano in the world, poses little threat to Hilo itself, but to the districts of Puna and Kau to the south of Hilo, the wrath is ever imminent. Since January, 1983, Kilauea has erupted near once a month - going up on the Wednesday, a week before our arrival. In recent history, lava flows have added some 500 acres to the big island.

Our tour choice naturally (but with a bit of fear and tremble) was to the volcano areas, which also included a side trip to a nursery specializing in orchids and anthuriums, and up through a lush tropical forest and onto to Volcano National Park where we had lunch at the Volcano House overlooking Kilauea Crater. Later we viewed the sulphur banks, steam vents, drove on crater rim drive, and the spectacular Halemaumau Fire-Pit, and drove the Chain of Crater Road, all the while with a driver who kept suggesting that "Yes, it could blow again, anywhere, even under our couch."

Recent lava flows were evident as we approached the coast and our final stop was at beautiful Kalapana with its jet black sands contrasted by the Pacific swells breaking upon a coconut palm studded beach. Visitors were warned with



William C. Dowell Appointed Assistant District Attorney



William (Bill) C. Dowell has been appointed Assistant District Attorney of Eastland County, and began his work on July 1.

His office is located in the Courthouse beside of District Attorney Emory Walton, and his duties include the full range of the District Attorney's work.

These duties are to prepare and handle all misdemeanor cases in the five Justice Courts in the County; in the County Court and District Court, all felonies in District Court, and the appeal of any of these cases. Dowell has already appeared in the local Court.

His application for the Assistant D.A.'s brought Dowell to Eastland for the first time. He was born in Guthrie, Oklahoma, but attended High School in a Christian Academy in South Korea.

At that time his father, Dr. Ted H. Dowell, and his mother, Oma Lee Dowell, were Southern Baptist missionaries. Currently Dr. Ted Dowell is a professor at Southwestern Baptist

Theological Seminary in Fort Worth.

After returning from Korea, William Dowell attended Dallas Baptist College for two and one-half years, then went into the Navy for six years. He served on a submarine and went to many parts of the world.

After his enlistment was up he went to the University

of Texas at Arlington, and received a BS degree with a major in Criminal Justice.

He was then accepted at Texas Tech Law School, Lubbock, where he spent three years completing his Degree. He graduated in May, 1965, and was licensed to practice law in Texas on May 17.

"I am personally excited about coming here," the new Assistant D.A. says. "The office will offer me a unique opportunity to work with a fine, experienced District Attorney and a very professional staff."

"Furthermore - there's a friendly atmosphere in this town - something you don't

find in a big city.

"Although I have family members in Fort Worth, I plan to spend most of my weekends in Eastland and become a part of the community. I want to become actively involved in the local Church and civic life."

In discussing the appointment, District Attorney Emory Walton stated that he was certainly glad William Dowell was here.

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
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Registration For Pool Lessons

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
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
