Farmers Co-op when the organization held its Third Annual Stockholders meeting in Clyde Tuesday night. Mr. Hays, L. L. Farmer and T. J. Stoker were elected to the board to serve three year terms. The terms of W. M. Appleton, T. J. Stoker and L. L. Farmer were expiring. The new board of directors is now composed of J. A. McKee, T. J. Stoker, Joel Griffin, H. G. Broadfoot, L. L. Farmer, Marian Hays, A. J. Sharp, J. L. Farmer and E. A. Franke.

After the election of directors, Bob Norrell, cashier of the First National Bank of Baird, addressed the group, using as his sub-'Co-operation." Mr. Norrell's talk was very appropriate and was well received by the large number of members of the co-operative present.

Zeke Williams and his radio Western Band entertained the audience for an hour before the business meeting began, and this entertainment was enjoyed by the crowd of approximately 200 people. Zeke Williams had announced the farm meeting over the radio for a number of days to help bring out the people. This was the second attempt to hold the annual meeting of stockholders. The first time there wasn't a quorum, but Zeke and his band brought them from many places over the county

A. G. Black, manager of the co-operative, introduced guests and called on members and friends to speak during the meeting. Of the 200 persons present, there were about 100 voting members. The co-op has more than 300 members. Mr. Stoker, secretary, read the minutes of the annual report and in which statement. He pointed out that the total sale of merchandise for the year amounted to \$155,067.08 with a net savings to members of \$3,257.98. This was an increase in business over a year ago of

about \$67,000. Among the added services provided by the farmers co-op this year included buying wheat, grain sorghums, cleaning and treating seed, weighing, and var ious other things. The co-op bought \$20,903.60 worth of Callahan county wheat this season and shipped it to Houston markets making a net profit to the co-op of \$835.62. Wheat brought amounted to some 600,000

pounds. The new scales recently installed has made it possible to handle wheat and other grain, Mr. Black stated. He also said the co-op has bought about 700-000 pounds of maize this season. The co-op will buy peanuts next year, he said. N. H. Stephenson and John Christian have recently been employed at the co-op to help handle the merchandise

being bought and sold. The assets of the co-op total equity is \$15,795.79.

### EDITORIAL

WANTED — MORE PAVED STREETS

Baird is gradually getting a fine system of paved streets-just enough now to make residents want more streets paved. This is especially true since folks found out that the paving can be done within a reasonable

The highway department has been nice to Baird in laying so much pavement through town in the process of re-routing Highway 80. Beside the new highway, Baird has the old paved highway from Market Street westward, and the paved streets used for detour while the new highway was under construction. And then, there is Highway 183 north and south. One block was paved by property owners while the paving contractor was on the job here, that being on Arch Street connecting the old and new highways. Baird now has a total of 70 blocks of paved streets.

This is not saying the people of Baird have not paid for the pavement. We have paid but not directly. The pavement has cost Baird property owners via taxes in buying right-of-way and other costs that go with cooperating with the state. We have been fortunate in having the state to help foot the bill, and for this we are thankful. Some of the other cities along Highway 80 have refused to provide the right-of-way for the new highway, and are being by-passed. It remains to be seen which will profit the most-Baird by giving its cooperation, or the towns that preferred to save their money.

Baird is showing signs of progress by its new pavement and other modern improvements around town. It will soon gain the reputation of being the neatest, most progressive little town along the big highway. If this spirit doesn't pay off, we don't know what will.

Residents are asking for the pavement to be continued up their streets. Since the block between the churches on Arch Street has been paved, the property owners in the block immediately north of that block are asking for their block to be paved also. Now if the county will take care of its side of the street, there seems to be nothing to prevent the project's final completion. That block serves the courthouse, the hospital, as well as the residents on the other side of the street, and carries traffic to the schools. We venture to say, if this block is paved, other property owners up the street will carry the paving on through several more blocks. Every good thing is contageous, and once street paving gets underway, many blocks are constructed before the fever is cooled.

### TO GIVE THE TOWN A BOOST

Several meetings ago the Callahan County Club appointed an industrial committee and gave it authority to act in whatever way it saw fit to bring industries to Baird. With the completion of Baird's new lake of water, the business men saw the benefits to the town that would be derived from small industries that can now be accommodated from the standpoint of having an ample water supply. With a lake that will give the town twice as much water as it needs through the summer months, there is every reason to believe that the town will grow and prosper. All that is then needed is for the people of the town to get busy and tell the advantages of their town and inperty owners of that town. Beside the increased business such a movement would bring into the town, the additional taxable property would help the older established property owners pay for the lake and other improvements.

The industrial committee took its first step a week ago and contacted almost every business firm to see how much could be raised monthly to finance the industrialization project. Most of the firms pledged \$10 per month, some less and some more. Some \$400 per month could be raised with this kind of contributions. The program can be carried on in a small way with this amount, and the club will do all it can to make the money go as far as possible. It would be so much better if each business firm could give twice that amount. Then we could see some quick benefits. There is one thing for sure in these times-you can't get something for nothing. And the benefits will always be in direct proportion to the amount of money and effort spent on any project.

The best things Baird has today were obtained by a movement similar to this one. At that time we built the courthouse, paved Market Street, and a number of other worthwhile things were secured. Without these things today, Baird would be way behind the times. As it is we are running abreast of the times. Baird began to grow and develope when citizens took steps to build a lake. It will continue to grow accordingly as we put forth an effort for progress.




