



NEW TAX REVISION TO HIT WEALTHY

Very few people have either the time, the inclination or the specialized knowledge needed to read and understand Hinds asks that all community Mr. and Mrs. O. P. a major tax bill. That is crtainly true of the Administrationbacked, 875-page tax revision measure which has passed the House and is now the subject of extensive Senate hear-

As a consequence, almost any criticism-or praisecan be made of a tax bill and many will believe it. The Burleson current bill is an excellent example. Opponents of the Administration have jumped on it gleefully on the grounds Parisher that it is primarily "a rich man's measure," which will give all kinds of benefits to big business and wealthy individuals and few if any to those of small and moderate status.

In the light of that, it may come as something of a surprise to learn that numbers of tax experts and corporation warren executives are looking on the bill with anything but eager Bob and Corrie Lou eyes. They think that some of its provisions would actually be more burdensome to some important industries than is the case under existing tax laws. And they are urging the Mrs. Fred Hollingshead Senate to make substantial changes in the interest of busi- Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Hughes \$5.00

Without going into the rights and wrongs of this com-plex matter, a Wall Street Journal article by Alan L. Otten impressively disputes the "rich man's tax bill" argument. The measure, he writes, ". . . . contains more than 50 provisions that will cause more distress in Union League clubs than in C. I. O. union halls or at Democratic Party rallies." The reason for this is that the bill closes doors on certain devices, now entirely legal, by which some businesses and Mr. and Mrs. S. L. high-income individuals have been able to save substantial sums in their taxes.

Mr. Otten describes a few of these proposed revisions. Ray Motor Co. As of now, beneficiaries of life insurance policies can leave the money with the company and take it out in installments Mr. and Mrs. Archie over an extended period of time. They receive interest from the sum in the company's hands, and it is tax-free to any amount. The new bill would limit tax-free interest to \$500 a year for a wife and \$250 for a child. Certainly, that would hit the wealthy much harder than the rest of us.

Now the survivors of a deceased employe can get up to \$5,000 in tax-free death benefits from each employer for whom he worked. Some top executives of inter-related cor- John Staudt porations can make arrangements so each of the corpora- Mr. and Mrs. Bill Works tions will pay the tax-free \$5,000. The new bill would restrict payments to just one \$5,000 per person.

Today, executives can be given big tax-free bonuses and vacations under health insurance plans. Payments on these are tax-free, with no limit. The new bill would set a ceiling of \$100 a week for such benefits-and, further, even that would be tax-free only if all workers in the company receive
