Bonds Total \$7,930.00 For May

Sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds are at an all-time high according to Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan county Savings Bonds Committee. Savings Bond sales in Callahan county during May were \$7,930.00, while sales for the first five months were \$29,136.00. This represents 24 percent of the yearly sales goal of \$120,000.00.

Texas E and H Bond sales for the month of May totaled \$12,792,623 which represents a 9 percent increase over May of 1965.

Nationally, new sales of Series E and H Bonds during May of \$413 million were the highest amount purchased in any May for the past ten years, 16 percent higher than a year ago.

Commission Rules On Pits

The Railroad Commission told oil and gas operators in Callahan and Stephens counties last week that they had until Jan. 1, 1967 to stop pumping brine and other well waste in surface pits, or risk having their pipelines severed.

The Commission said evidence at an April 29 hearing indicated that underground water in the counties was being contaminated by seepage from such pits.

Operators may, the commission said, dispose of such waste material in pits lined with impervious material if they get special permission from the Commission.

Quarter Horse Show July 1, 2

The annual Texas Cowboy Reunion Quarter Horse Show will be held Friday and Saturday, July 1 and 2, beginning at 8:30 a. m., with halter classes Friday and performance classes on Saturday. 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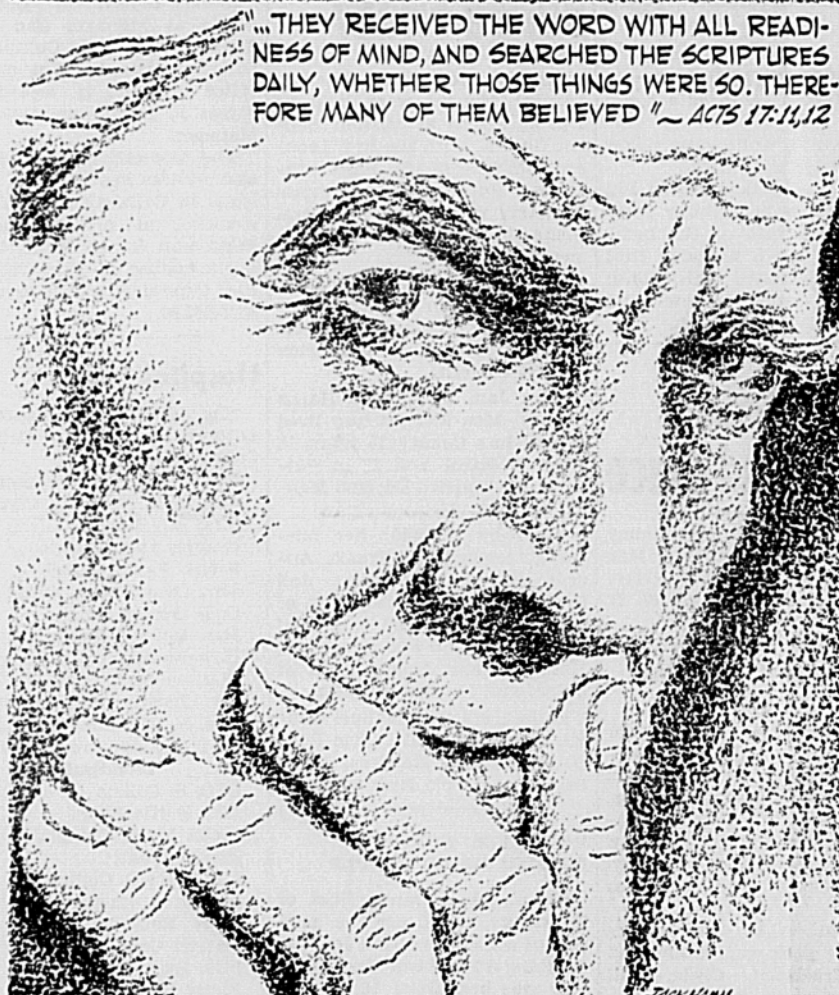

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31 Predicted To Die In Traffic Accidents Over 4th Holidays

AUSTIN — The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today reported that DPS estimates indicate 31 persons will die in traffic accidents during the three-day Fourth of July holiday, and cited incidents from last year's Independence Day holidays as examples of how these mishaps might occur. Col Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, said the estimate was compiled by the DPS Statistical Services on the basis of past experience and the current trend of traffic deaths. Last year, 28 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents during the holiday period. "On the first day of last years' holiday period," Garrison said, "a speeding driver lost control

of his car and struck a guard rail. His car flipped high into the air and landed upside down. A passenger was killed. "In another accident, a car pulled from a country road onto a major highway, directly into the path of an oncoming truck. The truck skidded 134 feet but couldn't stop in time. The driver of the car was killed. "I still a third fatal accident, one car attempted to pass another on the right hand side. The car in front moved to the right, causing the passer to swerve, lost control and overturn. One person was killed, one was injured. "Our files contain the details of each tragedy," he continued, "and each of them is made even

more tragic by the fact that, with proper awareness, they could have possibly been avoided." Garrison pointed out that the responsibility for avoiding an accident rests with each individual driver. Most drivers are basically good drivers," he said. "But too often the best driver lets his attention wander . . . and lack of attention to one's driving can be a fatal fault . . . for instance, last year one man was driving a car with five children as passengers. He entered a curve too fast, hit his brakes and lost control of his car. The vehicle overturned, killing one of the children." To focus attention on the add-

ed dangers of holiday travel and the need for awarness while driving, the DPS will conduct "Operation Motorcide" during the holiday period. From 12:01 a. m. Saturday, July 2, through 11:59 p. m. Monday, July 4, traffic fatalities will be tabulated by the Department and the totals will be announced officially three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost in the minds of the motoring public. "If each driver will assume an attitude of watchfulness and awareness toward the actions of other drivers," Garrison said, "the number of accidents can be materially reduced. Paying attention could well make the difference of a split second between

a near-miss and a fatal crash." As a part of the DPS's operation, calling for maximum enforcement and public support, additional personnel from other uniformed services of the DPS will augment the regular Highway Patrol force. In addition, Garrison added, numerous agencies, organizations and individuals will help in the coordinated program to cut down on traffic accidents by taking part in the Operation Motorcide. The Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and the Texas Motor Transportation Association will conduct a "Holiday Road Patrol" in which a fleet of 35 to 40 cars will be used over the state to assist stranded motor-

ists, thus relieving highway patrolmen for enforcement work. The Texas Safety Association will stress the need for awareness and acceptance of responsibility on the road, and will coordinate local safety council holiday safety program calling for cooperation with law enforcement officials to cut down on the number of traffic deaths. The Texas Highway Department will conduct an information and education program stressing the need for caution in and around construction areas and on freeways. They will utilize special area construction maps and bulletins to warn drivers of hazardous conditions in specific areas.

Hike Seen For Auto Insurance

The average motorist in Callahan County will pay \$4 more for automobile insurance if the proposed changes in rates is made by the State Board of Insurance, according to the Southwestern Insurance Information Service of Dallas.

Present cost of insurance on a new Ford or Chevrolet private passenger car driven to and from work and not driven by a male under 25 years of age is \$138. The new cost would be \$142. This includes basic liability coverage of \$10,000 for injury or loss of life of one person, \$20,000 for two, and \$5,000 property damage; \$100 deductible collision; and full coverage comprehensive insurance.

Under the new rates, motorists would pay \$1 more for bodily injury and property damage liability and \$5 more for comprehensive. But the cost of \$100

deductible collision would be reduced \$2.

Cost for the same coverage but with \$50 deductible collision would be increased \$4, from \$151 to \$155.

Other types and older cars would have different rates. Texas has 26 rating territories and eight automobile classifications. The cost estimates given are for cars in classification 1B, which includes about half of the private automobiles in Texas.

For cars in this classification and insured under \$100 deductible collision policies, insurance would cast less in nine territories and remain unchanged in two. Costs for \$50 deductible policies would be lowered in seven territories and unchanged in one.

Even with the rate increases, Texas would rank about 30th among the states in the cost of automobile insurance to policyholders.



TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

What are the requirements for filing an estate tax return? This question bothers many taxpayers, but the rules are fairly simple. Your administrator will have to file an estate tax return if the fair market value of your estate is \$60,000 or more on the date of your death. However, if there is a surviving spouse and the estate is community property, you do not have to file unless the estate exceeds \$120,000, since 50% of the community property belongs to the surviving spouse. Getting the correct evaluation on your estate is important since this evaluation affects all future tax transactions on the property.
