

#### LIQUID NERVES ARE FOUND

New Discovery With Regard to Phe-nomena of Sense of Sight An-nounced by Scientists.

Manchester.—A new discovery with regard to the phenomena of the sense of sight has been announced by Dr. F. W. Edridge-Green, an eminent autority in visual research. He has found by an interesting series of experiments and tests that the process of vision is not the simple transmission by the optic nerve to the brain of objects photographed on the retina.
