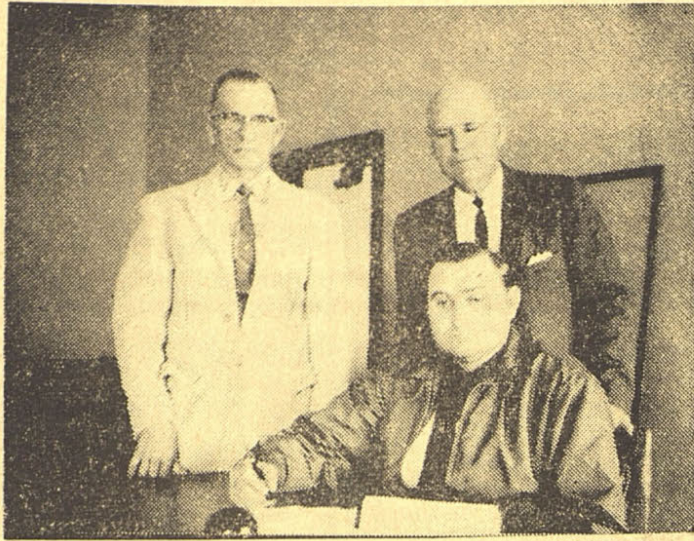

County Farm Bureau Launches Special Week

The week of Feb. 8-13 has been officially designated "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Eastland County. The local county farm organization will have a special enrollment drive underway as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas to 100,000 by Oct. 31, President Jack Cozart has announced.

An official proclamation signed by County Judge Scott Bailey called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau."

Earlier Gov. John Connally proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Membership Week in Texas." The statewide drive is to be launched with big area rallies Feb. 2 in San Antonio and Feb. 4 in Lubbock and Dallas. John Love of Ranger is chairman of the local county Farm Bureau Membership Committee. Other volunteers who will be working on the drive are: John Love, Mitchell Campbell, Cyrus Justice, R. L. Ricks, B. T. Graham, Sam Kimmell, Glenn Jordan and Albert Hendricks.

The committee chairman said every farmer and rancher in the county is needed "as a member and a leader" by the Farm Bureau. "Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in our business not to do all that we can to protect our investment in capital, time, and labor," he declared.

The Judge's proclamation pointed out the importance of agriculture "to the economic well-being" of the county, and the high standard of living made possible by the "productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers."

County Peanut Crop Yields Just Under 20 - Bushel Acres

Eastland County's 1964 peanut crop totals 14,083,423 pounds for just less than a 20-bushel per acre yield, Gilbert Meredith, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee manager, has announced.

A total of 23,585 acres, or 57 per cent, of the allotted acreage was planted in 1964, he said.

Average poundage is 597 in 1964, compared to an average of 520-pounds per acre, also just under 20 bushels to the acre, in 1963, he said.

This harvest came from 525 farms in the county, Meredith pointed out.

Peanut producers in the Southwest area have harvested and marketed a record high yield of peanuts, according to the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, with figures up through mid-January, showing a total of 125,174 tons in Texas. In 1962, yield was 613 pounds (over 20 bushels) per acre, from 29,402 acres.

Of that tonnage inspected in Texas, 3,537 tons or 2.7 per cent are segregated Two (3 and 4 per cent damaged kernels), and 2,455 tons graded segregation Three (over 4

Telephone Rate Cuts To Total \$5,600,000 Year

Telephone rate cuts saving Texas telephone users \$5,600,000 a year have been announced by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

A long distance rate saving went into effect on interstate calls Monday, Feb. 1, and similar reduction on calls within Texas will be effective on April 1.

Special long distance rates, now effective from 9 p.m. to 4:30 a.m., will be effective from 8 p.m. to 4:30 a.m.

These rates apply on station-to-station calls, with a maximum charge of \$1 for a three-minute call within the continental United States.

"In addition, since many of our customers find it convenient to make family calls on Sunday," officials said, "these lower rates will be effective all day Sunday, extending the time within which these calls can be made from 8 p.m. Saturday to 4:30 a.m. Monday."

The present "evening" rate will be in effect from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. each day, and will also apply all day Saturday on station-to-station calls.

CJC Advances In Cage Poll; To Play Temple

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College, who remained the No. 1 team of their region and advanced to No. 4 in the nation in this week's poll, will meet Temple Junior College in conference basketball action at Community Gym here at 7:30 p. m. Saturday.

The Wranglers won over Hill County JC in a game at the local gym last Monday night, giving them a season's record of 21 victories to one loss. Five games will remain on the CJC schedule after this week, Coach Leland Willis reported. They are: Feb. 9, Panola JC at Carthage; Feb. 11, Ranger JC at Cisco; Feb. 15, Weatherford JC at Cisco; Feb. 18, Navarro JC at Corsicana; and Feb. 18, Hill JC at Hillsboro.

The Wranglers are favored to win the north zone title, and a playoff with the south zone winner will be held Feb. 25-26 to determine the state winner. Wharton JC, only team to beat Cisco this sea-

son, is favorite in the south zone. Cisco is now rated over Wharton and the Wranglers are anxious to meet them again, Coach Willis said. Wharton beat CJC 85-82 in an early season game.

The Region V tournament, which will be an invitation affair for top teams in three states, will be played at Amarillo March 3-5-6. This will be followed March 11-13 with the national junior college tournament at Hutchinson, Kansas.

"We hope to go all the way," Coach Willis said. Kilgore JC, rated No. 2 in the nation, plays in the south zone and will be meeting Wharton JC soon. This meeting should produce the title winner for that zone.

National ratings published this week continued to show Dodge City, Kansas, as No. 1 in the United States, followed by Kilgore JC, New York City Community College, and Cisco JC in that order.

Auto Plates On Sale At Courthouse

License plates went on sale Monday in Eastland County and throughout the state and will end April 1. Mr. J. C. Whitley of Eastland, with his purchase of both commercial and passenger plates, was the first person to purchase license plates in Eastland, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom.

Three things are required to obtain plates for your car—the money, current registration receipt and certificate of title. Lost receipts or ownership papers may be replaced easily by sending 25 cents for each duplicate desired to the Department's Motor Vehicle Division in Austin, 40th and Jackson Streets.

Receipts may also be obtained from the county in which the vehicle was registered. To issue a duplicate, the department must first have your license number, make and vehicle identification number.

Approximately a quarter-million more vehicles have been registered yearly in the state since World War II, a trend which is expected to continue.

Although you may not be among the first to get your plates this year, you won't want to wait until the last few days to make the purchase.

Substitutions will be open on March 1 at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office; in Ranger at L&J Supply Co.; at 122 Main St.; in Gorman at Todd's Variety Store; and in Rising Star at Jenkin's Insurance Agency.

Passenger licenses for this county total 8,985 and are listed in ten series with three letter prefixes and three numerals, as follows:

Registration for night courses at Cisco Junior College will continue through Feb. 16, according to an announcement by Leland Willis, registrar.

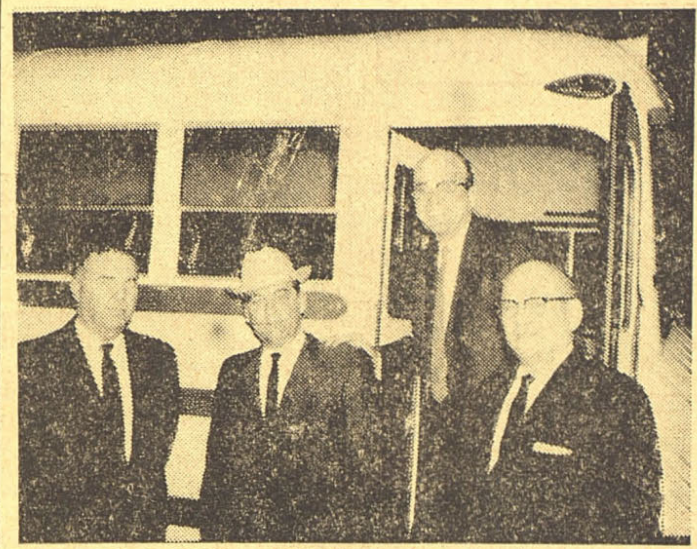

The civic workers boarded a Cisco Junior College bus at 8:30 a. m. at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco. With CJC President Grady Hogue as the driver, the bus visited in the Cisco area for an hour, inspecting Humbletown, the old Bartlett building on west Highway 80, the railroad properties and other sites with A. R. Rutherford in charge.

The bus then went to Eastland where Frank Sayre, district manager of Texas Electric Service Company, conducted a tour to the Hollywood Vassereite plant and properties, the reservoir property, St. Charles Street Property, the Airport and King Properties.

Mayor Morris Newnam was in charge of the tour of Ranger, that included a number of sites and places of interest to potential payroll.

W. C. Browning took charge for a tour of Gorman that included railroad property, two available buildings and other features. The bus then went to Rising Star where James Rutherford and A. D. Jenkins were in charge of touring industrial sites.

Poll Tax Sales Hit 2,940 In Eastland County

Sale of poll tax in Eastland County this year was "way down" compared to sales in 1963, according to Tax Collector Edgar Altom. There was a total of 2,940 sales this year, 4,738 in 1963.

Of course 1964 was a general election year which would account for the high sales then.

This year, 1,266 poll taxes were paid at the court house and sub-stations held the following numbers: Cisco, 744; Ranger, 524; Gorman, 242; and Rising Star, 164, Mr. Altom said.

In 1962, 3,982 poll taxes were paid.

Overage exemptions are not included in this report.

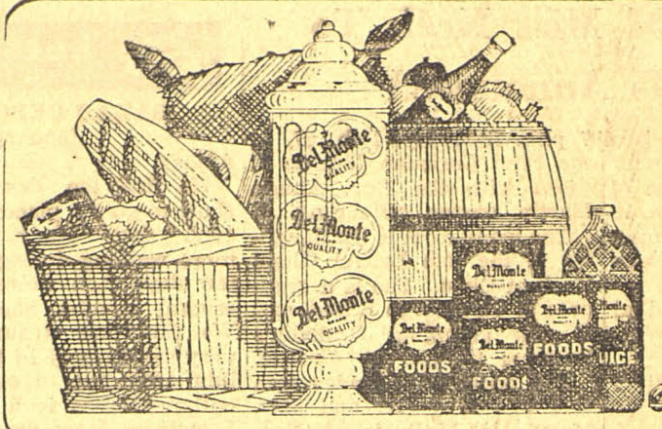

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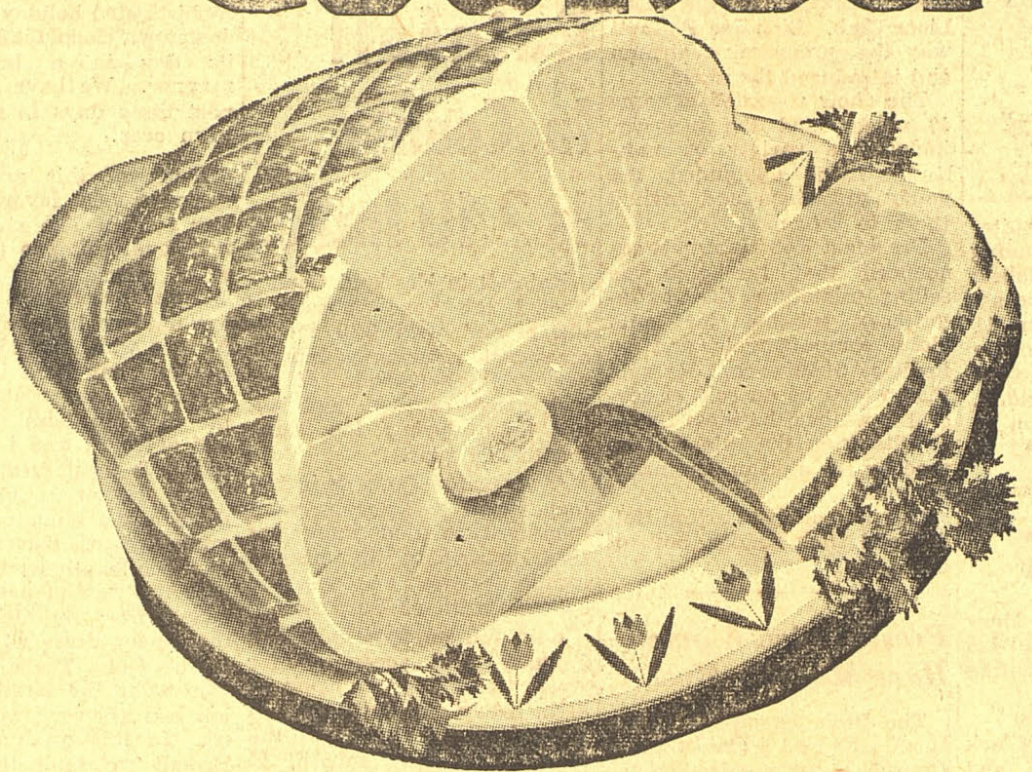
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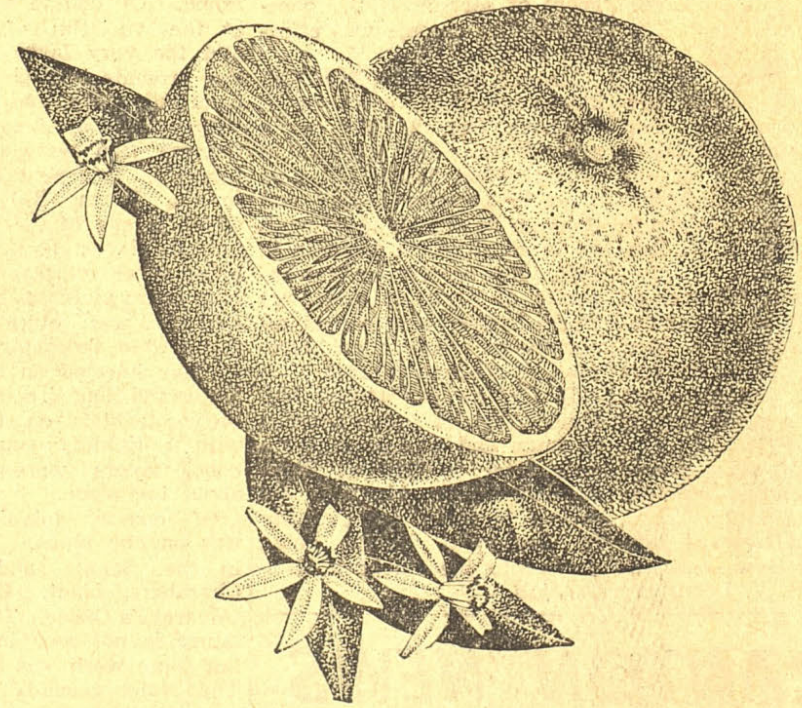

They were hospitalized in Ranger General Hospital where Mr. Griffin received treatment for a broken jaw and other minor injuries, and his wife suffered bruised ribs and cuts. The couple was released from the hospital Sunday morning and left Ranger by bus for Abilene.

Their 1965 model Plymouth was totally demolished in the accident which occurred at 11:45 a.m.

Chief Ogden said the mishap probably would have been fatal for the Louisiana couple, but they were wearing seat belts.

Believed responsible for the two Saturday morning accidents, the Ranger officer said, were a man and a woman in a 1964 or 1965 model white Ford sedan with Eastland County license tags which witnesses say rushed from the scene and headed eastward toward Ranger.

The woman, according to witnesses, was driving the car. With her in the front seat was a man wearing a western hat.

If apprehended, Chief Ogden said, the woman will be charged with leaving the scene of an accident and for reckless driving. It is possible, he added, that the driver of the car was intoxicated.

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Letters TO THE EDITOR

HAWAII REPORT

January 25, 1965

Aloha:

We find the day all too short to go the places we plan each day. We have done more walking during the past few days than we've done in several months back home. We find bus transportation very satisfactory in the Honolulu area but to get to the outlying areas is a problem. Sometime later we shall be able to spend more time outside the Honolulu area. We find downtown Honolulu much different from Wikkii in that it's more Hawaiian than the beach area where the tourist capers about in almost every type of clothing. Wikkii caters to the tourist and those on vacation which gives it the sophisticated holiday air while downtown Honolulu goes about its day in a businesslike manner. We have spent the past three days in the downtown area.

Much of this area would compare very favorably with any city of like size on the mainland. Names like Woolworth, Kress, Sears and other national names are here and are modern in every respect. All are well stocked and one can buy any item in a price range of the mainland. In the clothing lines there is a riot of color, and I must admit it is most pleasing. For every day wear for women there is the Muumuu in elaborate designs, colors and sizes. The length seems to vary with the race of people. The people from the Orient select the longer dress which drops to the feet. There are those who wear the latest in fashion and are very well groomed. In this mixing bowl of Hawaii we find the people most interesting, friendly and helpful. Last Saturday afternoon was spent in the fashionable shopping district where I simply watched people hurrying about their shopping. I saw faces of every race in the world and all in between faces.

The Chinatown of Honolulu is an interesting place with the many small business places catering to the Oriental. There are no signs on the small food places but one always knows they are nearby by the smell of fish, and it's usually strong. For body ailments many of the old Chinese still use herbs from the Orient. We see so many beautiful items in shops which have been carved by craftsmen from unusual wood, also items made from metals of many kinds, coral, stones and other natural resources.

Several hours were spent yesterday at the Foster Botanical Gardens where we saw many beautiful trees, shrubs and flowers of the islands. Of course we gazed at the varieties of orchids and the very large trees on the grounds. It is a very beautiful place and is carefully worked by Japanese and Chinese who were our first farmers. Our next visit was to the Kwan Yin Temple which is one of the most beautiful places I've seen. I asked if we might enter, also take some pictures, and were told it was quite proper. Some were there for worship as they knelt on the cushion on the floor dropping their prayer tablets on the floor with a tinkling sound. Incense tapers were burning about the place.

Of course, Iolani Palace was on our plans. We went in the Senate and House Chambers, Lieut. Gov. and Governor's Office. The Legislature is not now in session, but some work was going on. The State grounds are the same as they were in the day of kings and the territorial government. Plans are already under way to construct new buildings, which seems the correct thing to do, even in Texas.

The Ala Moana Shopping Center was on our itinerary. This is an immense area as large as any in our Texas cities. Parking is provided on the ground level, also mall level. Buses run right under the overhead cover where one can shop without ever being in the rain. Mainland business is again represented here, also many oriental and European businesses.

Attended the downtown Honolulu Lions Club Tuesday noon. The prayer in the Hawaiian language was lost on me. A large club and a friendly bunch. The greeter was a woman. She greeted me with a warm smile, kissed my cheek and placed a lei about my neck. Nice custom, eh?

Went out to the Pearl Harbor Baptist Church last Sunday morning. It is fully inte-

grated with many races in attendance. After the service we asked about bus routes. One man, a Mr. Fraser, stepped forward and said, "Forget the bus. I'll drive you back to town." For the next hour we had a free tour of Honolulu and finally driven to our hotel. Another time we asked directions from a lady in the downtown area. She tried to give good directions but finally said, "Follow me to parking and I will get my car and take you there." This speaks for the friendly folks here.

\$204,311 Damage Suit Is Filed As Result Of September Wreck

A damage suit asking \$204,311.57 has been filed in 91st District Court by a Harris County man against a construction company, in connection with a highway incident which resulted in the death of the Harris County man's wife and four-year-old son, west of Cisco last September.

Charles R. Brett is asking the amount of J. H. Strain and Sons Construction of Haskell County as the result of a

crash in which his wife and son were killed, about four miles west of Cisco on Highway 80 Sept. 4, 1964.

The man has received \$48,000 in a settlement of a suit which he had brought asking \$204,311.57, naming Everett Wayne Scott, Campbell-Taggart Associated Bakeries, Inc. and Cecil Ruby Co., Inc. The suit was transferred to Travis County, where the settlement was arranged and a judgment rendered, it is reported.

In his petition, filed by W. B. Wright of Cisco and the Abilene law firm of Scarborough, Black, Tarpley and Scarborough, Brett alleges that on the date in question, he and his family were traveling west on U. S. 80 west of Cisco. The highway was in the process of being converted to a freeway, with the north lane closed and two-way traffic traveling the south lane. A sweeper, operated by a Strain Co. employe, was operating along the south lane and caused a "large cloud of dust" to cross the highway, which prevented him, "Brett" from seeing, and that his auto was struck by the auto driven by Scott, the petition said. He listed six counts of negligence against the Strain Co.

His wife, Sandra, 23, died that day as the result of injuries received, the petition said, and he asked \$65,000; a four-year-old son, Larry Wayne Brett, died six days later from injuries received in the wreck, and \$30,000 is asked; \$4,311.57 for hospital, funeral and other expenses; and \$5,000 is asked for personal injuries to himself. The suit was filed Jan. 23.




In the suit which resulted in a settlement, Brett alleged seven counts of negligence against the Ruby Company, stating specifically that the company did not have flagmen signaling while the sweeper caused the dust.
