In answer to numerous inquiries and for the benefit of those interested, County clerk Landis furnishes us the following extract from the game law.

It shall be unlawful for any person to kill, ensnare, or trap or in any way destroy any wild deer in the period of time embraced between the first day of January and the first day of September in each year, or any prairie chickens in the period embraced between the first day of February and the first day of August in each year or any quail or partridge within the period of time embraced between the fifteenth day of March and the first day of October in each year, it is unlawful to kill Antelope at any time before the 28th of May 1902, and any person violating the provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of an offence and fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars.

BIG TRUST CONFERENCE.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—To-morrow morning at 10 o'clock the conference called by the civic federation of Chicago to discuss the question of trust and combinations, their causes and effect and all their various phases, will be called to order in central Music hall by Franklin Head, president of the civic federation. It is expected that when the meeting is called nearly 400 delegates will be in attendance from all parts of the country. The Texas delegates, headed by Att. General Smith. The Texas delegation established head-quarters at the Great Norehern hotel. Attorney General T. S. Smith said in an interview;

"It is a mistake to suppose the Texas people here are opposed national legislation against trusts. We want state and national legislation. For only national laws can be used to fight trusts. When inter state comerce is concerned. Our new Texas law, which goes into effect in January, embodies about my ideas of the best way of dealing with the trust problem. We who try to collect debts due a trust and put such obligations on the same basis as a gambling debt. We cannot prevent them doing business in our state, but we keep them from setting up there and from establishing branches. As fast as the licenses or the charters of these organizations which we know to be trusts expire, we will refuse to renew them.

"Speaking of 1900, the republicans to win must do three things: Put a stop to the war and do it satisfretorily; meet the trust question sqarly in a way that will satisfy the people that they are in earnest, and explain satisfarily why they did keep their promise made in 1896 on the subject of bimetalism."
