REV. SAM JONES DIES

Noted Evangelist Found Dead In Sleeping Car Berth

NEAR LITTLE ROCK

For Two Weeks Deceased Conducted a Revival at Oklahoma City and Was on the Way to His Home When Taken.

Little Rock, Oct. 16.—Rev. Sam P. Jones, the well known evangelist of Cartersville, Ga., died early Monday of heart failure in a sleeping car of train No. 4 of the Rock Island railroad near Perry, Ark. Mr. Jones had been conducting a most successful revival at Oklahoma City, and left there Sunday night for his home in Georgia. He desired to attend a family reunion Tuesday, it being the fifty-ninth anniversary of his birth. Mrs. Jones and their daughters, Mrs. Annie Pryor and Miss Julia Jones, were with him when he passed away.

Mr. Jones arose from his berth in the sleeping car about 5 o'clock and complained of sickness in his stomach. He drank a glass of hot water and immediately afterward collapsed. Rev. Walt Holcomb, who had been associated with Mr. Jones for a number of years, took the dying man in his arms, and in a few minutes the evangelist breathed his last.

FORWARDED HOME.

Masonic Escort Went to the Station With Evangelist's Body.

Little Rock, Oct. 16.—The body of Rev. Sam P. Jones, after being embalmed here, was forwarded to Cartersville, Ga., for interment. A local Masonic escort accompanied the remains to the station. No services of any kind were held in this city, but many ministers called upon Mrs. Jones and her daughters. Before leaving here Mrs. Jones requested that Rev. George H. Stuart and E. O. Excell, old associates of Mr. Jones, be asked to meet the party at Cartersville.

TONS OF FLIES.

Large Consignments Go to Liverpool For Medical Use.

Galveston, Oct. 16.—There are millions of flies aboard the Leyland Line steamer Albanian, now in port and loading for Liverpool. However, they are not the kind that buzz in the ear, bother bald headed men or drop into the soup, for these flies have a commercial value, and are being taken to Liverpool as part of the Albanian's cargo. To be exact, there are 2,800 pounds of flies in boxes and cases, all dead and dried, and by the time they reach the chemists in Europe they will be valued at several thousand dollars. The flies were taken aboard the vessel at Vera Cruz, Mex., many tons of the insects being shipped from that country annually. They are ground up and used for medicinal purposes.

HEAD JERKED OFF.

Plasterer Meets Dreadful Fate by a Fort Worth Elevator.

Fort Worth, Oct. 15.—Sam Hanks, a plasterer, met an awful death Monday morning while working in the Hoxie building on Main street. The man was on the second floor leaning his body out into the elevator shaft doing patchwork when, without warning, the elevator, descending swiftly, caught his head between a sill and the cage, completely severing it from the body. Death was instant. The elevator boy declared he cried to the man to move but he evidently did not hear him. Hanks was aged thirty and single.

CLERGYMAN DIES.

Aged Baptist Minister and Confederate Departs Useful Life.

Dallas, Oct. 16.—Rev. L. R. Scott, for more than twenty years resident in Dallas, died at his home here, Mr. Scott was born in Spartanburg, S. C., sixty-six years ago. He was a Confederate soldier in the Third Texas cavalry and in Hood's Brigade.

A minister in the Baptist church, Mr. Scott was pastor of churches in Paris, Sherman and Corsicana. For about six years past he had been engaged in missionary work.

AGED ASPIRANT.

Agrees to Walk Four Miles When One Hundred Years Old.

Guthrie, Oct. 16.—Rev. B. Ober of Custer county, who desires to be a delegate to the constitutional convention, is the oldest candidate in the new state. He and his wife are both over eighty years old, and have been married over sixty years. He has agreed among his friends to walk four miles and preach a sermon on his one hundredth birthday anniversary.

Denison Retires.

Shawnee, Okla., Oct. 16.—After fifteen years in the banking business, Charles J. Benson, oldest banker in continuous service in the county, sold his interests to J. W. Rubey of Kan-

sas City and retired from the presidency of the Oklahoma National bank.

Burning Bridge Gave Way.

Paris, Tex., Oct. 16.—A southbound freight train on the Frisco ran into a burning bridge between Hamden and Goodland, L. T. The engine and one car passed over safely, but seven cars loaded with apples went into the ditch the bridge giving away.

Offer Accepted.

Denison, Oct. 16.—Buyer offered 11 cents per pound for all cotton stored in the Farmers' Union warehouse. The offer was accepted.

CAMPBELL AND BAILEY.

Democratic Nominee For Governor and Senator Speak at Rusk.

Rusk, Tex., Oct. 12.—Hon. T. M. Campbell made a speech here Thursday before a large audience. Owing to his physician's advice he only spoke a short time. He referred to Senator Bailey as the nominee of the Democrats of Texas for re-election to the senate. He reviewed the pledges he made during the campaign. Colonel Campbell repeated what he has said during the campaign in opposition to members of congress accepting employment from trusts, and said that he understood that Senator Bailey and all other nominees were in an agreement with him upon the subject, whereupon Senator Bailey bowed his assent.

Senator Bailey's speech differed very considerably from those which he has been delivering recently. He did not devote a great deal of his time to answering his critics, but after rather brief notice of them requested any one in the audience who had any objection to offer to his services to state it, or any one who desired him to explain anything to ask such questions as he pleased. He repeated the invitation several times, promising not to make fun of any one asking such questions. There being no response to these invitations Senator Bailey proceeded to make a Democratic speech very much along the lines of his Fourth of July address at Abilene. He was very frequently applauded, and seemed to have the crowd with him.

A notable incident of the address occurred when Senator Bailey denounced a certain accusation as a lie. "Let me tell you, brother, it is a damned lie, and God will damn all liars," said an old man who had a seat well up to the front. He is Frank Manuel, a farmer, who lives near Jacksonville. He is seventy-seven years old, and is familiarly known as the "squirrel hunter."

The senator paid high tribute to the late Governor Hogg, with whom, he said, he was in accord.

John H. Kirby and Chairman Carden also spoke. The latter read extracts from a letter he received from Hon. J. W. Bryan, one saying: "If Democrats were all like Tom Campbell we would sweep the country." This was heartily cheered. Mr. Carden also read the resolutions adopted by the Democratic state convention endorsing Senators Bailey and Culberson and denouncing the attacks upon Senator Bailey.

"My friends," said he in conclusion, "you can't vote for Senator Bailey, but as a Democrat you can support the action of your convention when it made him the nominee." (Applause.)

SEAWALL EFFECTIVE.

Tide at Galveston Rose Five Feet and Much Rain Fell.

Galveston, Oct. 15.—With a rise of the tide here of five feet and seven and one-half inches of rain since Saturday morning Galveston was covered in low places by water Sunday morning. Drains and sewers were temporarily flooded by backwater in sections. Street cars could not run until 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon. However, the seawall proved true to all calculations and kept the water back, preventing an overflow in the beach district. It was the highest tide since the September storm in 1906. No reason for the exceptionally high rise can be given by the weather bureau except that some unusual disturbance must be taking place in the Gulf of Mexico. There was no damage here worth mentioning.

EXPLOSION IN MINE.

Colliery Near Durham, Eng., Has a Terrible Calamity.

Durham, Eng., Oct. 15.—An explosion occurred in Wingate colliery, near here, about midnight Sunday night. Some 200 men were entombed. At the place where the disaster took place there were at the time some sixty or seventy miners were at work.

Up to 2 o'clock Monday afternoon twenty-four bodies had been recovered and thirty were brought out alive.

Pitiable scenes are witnessed in the vicinity of the mine's entrance, women and children weeping and inquiring about loved ones.

STRICKEN AT TABLE.

Wife of President of Fire Chiefs Soon Passes Away.

Dallas, Oct. 11.—While seated at the breakfast table Thursday morning in the Oriental hotel Mrs. Stagg of Paterson, N. J., wife of the president of the National Association of Fire Chiefs, in session here, was stricken. The lady was at once taken to her room and a doctor summoned, but she

passed away at 11 o'clock. Heart trouble was the cause of death.

SHOT BY SPOUSE.

Nelson P. Green Receives Probably a Mortal Wound.

Dallas, Oct. 11.—When Nelson P. Green had just finished telephoning to someone, alleged to be a woman, in a drug store in the eastern part of the city Thursday morning his wife shot him in the left breast, inflicting what the attending physicians said would probably prove a mortal wound. Mrs. Green, who is a refined little woman, stated her husband was talking to a woman he had no business to converse with.

Large Arrearage Alleged.

Lake Village, Ark., Oct. 16.—Sheriff Strong of Chicot county is alleged to be due the county \$40,000, and is charged with refusing to settle. He is twenty-three years old, and succeeded his father, who resigned. Action on him is civil only.

Prominent Pioneer Passes Away.

Denison, Oct. 16.—Judge S. A. Gilbert, a prominent pioneer, died Monday.

Tells of Rate Bill Legislation and Praises Senator Bailey.

Dallas, Oct. 15.—Senator Tillman of South Carolina delivered an address Saturday afternoon in the auditorium at the fair. He was introduced by Governor Lanham, a native of the Palmetto state.

Senator Tillman spoke of the legislation in the senate in connection with the railroad regulation measure. He referred to the speech of Senator Bailey on the amendment to prevent Federal judges granting temporary injunctions. "For four hours he held the senate as I have never seen it held since I have been in that body," he said. The senate galleries were filled with ladies and men and hundreds were outside, and that not a senator

went to dinner. "Senator Bailey," Mr. Tillman declared, "showed that he had mastered the decrees of the supreme court from Judge Marshall down, and a knowledge of judicial interpretation that I have never witnessed before, and never expect to witness again."

"Your senator introduced his amendment forbidding any temporary injunctions at all, but didn't get the full Democratic support. The Republicans, however, adopted the principles involved in Senator Bailey's amendment, and when the vote came, he said 'Gentlemen, if you can limit the power of a Federal judge not to grant an injunction without five days' notice, why not fifty days, or 100 days, why not altogether.' (Great applause.) Bailey had lost his own amendment, but the principle for which he had fought had won out. (Renewed applause.) At least everybody in the senate voted for it except Foraker, who had argued ably that congress had no right to delegate power to a commission to regulate rates, and dear old Senators Morgan and Pettus who, with their ideas of state's rights, held the whole thing unconstitutional.

"But I think we have a pretty good rate bill—provided two things: That the men now on the commission, or who may be hereafter appointed, shall prove true to the people and shall not surrender to the railroad interests; and next, that we have got to watch to see that these Federal judges are not the supple tools of the railroads."

Senator Tillman said he didn't favor government ownership of railways. That railroad employees would have to be disfranchised to keep the government in power from continuing forever; secondly, that the commission governing the railroads would be officered by Republicans at the start, at least, and I know the interests of the Republican party would turn the commerce of the country to the North Atlantic ports instead of to the gulf ports. (Applause.) Third, the first thing we would see after this Republican programme had gone into effect would be negro conductors on southern trains—and that would be the last straw to break the camel's back."

He thought the whole railroad question would probably become an issue in the next national campaign, and that it will not down until it is settled, and settled right.

Senator Bailey briefly spoke. He asked Senator Tillman to bear back to his people this message: That the Democrats of Texas never shoot a man in the back nor desert the nominees of their party." (Prolonged applause.)

Hundreds shook hands with the two senators.

MURDERS HIS FAMILY

Tennessee Farmer Kills Wife and Four Children, Also

BRAINS TWO OTHERS

After Doing These Dreadful Deeds Chalbern Mantooth Cuts His Own Throat From Ear to Ear and Is a Corpse.

Knoxville, Oct. 13.—A terrible affair, according to a Sentinel special from Newport, Tenn., was enacted in Cooke county. Chalbern Mantooth, aged fifty years, a prominent farmer, murdered his wife and four of their children, fatally injured two more little ones and suicided by cutting his throat from ear to ear. Mantooth did these awful deeds at an early hour Saturday morning.

It is believed the man became suddenly insane, for no other motive can be conceived of why he so wantonly ended the earthly career of his family. An axe was the weapon of death. He brained his dear ones. That the two children he did not kill outright lived any time is miraculous, as their skulls were crushed and brains exposed.

ENCAMPMENT COST.

Over Twenty-Eight Thousand Dollars to Pay Off Participants.

Austin, Oct. 12.—According to Adjutant General Hulen it cost exactly \$28,353 to pay the 1,920 officers and men of the Texas National guard for their services during the recent encampment at Camp Mabry. This money was paid out of the Federal allotment to the state.

Secretary of State Shannon addressed a letter to the county clerks over the state officially notifying them of the declination of E. H. R. Green as the nominee of governor of the Reorganized Republican party and certifying the name of Dr. A. W. Acheson as the candidate on that ticket.

HARRY BISHOP ALIVE.

Appearance of Supposed Murdered Boy Causes Father to Faint.

Wheeling, Oct. 12.—Harry Bishop, the Wheeling boy, who was supposed to have been murdered a week ago, returned home Friday. His father fainted away when he saw him. "A body supposed to have been Bishop's was found in water and buried in the family tomb after the coroner had returned a verdict of murder and after an insurance company had paid insurance on Bishop's life. Bishop says he was at Kitzaning, Pa., when the supposed murder occurred. The identity of the dead man has not been established.

IMMENSE SHORTAGE.

Sum Involved Is Considerably Over One Million Dollars.

Toronto, Oct. 16.—General Manager McGill of the wrecked Ontario bank admits a shortage of \$1,250,000. Bankers in estimating the probability of their guarantee being enforced place the loss through McGill's speculations at \$500,000 more. McGill also admits that these speculations were carried on without the directors' knowledge, but he declares they were for the ultimate good of the bank.

LADY CREMATED.

Checotah, I. T., Has a Severe Loss by a Conflagration.

Checotah, I. T., Oct. 15.—Property to the value of \$25,000 was destroyed by fire in the business section early Sunday morning. For a time it looked as if all the business houses were doomed.

Mrs. H. P. Stoker was alone with her two children in the upstairs of one of the burning buildings. When she was awakened she evidently grabbed one child and carried her downstairs. The other child followed her down, but it is the general opinion that she did not know it, and went back upstairs after her, where she perished. Her screams were awful, but her rescue was impossible. Her charred remains were recovered after the fire had subsided. Her husband, who returned some hours afterward, is prostrated.

MAGOON GOVERNOR.

He Assumed Provisional Charge of Cuba at Noon Saturday.

Havana, Oct. 15.—Charles E. Magoon assumed at noon Saturday the provisional governorship of Cuba.

Twenty Indictments.

Atlanta, Oct. 13.—The Fulton county grand jury has returned indictments against twenty white men, charging them with rioting at Atlanta on Sept. 20.

Accidental Killing.

Tulsa, I. T., Oct. 15.—While carrying a loaded gun to her father, Miss Ella Edwards of Ingalls fell and the gun was discharged, the contents striking her father, instantly killing him.

DREADFUL DEEDS DONE**Farmer, His Wife and Three Children Murdered.****DUMPED INTO CREEK****Father Shot Out of Wagon and Hit Over Head With Gun, Mother's Skull Beaten to Pulp and Little Ones Clubbed.**

Houston, Mo., Oct. 15.—Barney Parsons, a farmer, his wife and three children were murdered near Licking. A farmer named Hamilton has been arrested, charged with the murder. Parsons had sold his crops and farm to Hamilton, and it is alleged that the men quarreled over the terms of the sale. Parsons and family set out from their former home in a covered wagon, bound for northern Missouri. The body of Parsons was found shot to death, and the mother and three children had been clubbed to death.

Jolia Hamilton, the alleged murderer is in the Houston jail, strongly guarded to prevent lynching. He is alleged to have made a complete confession in which the following is a summary:

At a timber bordered place in the road, as Parsons and his family were driving along, they were confronted by Hamilton, armed with a shotgun. Deliberately aiming at Parsons, Hamilton discharged both barrels of the gun and Parsons fell to the ground. Hamilton then advanced upon him and clubbed him over the head with the butt of the gun several times. He then beat the head of the mother almost to a pulp, and after killing her, clubbed the three children to death. The bodies of all five were then loaded into a wagon and taken to Big Piney Creek. The body of one of the children has not yet been found.

A party of fishermen from Houston discovered the bodies of two of the children. A further search brought to light the bodies of both parents, and word was sent to Houston. Shortly after the news had been received there Hamilton rode into town on a mule that was recognized as one that belonged to Parsons. He was arrested and locked up in jail.

STATE FAIR OPENS.**Twenty-First Annual Entertainment is Now Under Way.**

Dallas, Oct. 13.—Before a large audience Governor Lanham formally opened in the auditorium on the grounds the twenty-first annual entertainment of the Texas State Fair. It was Opening day, Press day and children's day, and the attendance was gratifyingly large.

The exhibits are large, excellent and varied, and there are numerous attractions. Seymour's military band is present.

The Texas newspaper men were special guests. They were tendered an elegant banquet. Many toasts were responded to.

MAYS EXECUTED.**Had to Be Carried to the Gallows by the Death Watch.**

San Antonio, Oct. 12.—H. L. Mays, a negro, was hanged here Friday for the murder July 29, 1905, of Leo Woods. He dropped to his doom at 11:21 o'clock and was pronounced dead twenty-four minutes afterward. Mays made no confession. Two Roman Catholic priests were with him from 8 o'clock Thursday night until the end. He feigned insanity until there was no further hope. The condemned man had to be carried up the gallows by his death watch.

GREAT COTTON FIRE.**Costly Compress and Fifteen Hundred Bales Consumed.**

Bryan, Tex., Oct. 13.—Compress valued at \$40,000, and about 1,500 bales of cotton were consumed by fire Friday night. The total loss is about \$150,000. Inadequate water supply and a high wind rendered work of firemen difficult.

BRIDE AND GROOM MURDER.**Former Lay In Pool of Blood, Latter In Unconscious State.**

Oklahoma City, Oct. 12.—Mrs. Robert Bryerson of Louisville, Ky., a bride of twenty-four hours, was found lying in a pool of blood in her room Thursday. Bryerson was found near by in an unconscious condition with his jaw bone broken.

GORED UNDER CHIN.**Bullfighter Nearly Had His Jugular Vein Cut In Two.**

El Paso, Oct. 15.—A bullfighter by the name of Barquero was gored under the chin Sunday at Juarez by an infuriated bovine. The horns of the animal barely missed his jugular vein. He will recover.

Thousands of acres of virgin soil on three sides of Baird are used only for pasture. When cut up into farms as they no doubt will be soon, both town and county will be the gainer.

Senator Bailey is just as much the nose of the democratic party as Tom Campbell, and Bell, Brooks and Callahan's friends would be just as much justified in fighting Campbell as Bailey's enemies are in fighting him. That is the way THE STAR views it from a party standpoint.

State chairmen Carden's address to the democratic party of Texas to cease the fight against Senator Bailey does not seem to have had the desired effect. Rebels are enlisting everywhere in the fight against the regular nominee, Senator Bailey. This is rather queer in Texas politics to say the least of it.

Wood at Baird is hard to get now and coal is not much better. There will no be much improvement in the wood business until the cotton crop is gathered, and may not improve much this winter. The situation is much like it was here in 1900 when the tow was forced to ship wood from the east, and it is likely we will have to do this again.

In the death of D. L. Beach the Texas loses one of its most useful and highly esteemed members. Mr. Beach had a dropsical affection and was at El Paso hoping to obtain relief where he died last Friday. D. L. Fish and Henry Reese were owners and publishers of the Gonzales Independent, which they made one of the best country weeklies in the State. As with sincere sorrow we record the death of Mr. Beach, a man whom we had learned to admire. He was 44 years old, just in the prime of life when he was called by the merciless hand of death, and his last wish was that the last edition of the Independent should be run off.

Mr. A. G. Webb secretary of the Baird Local Option Club has a letter in the last issue of the Taylor County News thanking a number of gentlemen in Abilene for their assistance in forcing prohibition on his home town over the protest and a majority of his own people. No doubt of it, Abilene furnished money and speakers to make Baird pro, but possibly some of the gentlemen named would have preferred not to have their names thus publicly mentioned. As public cards of thanks seem to be in order why not write one thanking the West Texas Fair Association for barring S. H. French from contesting for any premium at the coming Fair. In barring out Mr. French at the time it was done Callahan is practically barred, because the time is too short for others to get up an exhibit that by common consent the people of this county looked to S. H. French to do, and to represent the county at the Abilene Fair. Some of the men so cordially thanked by Mr. Webb for assisting the pros in this county are directors in the West Texas Fair Association. If they were working for the moral and financial welfare of Callahan County in making it pro, whose moral and financial welfare are they working for when they practically barr this county from making an exhibit at the Abilene Fair, giving as the only reason that the Callahan County man takes all the premiums?

If a card of thanks is due in the first case certainly one is due in the last at least lots of people in this county think so.

Some of Senator Bailey's close friends say the fight against him cannot even annoy him much less seriously injure him with the people. We don't know about that, some of the men nagging the Senator are no doubt small, but we have known gnats to gather around the biggest bull in the woods in such numbers as to run him almost distracted. The comparison is only used to illustrate a point. Enough small men can make the life of our greatest men miserable and often defeat them. Senator Mills had some experience in that line and his friends have not forgotten it either. Senator Bailey's enemies will hardly defeat him this time and they probably realize this, but they are forming a plan that they hope will defeat him six years hence.

The democrats of New York seem to be in a dickens of a muddle. They have nominated W. R. Hearst for governor on a platform declaring against municipal ownership of public utilities, and Mr. Hearst has accepted the nomination of the Municipal Ownership League, of his own creation, which declares in favor of municipal ownership of public utilities, directly opposite to the democratic platform. Many leading democrats of New York say, Hearst by his disreputable methods in securing the democratic nomination, is unworthy the support of any democrat. From this distance it looks like it would be better for the democratic party to defeat Hearst than to elect him because if elected governor he will undoubtedly aspire to the presidency as the democratic nominee. If the great democratic party falls so low as to nominate such a man as Hearst for president it would forfeit the respect of the public. Hearst has more money than brains and his money, not his ability secured the nomination for governor. It is said that Hearst spent over a million dollars to secure the nomination for governor and the charge is openly made that Tammany sold out to him body and soul. If these reports are true, and they appear to be, Hearst ought to be snowed under so deep he will never be heard of again. Defeat for a party sometimes is worth more than victory, and this seems to be the case in New York, for the republicans in nominating Chas. E. Hughes has one of the ablest and purest men in that State as their candidate.

ELECTION RETURNS.

The following is the official vote of the county for the prohibition election held Oct. 6th. The returns published in THE STAR last week correct except at Atwell where we give the pros one more vote than they received and at Putnam where we give the antis 3 more votes than they received. We are indebted to County Clerk Geo. B. Scott for the returns last week, which he obtained from reports sent in by phone. The following is taken from the official returns sent the County Clerk:

Total vote 1568. Pro majority 110. It will be noted that the above varies only slightly from the returns published in THE STAR last week.

The vote in above table tells its own story. Commercialism and not morality was evidently the deciding factor in the contest.

The total vote in 1902 was 1392. Pros 456, anti 936, anti majority 480. The pros that year only carried two boxes, Putnam and Harts, and the antis carried 12 boxes. In 1904 the pros carried Clyde, Cross Plains, Admiral, Putnam, Harts, Eula, Eagle Cove, Atwell and Wristen, 9 boxes and the antis 5 boxes. In 1904 the total vote was 1243, pros 619 anti 624, anti majority 5. Three new voting places have been created since 1904, to wit: Dressy, Oplin and Pilgrim. The pros in last election carried Belle Plaine, Cottonwood, Clyde, Cross Plains, Admiral, Putnam, Harts, Eagle Cove and Wristen 9 boxes. The antis carried Baird, Tecumseh, Eula, Caddo Peak, Atwell Gilliland and Oplin, 7 boxes. The vote was a tie at Dressy and Pilgrim.

Callahan County is to have a prohibition election on the 6th of October, and should the people up there decide to rid themselves of the hell holes known as saloons, as they did last Saturday in Brown county, why, the Baird Star man has already evaporated.—Rising Star X. Ray.

Chicago, J. T. ... success in every way. A. J. Blankenship, a ... of Texarkana, is dead ... Order of Esopets from a single farm ... raised by S. H. French, who is on hand to explain. He has sent similar collections to various county fairs and challenged comparison with any collection gathered from any number of farms. He has grown three varieties of cotton with such returns that he has picked a bale to the acre. He has rice that has turned out well and is a fine sample of the grain. Japanese wheat, red, yellow, and alfalfa clover, rye, barley, several varieties of oats and of millet and fruit and vegetables many featured.

Mr. French has not only grown with success the established varieties but has experimented after the fashion of Luther Burbank and is showing some strange and useful fruits and grains. He has pears, the like of which he has never seen anywhere, and he expects to have them examined to ascertain if he has really discovered or used a new line. He used seedlings for his experiments though he has been as successful in the use of grafting experiments. He has millet which, after coming as volunteer for a few seasons, has almost ceased to have a normal head but the hay that comes of it is said by him to be superior to timothy or any other grass. He has grown red clover and rice in the same fields. He declares that there is two much rain in his section. The water supply, he says, is only about two feet under the surface, and in dry weather the crops draw sufficiently from beneath and flourish.—Dallas News.

NOTE.—Mr. French did not intend to go to the Dallas Fair, and was gathering an exhibit for the West Texas Fair at Abilene, but when he was notified by the Fair directors that he would not be allowed to contest for any premium the people of Baird and the county promptly raised money to pay expenses and sent Mr. French to the Dallas Fair.—[EDITOR.]

The old adage that a lie once started can travel so fast that the truth can never overtake it was never more fully illustrated than was the joke perpetrated by some of Hon. W. J. Cunningham's friends at Baird just after the close of the of the District Convention at Baird August 25 when Mr. Cunningham was not present. After waiting all day and no delegates except the two in Baird, Otis Bowyer and J. W. Woods, having shown up. These two with the assistance of a few others proceeded to hold a convention. Mr. Cunningham was duly legally and constitutional nominated as a candidate for District Attorney of the 42nd Judicial District to succeed himself. Mr. Cunningham was not present and the boys thought it would be fun to perpetrate a joke on him so they got J. W. Woods to write him that his political enemies had captured the convention and had nominated a Mr. Jackson of Eastland County. The joke worked and the Abilene papers proceeded to skin Otis Bowyer one of the delegates, and the bar at Abilene held an indignation meeting and Mr. Woods, the Chairman of the district was telegraphed to come to Abilene at once. Then the joke was disclosed. THE STAR the following week published the facts so did the Abilene papers, but the Dallas News got hold of the first report and has been publishing heavy editorials since then to illustrate the intricacies and absurdities of the Terrell election law. Last Thursday The News had over a column editorial based mostly on the supposed miscarriage of the nomination. The News is a good paper and when it gets hold of a subject it never lets go.

In this case it got hold of a genuine joke and has worked it well. The News argument is good and we have read the editorials on the supposed incident with increasing interest, but it is time to call a halt. Mr. Cunningham was regularly nominated and Mr. Jackson was not even known but the joke accidentally hit a man by that name over in Eastland and the jokers had the additional fun of having a man that some of them did not know was in existence, decline a nomination he never received. Guess that joke will travel on to the end of time and Mr. Jackson will live out his days believing he was nominated for district attorney, and the News will keep publishing heavy editorials against the Terrell law. Verily the jokers perpetrated a bigger canard than they expected. If the incident will induce the legislators to correct some of the absurdities of the Terrell law the jokers will have performed a valuable service to the state though only intending a mild joke on the district attorney. The incident illustrates fully what could be done had the two delegates present desired to do what they were alleged to have done. Suppose they had nominated some other man and that man had accepted the nomination? How could the nomination been cancelled? The editor is not a lawyer and will leave this for the lawyers to settle among themselves.

One man in ten will buy a gold brick or green goods, if he has the money and gets a good chance.
