How To Keep Out Of Trouble
If children were taught in the home by their parents and in the schools and Sunday schools by their teachers, one simple rule of action, think of the sorrow and suffering it would save, not to mention the countless millions of dollars.

This simple rule of action wouldn't require any new laws, it wouldn't cost a dime of taxpayers' money, and it would reduce the cost of law enforcement and court trials. Respect for the rule would eventually become automatic with most children as they grow up.

There wouldn't be so many news reports of murder, robbery, kidnapping, rape, purse snatching, automobile stealing, etc.

And what is the rule of action that would reduce our vicious crime record, if it became part of the thinking of children when it was taught to them daily by their parents and in school, along with illustrations of what it meant?

Rule: "Keep your hands off other people and other people's property." It's that simple to keep out of trouble.

The World Is Our Parish

This is from a commencement address: "We are all members of a great parish. Telestar, Nuclear devices, Gemini. Obliterated boundaries. They have made foolish our violent and petty hatreds over race, religion, even politics. You youngsters who have grown up into the age that thrusts man beyond his world know this better than your elders. Such knowledge overwhelms us older ones . . . you must find your bearings in this world of infinite time and space."

A short visit with Bob Norrell, First National Bank president, revealed some facts perhaps not known by many. His statement that he had been a reader of the Star since boyhood neither denotes his age nor tells how old the Star is.

He spoke highly of the ability of one Star editor, W. E. Gilliland, as being one of the best editors to have managed the paper. That he wrote, talked, and looked like Mark Twain was only a coincidence, but was noted highly for his forceful writings. Editor Gilliland's three daughters still live in Baird: Eliska Gilliland, Mrs. Manche Estes and Mrs. Larmer Henry.

Although now separated from the "Fourth Estate", Bob served his apprenticeship as a newspaper man at an early age in the old Cottonwood Fax, a publication owned by W. F. Griffin in about 1907-08.

Bob's father, T. J. Norrell, was Callahan's first sheriff, elected when the county was first organized.

The real State Fair of Texas will open Saturday, October 9, for its annual 16-day run in Dallas.

At the time of the filming, extras were obtained through stories in the Dallas newspapers inviting people to "come out to the State Fair and be in the movies." For one scene some 3,000 people turned out to fill the Bandshell.

Also, scenes such as those using "Blue Boy" had to be staged and the livestock arenas are needed for various annual shows while the Fair is in progress.
