## Group Tours Dam Site 9, Friday

A group of 35 to 40 people attended the tour Friday of Site 9, one of the 17 dams constructed or being constructed on the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed. The group watched the dam on Site 9 under construction on easements granted to local sponsors for construction, operation and maintenance by Ella Moore Seale, Bonnie and Howard Farmer and Betty Gay Wilson.

Construction cost for the dams along the Bayou Watershed is borne by the Federal Government, through the Flood Prevention Program Appropriations and Administered by the

Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Site 9 will have a drainage area of 3,948 acres. The sediment pool will consist of 11 surface acres and 87 acre feet. The flood detention will consist of 105 surface acres and 1,317 acre feet. Volume will height of the dam is 136,700 cubic yards and 54 feet high.

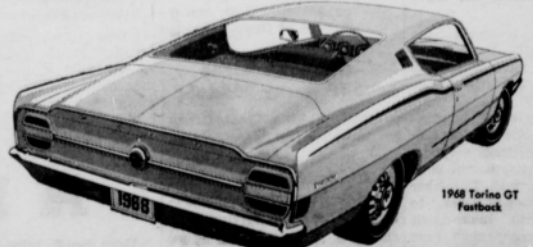

## Public Notice OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules. On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such rights shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

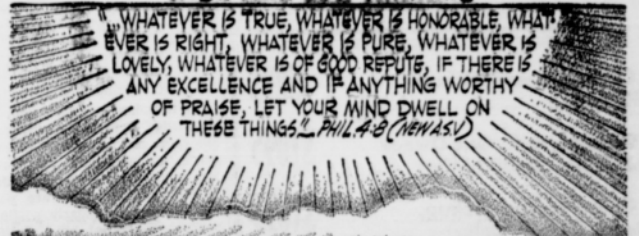

## "WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

**BIBLE THOUGHT:** "Wherefore be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is." (Ephesians 5:17)

The Bible message of the New Testament is intensely practical. It teaches that doing is essential; mere knowledge or the action of the mind is not enough. Jesus said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven. Many will

say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you; depart from me, ye that work iniquity." (Matthew 7:21-23). The wise man hears the words of Jesus and DOES them, while the foolish man considers one's obedience to His words unnecessary (Matthew 7:24-27). Only those who do the will of the Father shall enter into the kingdom. It was not enough for a "certain lawyer" to understand. He must, "Go, and do thou likewise" (Luke 10:37). Christ's severest rebuke was directed against them as those who "say, and do not" (Matthew 23:3).

Jesus was recognized as one who "taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes" and "the people were astonished at his doctrine" (Matthew 7:28-29). Notice how the great New Testament doctrines are often used to enforce practical lessons. The incarnation and death of Christ are used to enforce humility and unity among children of God (Philippians 2:1-10). The resurrection of the saints is used to encourage diligent effort (1 Corinthians 15:50-58). To accept these doctrines as revealed truth is not enough; we must act upon the basis of this truth. The apostle Paul said, "Moreover, brethren, I declare unto you the gospel which I PREACH-ED until you, which also ye have RECEIVED, and wherein ye STAND; By which also ye are SAVED, IF ye keep in memory what I preached unto you. UNLESS YE HAVE BELIEVED IN VAIN" (1 Corinthians 15:1-2).

My friend, you cannot divorce knowledge from action. "Where did Cain get his wife?" is not nearly so important as "How are you treating yours?" Or, "What kind of living are you making?" is not nearly so important as "What kind of life are you living?" Or, "How much prestige may one obtain?" is not nearly so important as "How much eternal value may one generate by his presence?" Or, "What effect will the coming generation have upon our world?" is not nearly so important as "How much effect will our present generation have upon our world?" What shall it profit a man if he has "all knowledge and lose his own soul? What shall it profit if one one has all faith, so that he is able to remove mountains (problems in life), and has not love? (1 Corinthians 13:2). If he has not the faith which works by love (Galatians 5:6), that faith which responds to the will of Christ without question or argument, does he really have any thing at all? The Hebrew Christians were warned to "Take heed, brethren, lest there be in any of you an evil heart of unbelief, in departing from the living God. But exhort one another daily, while it is called Today; let, any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin" (Hebrews 3:12-13).

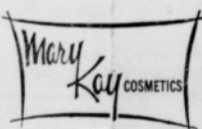
